#### **REFLECTIONS**

I have been a member of staff at Camberwell High School since the beginning of 1989 when I transferred from Springvale High School. I have been one of Camberwell's Assistant Principal since 1995.

Camberwell High when I arrived at the school had approximately 800 students with 125 students at years 7 to 9, 150 students at year 10 and approximately 275 students in VCE. The school buildings comprised the two main blocks of the school, there was no link between the buildings and about four portables located on the block of land closest to the school.

The portable complex on the oval arrived at the school in 1993. Art was taught in room A4 and Graphics was taught in the north section of the new library. There was no Sports Hall and the Physical Education Faculty used the old wooden gymnasium. The 'Camberwell Council' still operated the swimming pool on the land where the Art/Technology Building now stands. Our students used the pool extensively for their P.E. during terms one and four. The school uniform for all students was a green pullover and some students wore a green blazer. Girls wore in winter a pleated green skirt, fawn shirt and stockings, much different from the plaid skirt that they now wear. Student lockers were the very small variety with twelve lockers in each bank and these were positioned in all corridors.

There are only nine of the current staff of ninety teachers who were at the school in 1989. The facilities of the school were very run down. The school had twelve Apple 2e and three Macintosh Computers. These were located in the area off A7 which is now used for our computer servers and staff. There was one typing room with sixteen electric typewriters and forty manual typewriters. The Sick Bay and Assistant Principal area was a Science room.

There have been enormous changes to the school in my time here. The physical appearance of the school, the buildings, the resources, the computers, the content of courses of study, the way in which we teach and the way we care for students. Camberwell High has always been a good school and it will continue to be so in the future.

The things that have continued to impress me about the school over my time here have been the quality of the students, the continuing support of the parent community, the commitment of the staff and the vision articulated by the Principal to provide the best possible education and facilities for all students who come here. Features of the school that provide its character and focus have always been the House System, the student Leadership Program and the annual events like the Music, Drama, Chorals, Debating, A.V.G. James Lecture, the Open Nights, the Fairs, Talent Quests, Battle of the Bands and other special events. I could go on and on because our school calendar is full of activities for all to be involved in. It has been great to be a part of this school.

#### **REFLECTIONS**

I am delighted to report to the school community for the 2003 school year on the building works and the proposed further developments of the schools' facilities and environment.

Before commencing this overview can I express my sincere thanks to the teaching and support staff and our students for their support and cooperation during the last twelve months. The internal demolition in the front two-storey building and the resultant noise, dust and the loss of our courtyard as a means of access, placed enormous strain on all members of the school. The school motto, "I am learning to be considerate of others", was surely tested at this time.

By the end of Term 1 the noise has lessened and the dust had settled and a new improved link between the buildings was evident, as was the new administration area. During Term 2 the new Library was completed on the first level and in a fitting tribute to the Principal was named the Brereton Library. Work then commenced on the refurbishment of the former library and

saw the addition of three science rooms and a computer pod. As I write the new home economics area, comprising two classrooms, a dining area and a kitchen near the assembly hall, are nearing completion and will be "cooking" at the start of Term 4. During the first weeks of Term 4 the former Home Economics area will be transformed into four general-purpose classrooms, a computer pod and an office, and the external lift enabling disabled access around the school will be completed. This will draw to a conclusion stage 2 of our Masterplan that has resulted in a major refurbishment of two and three storey buildings.

What next? With the likely acquisition of the residential property along Prospect Hill Rd., we have already started planning for additional permanent teaching spaces and a Drama classroom and the removal of as many portables as possible. Just as the dust settles here we go again. I look forward to reporting this venture same time next year.

#### School History

Since it began in May 1941, Camberwell High School with Dr James as Headmaster, has had a long and proud tradition. The school opened with a total of 353 students housed in what has been traditionally known as the 'old building' and is now know as the 'A Block', with blackboards, chalk and dusters as the only facilities. In February 1942 the school was "disintegrated" and Melbourne Boys' High School was to occupy the site. The Government had requisitioned both Melbourne Boys' High and MacRobertson Girls' High for military purposes. Camberwell High School reopened in 1945.

With the school being founded in the war years, the houses were named after the great leaders, both military and political, from that era – Churchill, Macarthur, Montgomery and Roosevelt,





#### James Lecture - Jim and Yvonne Claymore: Adventure in Antarctica

"Antarctica. A few years ago, I thought it was a great continent of ice, with seals and penguins. Having lived there, now I see Antarctica with a whole different eye!"

When Mum told me that I was going to a lecture at the school, my heart filled with dread. I could picture what it would be like: an assembly-like atmosphere, someone talking constantly and the audience slowly falling into a slumber of boredom. I had no idea who these people were, when they went to Antarctica or why, and to be honest I didn't really care. But this lecture was to have a profound effect on me and change the way I look at life's possibilities.

Yvonne had dreamt since childhood of the Antarctic since reading adventure magazines that had belonged to her brothers. She and Jim decided to go. But how? Months of plotting and planning followed, with numerous obstacles to overcome along the way. Jim needed to have his appendix removed and dental work was required

before they could proceed. Then Yvonne was diagnosed with breast cancer only six months before they were due to depart. She decided to undergo surgery rather than put off the trip.

Finally they set off for the isolated hut in the Antarctic that was to be their home for twelve months. Rescue would not be possible due to their isolation and the weather conditions. They would be alone in a hut in Antarctica.

They survived the horrible conditions of their hut, where their breath would freeze to the wall and when they turned the heater on, it would drip onto their mattress making it literally like an ice block. They also survived the long dark winter when the sun would not appear for so many months. As the

months went on, and light finally came back to Antarctica, Jim and Yvonne kept themselves active by writing - Jim writing a personal diary, Yvonne writing a weekly column in the Women's Weekly. They were amazed and entertained by the wild life that returned to their isolated area.

When the talk finished everyone in the room was left shocked and eager for more. A talk, which I expected to be incredibly long and boring, was in fact a talk that left me inspired.

Yvonne and Jim had stressed that anything is possible if you plan thoroughly and work towards your goal systematically and with absolute commitment. Inspiring stuff.

The school's leading debating group, the A team, consisted of Rachael Hands, Sam Dunscombe, Clement Dunn, Alexis Flint, Tineka Everaardt and Daniel Victory. They demonstrated an impressive run of successes, remaining undefeated until the last round of the inter-school competition which they lost by a mere point. The coveted "Best Speaker" title was regularly won by a member of the A team.

The B team was made up of Tim Fletcher, Benjamin Crowley, Andrew Carter, Kate Staples and Salma Sarmini. The B team recorded mixed results, winning their first and last debates, but narrowly missing out on winning the majority of their encounters.

The A and B grade teams are often given secret topics on the debate night and have a mere hour to prepare and write their entire speeches.

CHS's C team of Hannah Jones, Peter Evans, Lara Anderson, Lisa Graham, Bill Forshaw and Heidi Edwards followed in the footsteps of the highly successful A team and won all but their last debate.

Participants in junior debating take part in three debates, compared with five a season for the seniors. # Overseas Students 2003

It has been another busy and productive year for our overseas students. The "Class of 2002" gained places in the Universities of Melbourne, Sydney, Monash, and Swinburne and are now studying Commerce, Arts/Law, Architecture, Property & Construction, Information Technology, Engineering and Aviation.

Students this year have come from Hong Kong, China, Taiwan, Vietnam, Indonesia, Germany and Japan. Once again there have been just over 40 students on campus during the year, almost all of whom are in Senior School. Nearly half of those students achieved Credits or Distinctions in the Australian Mathematics Competition and Emily Wan in Year 11 gained a High Distinction, making her amongst the top 2% of students in the State. The number of students in Year 10 is quite small, but they are already making a significant contribution in academic work and other areas. #### GEOGRAPHY FIELDWORK


#### Year 9




When we arrived at the camp we were allocated to our cabins. Each of the cabins shared their bathroom facilities with the members of the cabin next door.


This year the sports were held at Box Hill Stadium on a real running track with a seated stadium for the spectators.










#### Geography Camp
