Principal's Message

are now at the midpoint of the year, the busy exam and report writing time is almost complete and we are planning for the second half of the school year. In reflecting upon the first half of the year it is clear that we have many achievements to be proud of and also aspects in the school where we can improve.

The quality of the extracurricular program at the school continues to be high. The inter school sport competition has been highly successful with many competitions won at zone level and several at state level. Our Music program which includes 260 students allows for the development of high level musicianship and also for the building of competency as team members. These skills were on display at the Mid-Winter concert. Music students will be attending music camp next term, performing in a number of festivals and hopefully tour later in the vear.

Whole year level camps have been conducted for Years 7, 9 and 12 students and a tour for a group of Year 9 students to China is in the preparation stage. Students have been selected for this experience through application and interview and will depart for China in the last week of Term 3. The school will welcome a

group of students and teachers from China on 31st July for a weeklong stay, including a Homestay with CHS families. Year 10 students have been selected through application, interview and physical challenge for the World Challenge program which will travel to Nepal next year.

The school has been developing ways to build student capacity to manage their learning and monitor learning progress. This characteristic is vital for students to achieve their best at school and also to be self-managing and responsible adults. The environment of the Enterprise Centre encourages learning in this way. It is challenging for students who have developed a preference for a more passive style of learning and we have work to do to develop our approaches to learning to support students.

Learning Mentoring is another way in which the school is working toward increasing student capacity to track their own learning. Each week students meet with their Learning Mentor during a 75 minute period. In this time teachers meet with students individually about their goals for learning and provide support for reflecting upon learning progress.

On 19th June the PFA organized an educational and social event for our school community. Half the Sky film



night took place in the Enterprise
Centre and was attended by parents
and friends of the school who wanted
to know more about community based
projects which are being developed
to address issues of poverty through
education and other interventions
generated by women. It was a moving
and rewarding experience. The event
provided the PFA with the opportunity
to consider the role that they might
take in assisting the school to consider
global issues and the ways that our
school community might connect with
them.

Students from all year levels attended the Term 2 student forum on Thursday 20th June which explored the theme of building a respectful community at CHS. It was led by our Year 12 captains and SRC presidents. The objective was to table issues of concern and to develop possible responses which can be put into place next term. A team of students will meet next week to develop an action plan for next term.

And a quote from Craig Emerson, the Minister for Trade: "Don't underestimate the power of alumni."

Universities face the same challenges that CHESS has: the need to maintain an effective and up to date database; the need to create greater awareness so that students engage with us while at school and the need to demonstrate that alumni do far more than just reunions. 

career in technology was absolutely not on my mind when I was at school. I chose subjects that interested me, and kept my options open – English, physics, history, maths, legal studies and chemistry. I went to uni planning to study history, but it wasn't a particular class that led to the discovery that dramatically altered the direction my life would take, it was something else. The Internet. Yes, it was a nerdy kind of fun, but the possibilities seemed so incredible – particularly the idea that access to information and knowledge could be more equitable. Inspired, I transferred to a computing degree.

As a graduate, I moved to Sydney and joined a US-based consulting firm, riding the dot-com wave. At 22 I led the rebuild of the Woolworths website, back when websites were pet-projects of CEOs. In 2001, the bubble was beginning to burst – I took my redundancy and went backpacking, finally landing in London. As a tech savvy consultant, work was not hard to come by, even in those post dot.com times. I contracted in London for a couple of years, before doing the same in Amsterdam and on my return to Australia the opportunities didn't diminish. I've worked with amazing people, on incredible projects and love how collaborative and creative the industry is, as well as the importance of and focus on innovation. I've also continued to travel, with assignments in India, the UK, the USA, Singapore and Hong Kong.

I look back at how excited I was when I first discovered the web, and I'm a little embarrassed at my naïveté. Yes, the internet did create equity of access, but only to everyone who had access to a computer, still a luxury item. The digital divide became a common term and a real barrier. Fast forward almost 20 years and I believe we're now beginning to see delivery on that early promise. Technology has the power to open doors and create opportunities. It is having a massive impact on social and economic justice issues across the world. As a technologist, working for a software company whose purpose is to revolutionise software creation and delivery, while advocating for positive social change, I'm right in the middle of it.



CHESS ALUMNI - VALE

Dr Steven Wilkins 1946-2013

Steven attended Camberwell High School from 1960–1963. After completing Year 12 he choose to study science because he had an interest in experimenting with simple rigs and chemicals, a joy in the certainty of mathematics, and a fascination with physics sparked by the Professor Harry Messel summer schools that were televised in the early 1960s. Steve was

a widely-respected and internationally-renowned X-ray scientist. As a CSIRO scientist for more than 35 years he made pioneering contributions in many areas of X-ray science, including phase-contrast imaging. He was a great proponent of synchrotron science and his dedication and vision contributed to the establishment of the Australian Synchrotron.
