

Principal's Report

Camberwell High School - a community, a "family", a haven for some, a place of learning and laughter for many, a unique mix of 43 nationalities, of the rich and the financially disadvantaged, of the highest abilities and aspirations and the less capable and quietly hopeful: a culturally rich community that values music, drama, debating, sport, camps, overseas tours. fundraising for others, leadership, traditions, dignified assemblies, individual and team triumphs: a community supported by generous parents appreciating a staff that is particularly caring, conscientious and competent: Camberwell High School, your school, our school.

This has been a year of 'firsts' with a record-high enrolment at Year 7, the first 71 was created. The enrolment of girls was the highest for 15 years, trebling that of 1994. We reached 1200 students and 85 teaching staff, and our Year 12 students commenced the year with an Orientation-Study Camp at the Monash Halls of Residence. We had overseas trips for students to New Caledonia, Japan and Italy, we invested enormously in learning technologies, we gained a second \$2.1 million capital grant — and we demolished large parts of the original 1939-41 building!


Enough of "firsts"! Where is this wonderful school heading, and what is my/our vision for it? Physically the joy our students and staff have gained from the 2001 Arts —Technology -VCE Centre - Music Centre-gymnasium Complex will be matched next year when our new facilities, including a Resource Centre, are completed.

The high quality of teaching and learning by new and "old" has been reflected in outstanding academic success again this year in national Maths, English, Science, Geography, LOTE competitions, and in our VCE results, placing us officially in the top 15 government schools. From the "Class of 2001", 76% of the Year 12s went on to major universities, and Dux George Yang's ENTER score of 99.80 saw him win the Dean's Award at the University of Melbourne as the top student entering the Information Technology course.

My vision for CHS continues to be for a school where all students are challenged and engaged in their learning, feel safe and valued, achieve to their highest level, and where their personalities and talents are given the fullest opportunities to develop through a rich diet of enrichment learning activities, involvement in music, sport, drama, public speaking and debating, leadership, social service, camps, inter-House competitions, tours..... and so on.

Thank you, members of staff, of School Council, PFA, Parent Networks, working bee attendees and Friends of Music, for all you have given to CHS in 2002. Thank you, students of this excellent school. for being [on the whole] goodnatured, hardworking, talented, generous, honest, creative, and hopeful for a better world. May your peaceful, tolerant and accepting attitudes to each other be translated into a school community even stronger, even more supportive and generous, and one which celebrates the concept of doing one's best.

To students and staff departing may I say, "Thank you, and go on to greater endeavours that bring you satisfaction." To all who remain, let me thank you for good things done, and with you, look forward to another year as a proud member of the Camberwell High School community in 2003.




Liz Pang and Clem Dunn.





Rowing:

Surf Carnival:



The Moon Festival



Year 10 Report

MIPs

Managed Individual Pathways (MIPs) has helped give the Year 10 students more understanding of our abilities and assisted us in making realistic decisions about our futures. Introduced last year, MIPs is a program formed to help student's research possible courses and jobs. It has been a great success.

The program incorporated several lectures: one by a psychologist who gave us insight into suitable jobs linked to particular personality characteristics, another by a swimmer who talked about motivation and setting goals.

The other part of the program included a teacher of our choice mentoring us on job interests, subject choices and where we are headed in life. There was no pressure on us to make decisions but it provided us with insights on what is out there.

Work Experience


The last week of Term 3 saw us participating in at least one week of work experience.
This program aims to provide a taste of the working life as well as assisting us in looking at possible future careers.

We were required to independently organize our place of work. A wide variety of occupations were selected: these included working with film producers, the air force, and the police. One student was paid \$250 per week working in electronics.

Driver Education

The Drivers Ed program was held at Kilsyth again this year. Those who attended were divided into two groups: one group working on theory while the others worked on practice learning to drive. The groups swapped activities throughout the two day course. We also had the opportunity to experience night driving and do a theory test for the Shell Young Driver of the Year competition. We all had an excellent time.







VCE Enhancement

This is the fifth year that the VCE enhancement program has been offered. Students from Year 10 have once again been very successful in completing VCE subjects with sixty students taking a Year 11 subject. Completing these VCE subjects has given us early experience of the structure and the expectations of the VCE.

Anglesea Camp

All of us were involved in the camp as part of our work for Geography. The purpose was to investigate the sustainability of recreational resources in Anglesea, including the coalmine. Over a period of two nights and three days we did several fieldwork sessions and took part in recreational activities including the Big Swing and Vertical Challenge. Many people thought that crossing the mouth of the Anglesea River was enjoyable, especially when they decided to take and unscheduled swim. Our special thanks go to Mr Cranby for all his work.

Peer Support

This program was designed principally to assist the Year 7 students but it also provided leadership opportunities for us. During Term 1 some of us took small groups of Year 7 students for one period each week and introduced the students to the course we had been trained to conduct at the end of last year. During the time together we conducted the various activities and worksheets aimed at helping them settle in to their new school. This provided us with the opportunity to work with and get to know some of the Year 7 students.







Forty Hour Famine



Fieldwork

Students carried out fieldwork in all Geography classes this year. In Year 7 [Microclimates, the Zoo], Year 8 [Toolangi State Forest], and Year 9 [Beach Useage], the Fieldwork exercises were aimed at introducing students to working outside of their classroom, collecting data, and processing the results back in class.


At Year 10, all students were involved in a two-day and night 'Fieldstudy Camp', at Anglesea, along the Great Ocean Road. Staying at the Anglesea Recreation Camp, the students were

The 'Fieldstudy Camp' introduced students to a range of techniques of data collection [observation, recording, measuring, mapping, field sketching which were completed over the two days in a self contained 'Fieldstudy Manual'. On the morning of the first day, the students attended a seminar where the content and background to the fieldwork was introduced. They then spent 5 hours carrying out the fieldwork on the first afternoon, and a similar amount of time the following morning.

The emphasis of the fieldwork was a study of the sustainable development of the large variety of recreation and other resources in Anglesea. VCE students, both in units 1&2 and units 3&4, once again made the trip to Mt. Stirling to carry out the fieldwork requirement of their courses.

The Thursday was spent loading trailers, buses and traveling via Yea, Mansfield [flat tyre-thanks Dan for helping to get the wheel off], and hence to King Saddle 1330 metres up Mt Stirling. That afternoon was spent setting up our campsite. The next two days were spent carrying out fieldwork. Unit 1&2 students scaled the summit twice, carrying out data collection tasks focusing on the natural and human changes that were taking place on the mountain. Unit 3&4 students spent one day on the mountain collecting data, then a day in Mansfield [Harvest Festival], Merrijig [Rodeo], and Mt. Buller, carrying out a survey related to the use and management of Mt. Stirling. They used the data back in class to evaluate a policy for the future sustainable development of the mountain.

Camp




Counting down the days by hours,

For time will quicken with our pace, We'll notice less as time goes by, We may be first to win the race, But last to see the butterfly.










She is now looking forward to working in the corporate world. Mrs Gray will always be remembered for her cheerful smile and ability to make anyone laugh. We will miss her deeply.


Mr Bucklow


