They also saw the photos of a few of our famous ex-students.

Since then, I've reflected on the opportunity to engage with the next generation of parents and students, and realised that as an ex-students society we are helping current and future students appreciate our history. We are also endeavouring to preserve our history using a variety of mediums.

- Others have donated items of clothing and at the recent Open Day, the prefect's badge belonging to Jackie Lublin (Levy) was displayed on an old blazer. The library also has archives that they display, including 'The Big Book' which has old newspaper cuttings showing the development of the school since it commenced.
- In the main foyer of the school, the Hall of Fame features 18 of our exstudents. This display was collated

These profiles will be displayed on the television in the main foyer. The committee would value assistance from those of you with an interest in preserving our history. We want to maintain a living history so that it is an inspiration to our current students and generations of students to come.

Principal's Report

We are experiencing a high level of interest in the school and are currently running several tours a week. At the annual Open Night on 2 May our student guides excelled. Pairs of students led tours around the school and spoke about their experiences as students at CHS. Many of our visitors commented on the pride the students expressed and their confident manner. I accompanied some of our students when they returned to talk to Grade 5 and 6 primary school classes about life in secondary school. It was with a great sense of pride that I listened to our students speak about all that CHS has to offer.

The Year 12 Formal on 3 May was another occasion where I felt pride in our students. They arrived at Leonda immaculately presented and with infectious excitement. The formal enables the whole year group to come together as one and feel connected. This is an important part of the rationale for the evening and provides a great foundation for Year 12 students as they continue with a challenging year of study, filled with assessments.

It was with great delight that we officially opened the oval on Friday 12 May. Our guest of honour, Tilly Lucas Rodd, Carlton mid-fielder for the inaugural AFL Women's League and ex-student, kicked the footy with our students. Students are thrilled to have this outstanding facility. Our school community worked for many years to complete this project, and it is a great message for all about the power of persistence.

On 18 May, the PFA prepared a wonderful morning tea to show their gratitude towards the staff. The morning tea also raises funds for the Cancer Council and we remembered those we have lost to cancer, including members of our staff and broader school community.

At the House Chorals festival our senior students developed scripts, music and choreography and taught the Year 7 students in preparation for the final competition. It was a wonderful celebration of student talent and team work, with Churchill emerging as victors on the day.

A Design and Development Team of 22 teachers and students has met with architects to develop the brief for the upgrade of the interiors of C and D buildings. We are pleased with the progress of the designs and look forward to sharing these with the school community.



In the next few weeks we have Year 10 work experience, the mid-year Music Concert and a parent workshop on Drug and Alcohol Awareness. All our events aim to develop respectful and responsible young adults who are ready to embrace life and make a positive impact in the world.

Mr Robert Ewins (1933–2013) was a fine and beloved teacher at Camberwell High School where he taught from 1958–1964. He often spoke of his years at CHS as being the most enjoyable of his teaching career and attributed this to the students' being very engaged in their schooling and wanting to learn.

Mr Ewins was deeply passionate about sharing his love of English literature with his students and wanted them to fully appreciate the beauty of language, which he achieved through his inspirational teaching. An interesting anecdote reveals a conversation he had with one of his students who asked: 'Mr Ewins, what is the most important thing that has ever happened to you?' 'That's easy – learning to read.' Mr Ewins replied.

To honour the memory of Mr Ewins, a fund was established by members of CHESS. Every year the Robert Ewins Memorial Fund makes a very generous, and much appreciated donation to the Brereton Library. This year a selection of quality, non-fiction titles were purchased for the Library with these funds. All these books have a special bookplate inside which acknowledges this very kind donation and honours the memory of Mr Ewins.

Frank Tisher OAM Class of 1961

After progressing through the feeder schools of Auburn South PS and Camberwell Central, I entered Year 9 in 1958. The years at CHS were enjoyable, but a lot of that four years is now just a distant memory. I do remember taking the tram home as far as Camberwell Junction and indulging in blue heaven milkshakes at Six Ways, a milk bar where many of the CHS students congregated. Sadly, that milk bar is long gone.

A few teachers still come to mind. Robert Ewins was a splendid history teacher. After failing Maths 2 in Year 11, I changed to economics with Mr Joyce. He was a great economics teacher and I came 2nd in the state in that subject.

1961 was the year of the first credit squeeze in Australia since the end of WWII. For my father, things were grim in architecture and he did not encourage me to follow him into that profession. Having done so well in economics, I chose to do a combined Law-Commerce degree at Melbourne University. I became more and more immersed in the Law side of the course and did very well, coming top in several subjects and equal third in final year. I also passed the honours exams.

I started work as an articled clerk and was admitted to the Supreme Court to practice as a solicitor in 1968. I continued to work at the law firm of Abbott, Stillman and Wilson until 1970 when I commenced my own practice under the name of Frank Tisher & Associates. In 1972 Dennis Liner became a partner and for 45 years it was Tisher Liner FC Law. Our offices are on the corner of Queen and Latrobe Streets. I have always enjoyed that part of town – it is near the courts and the Titles Office, Hardware Lane with its many restaurants for lunch and near Victoria Market.

Over the years, I have specialised more and more. I was one of the first lawyers to sit for the accreditation exams in the early 1990s and I am an Accredited Property Law

Specialist, having sat on the Law Institute Property Law Committee.

I have devoted myself to other causes and have served on numerous committees and boards including the National Gallery Society of Victoria, the Lorne Sculpture Committee, Ajax Tennis and Ski Clubs and the Jewish Museum of Australia. For 25 years I have served on the board of Emmy Monash Aged Care as President and currently as a Director, and received the OAM Honour in 2014 for my contribution to aged care, cultural and sporting organisations.

I have always felt that it is important to give back to the community and help set an example for future generations. As I approach my 73rd birthday, I can say that I feel content with my life. I am blessed with a loving wife and family. I have satisfaction from my work (which I still do four days a week) and I have many interests, which include galleries, music, theatre and travel. In its own way, I can thank CHS for the start it gave me many years ago.

Addendum to Don Walker's Reflection on the First Days of CHS

Fred Roberts (class of 1946) from the Canberra Chapter, has provided a brief expansion to Don Walker's excellent contribution in our March Chessmoves.

He adds: 'In 1944 some CHS boys completed Year 3 in the Prospect Hill building while it was still occupied by Melbourne Boys' High School. MBHS had five Year 3 forms: 3A, B, C, D, and E. Then there was 3X. This was the form made up of boys who were going to stay on in 1945 as CHS pupils when the main body of MBHS boys returned to their own school premises.

In 1945, most of the former 3X went on to become CHS's 4th Form and in 1946, its 5th Form. Our Principal, Dr A.V.G. James, had hoped that CHS could start a Matriculation year in 1947, but too few of us qualified to go on. In fact, CHS couldn't support a Matriculation year until 1956. Those seeking 6th form education had to go to other schools and, ironically, in 1947 half-a-dozen or so of us found ourselves 'back' with the Melbourne High School boys'.

150th Anniversary of Camberwell Primary School

A number of events are planned, including an Open Day on 19 August 2017, the official

150th Anniversary. The Celebrations Committee is trying to locate past students to learn more about the school's history and about life in years gone by. John Eastham CHS 1952–1956

Dot Browne (Green-Class of 1958) shares some fond school memories of former school friend, Jim Eastham.

'I first met Jim when he joined our class at Camberwell High School back in the early 50s. He was a year or so older than us and had a maturity that we all valued. He was a very popular student and he and I were elected Form Captains in 1955 and 1956.

He was an integral member of our friendship group and the girls' and boys' gangs used to hang around together all the time and be invited to each other's teenage birthday parties, where we would play embarrassing games like 'Spin the knife' and 'Pass the apple under your chin, with no hands allowed'.

In years 10 and 11 we all went to Dance Court in Hawthorn after school,

and became competent ballroom dancers.

Jim's main claim to fame was that he and Geoff French were fantastic tennis players. Jim had a magnificent serve, throwing the ball up high and slamming it down to clean up the opposition in inter-school sport. During school holidays, we all used to catch the tram down to Kooyong Tennis Courts to watch Lew Hoad and Ken Rosewall play exhibition tennis.

Jim left school before HSC and went to join Shell Oil Company. He asked me to partner him to a couple of the Shell Oil Company balls at the St Kilda Town Hall. They were always enjoyable nights, but we were never serious partners, just really good friends. He was a special man and will be sadly missed by family and friends.
