


Tribute to Ray Carroll

It was with a great deal of sadness that some of us joined Jill Laughlin, the Principal, to farewell Ray Carroll at his funeral service in August. His commitment to CHESS as the treasurer, his enthusiastic attendance at School council meetings and his enjoyment of the Valedictory and Presentation evenings, where he presented the CHESS awards, won him great admiration from staff and ex-students alike.

After moving from Westmere to Burwood in 1953, Ray commenced year 9 at Camberwell High School and met Barry Davidson, Don Kerr and Bob Knowles, with whom he remained life-long friends. After completing year 11 Ray joined BHP as a cadet and studied Accountancy at Swinburne College of Technology. He went on to work at HP Products, Dunlop Rubber, Southern Motors and finally Pivot Fertilizers for 21 years until 1995. In his retirement Ray mentored a young boy at a local primary school from prep to year six. The young man recently sent Ray a letter and wrote: 'thank you for always being there for me' and 'you will always be in my heart'. Ray will remain in our hearts too and we are grateful for the contribution he made.




Where your CHESS subscription goes

hinking back over the years at Camberwell High, I remember my head lost in the clouds most of the time, day dreaming of what could be, or hooked on the lyrics or sounds of bands like Pink Floyd or even Daddy Cool for some Oz rock. Struggling with maths and science subjects, I found I was best at the Arts. I had great teachers who encouraged me to follow my dreams and in those days I wanted to be a Drama teacher or on stage directing. I had great friends in the drama groups, musical events and the SRC and was a prefect in year 11 and Head Prefect in 1976. I left knowing that the school had given me a great start and provided me with wonderful opportunities.

After four years at Melbourne Teacher's College where I studied Drama, Film and Television, I taught briefly at Wesley College before taking up a position at Sunshine Tech as Head of the Media Department. I took up the opportunity to work with the Channel 7 news team as a news video editor, rapidly found my true passion as an editor and was obsessed with the art of editing. Channel 9 then offered me a job in news, sports and lifestyle programs before I took up the chance to move to the UK in 1990 where I lived in London with my wonderful English wife Celia for the next 12 years. I continued to work as a freelance editor with many Australian networks, smaller UK production companies and major networks like the BBC. I worked throughout Europe covering major events in America, Russia and Europe. Life was unpredictable and a heap of fun and I had a loose life plan "make it up as you go along". Having won a few awards for editing in the UK, and worked with some wonderful directors and producers, I feel on reflection, that life has been very much unplanned and I am lucky to have met great people along the way.

Since returning to Melbourne, I have continued to freelance edit for various networks. I also set up my own business specialising in making short films of unique personal and family biographies. I think fondly of our old school days, teachers and friends. It seems appropriate to mention the sad passing of my very best friend, Jon Newsome. All these things have influenced me in how I interact with the world and I feel that my passion for editing has somehow allowed me a unique way of seeing the world both in the past and the future ...

Principal's Message

uring the last week of Term 3, I was in China with our Year 9 students participating in the China Challenge. The students were a delight to travel with, keen to try new things everywhere we went from unusual foods to choreographed calisthenics with the whole school. This term we will complete a film about the exchange with our Chinese sister school, prepare an article for Prospice and present at Assembly.

Over the recent term holidays, Stage 1 of the long awaited Basketball Courts was completed for use. The process is in 2 Stages as we need warm conditions to successfully cure the synthetic surface.

Student Leadership interviews were conducted for the important roles of School Captains and Student Representative Council Presidents for 2014. The purpose of these interviews was to provide student nominees with the opportunity to present themselves as candidates and to give an outline of their understanding and intentions regarding the role they wish to take up.

Camberwell High School has farewelled Year 12 students for 2013 with a series of celebratory activities. On Tuesday 22nd October, the End of Year Music Concert was held. School tours are conducted fortnightly and bookings are essential. PH: 9836 0555.


School News

Ray Boston (1956–1960) USA

Ray feels very fortunate to have been zoned into Camberwell High School as he was graced with the "most creative, sensitive, and caring teachers imaginable," who stood out with regard to interest in their students, subjects, and the school. He wanted to be an architect but the prospects seemed pretty grim as Ray felt he was devoid of the requisite artistic skills.

Fortunately, after having tried various sports he started rowing. In year 11 both rowing and studies became more serious and he was faced with some uncertainty about his career. He was preparing for a rowing practice when his coach, an All-Australian Olympic Oarsman, out of the blue said, "Ray, are you going to be a physicist?" His coach taught physics at school and Ray was actually enrolled in physics but he didn't really think that this made him a physicist. Ray did end up studying physics for 10 years at Melbourne University and his rowing team wound up winning all of the high school regattas.


In 1964, Ray received a bachelor's degree in physics, and a master's degree in physiology. He continued his academic work while a pilot officer in the Royal Australian Air force, and in 1970 gained a PhD in physics. In 1971 he was awarded a research fellowship in statistics at the Institute of Advanced Studies at Australian National University, and then became a senior lecturer in computing and statistics

at La Trobe University for the next 12 years. After a short stint at Murdoch University Ray moved to the US in 1991 to become Professor of Applied Biomathematics in the University of Pennsylvania School of Veterinary Medicine.



Roy Wigg, Teacher mid-'70s

Roy Wigg is remembered by ex-student's from the mid '70s as an accounting teacher who was "a terrific communicator with a good sense of humour". With colleagues at Camberwell Grammar who decided that accounting texts were too dry, he spent many hours writing more interesting and challenging text books including a year 12 book that captured 75 per cent of the market. He became Associate Head of School at Deakin University and co-authored eight accounting texts, which have been used extensively at secondary and tertiary levels. Roy died in June 2013.
