Recently I had the privilege of spending time with two of our alumni groups.

As part of celebrating the school's 75th year, I visited the Canberra chapter of CHESS.

Allan Carter (class of '56) organised a delightful get-together over lunch at the National Museum with 11 other ex-students and their partners.

The Canberra chapter was started by Fred Roberts in 1993 and has continued to meet three or four times a year. From 1997 to 2000 Fred coordinated a program whereby an outstanding CHS Year 11 science student visited Canberra for two days of work experience. The original suggestion came from Professor Graeme Cox, of the John Curtin School of Medical Research, who offered to pay for an annual guided visit to the JCSMR. Dr Rosemary Wright provided accommodation for the young guests and took them on 'doctors' rounds' at the Canberra

Hospital. The idea was to give the young visitors some idea of the options open to them in pursuing a career in science. The program went for four years, but unfortunately ceased when Graeme Cox retired.

Some of the ex-students I met moved to Canberra, began new careers and made the Territory their home while still maintaining family links in Melbourne. For others, their link to Camberwell High School has remained strong through their CHESS membership and a keen interest in school and alumni activities. This edition features a number of exstudents whose lives and careers have been influenced by our school in different ways. Perhaps this poem sums up why we are who we are and why many of us still have our school in our heart.

# Principal's Message

I am pleased to report that after 18 months of extensive repair work, the Assembly Hall has been formally handed back to the school. This occurred in time for a number of important events for the Year 12 students, including a whole school farewell assembly, the Valedictory evening with their families and the exams. Before their last day, the Year 12 students enjoyed dressing up as fantasy characters from their childhood. With music, dance, a water slide and oversized sumo balls, they played together with a great sense of fun and celebrated their transition to the world beyond school. The Parents and Friends Association hosted a sit down lunch for all Year 12 students and staff. We are fortunate to have a parent community which supports the school in this warm and generous way.

Recently I spoke to all students about one of our ex-students Dr Andrew Evans who is undertaking ground breaking medical research. My message to the students was that whatever the future has in store for them as individuals, we hope that they

will positively impact the world around them. I encouraged them to consider how they can impact others now, rather than waiting until the future.

After a long wait our oval will begin its redevelopment in November. This project is funded entirely by the school community through fund raising initiatives undertaken by School Council which include the Uniform Shop and the hiring of facilities after hours. We look forward to using our new oval early next year. It will be an all year round synthetic surface. Terraced areas will be established on the East and West boundaries and new fencing installed adjacent to Prospect Hill Rd. The Parents and Friends Association are assisting with the purchase of soccer goals and the students who raised in excess of \$3.000 in the Run for the Oval earlier in the year will be consulted about how this will be allocated.

I am also pleased to report that the school is now compliant with the Department's requirements for the safety of children, specifically in regard

The last term is full of activities and learning. After the Year 11 and 10 exams the whole school will move up a year level so that the very best transition can be made for the start of next year.

### **Dr Andrew Evans**

After completing Year 12 at
Camberwell High School and
training at the Royal Melbourne,
Western Hospitals and the Kingston
Centre, I spent over four years in a
movement disorders fellowship at the
National Hospital for Neurology and
Neurosurgery, Queen Square, London.

Currently I am the director of the Movement Disorders Service at the Royal Melbourne Hospital and I have recently led a world-first trial to treat Parkinson's disease.

Stem cells were injected into the brain of a Victorian patient as part of

experimental surgery. Our team of neuroscientists transplanted millions of cells at 14 injection sites via just two 1.5cm holes in the skull. The cells had been frozen and flown in from the United States in a global collaboration. It is hoped the cells will boost levels of the neurotransmitter dopamine, a lack of which causes tremors, rigidity and slowness.

The therapy, which pushes the frontiers of science and surgery, had shown great promise in preclinical trials, paving the way for human trials. Months of planning, which involved designing the operation from scratch, winning regulatory approval, and

importing a machine that has never been used in Australia, was required.

No drugs have succeeded in stopping the progression of Parkinson's, which affects 10 million people worldwide, and treatments for symptoms eventually become ineffective.

The identity of the patient, aged 64, remains private while he recovers from the pioneering surgery. It is not yet known if the treatment has been successful. Eleven more patients will now have the surgery. Eventually we hope we can use this procedure to address the current shortfalls in therapies for Parkinson's disease. Final results will be known in two years.
