PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE



Each year I attempt to sum up the year of the Camberwell High School community and it is never easy. How do you summarise in a meaningful way the contributions of staff, students, parents and community members to what has again been a wonderfully successful year, in a few words? How do I explain why Camberwell High School still has waiting lists for enrolments and an excellent reputation in the local and wider community in this age of strong competition between schools, including between the very good government schools in this area? To do this I want to acknowledge that the CHS staff, both teaching and support staff, are equal to if not better, than staff in any school, and I want to thank them for all they are. do, and give. Our reputation for the high level of student wellbeing, care, and giving students a "fair go", whilst challenging them to do better at an individual and group level, has made us known as a safe and nurturing school. We are known too as a lively and supportive place that values students doing their best, celebrating both academic excellence and students' improved outcomes. The staff are vital in these aspects- our students doing very well, our students doing their best, our students feeling safe -and I thank them for their professionalism and commitment, and the incredibly hard work they have done again this year.

The students of this school in general are warmhearted, motivated to do well, and delightful to work with, and I thank our students for the rewarding times you have given to the staff and to each other. Students have represented their Houses in swimming and athletics carnivals, debating, and in the wonderful inter-House Arts Festival (Chorals/ Instrumentals). They have raised many thousands of dollars for good causes including Challenge, World Vision and the Children First Foundation. Some students worked in Borneo over the last Christmas holidays, some have travelled this year to New Caledonia as French students, to Malaysia as students of Indonesian, toured western Canada 28 musical performers/ambassadors, gone North across Australia via Alice Springs on the Central/Northern Australia safari, trekked the Alps out of Wollongara, undertaken fieldwork at Walhalla and in the alpine regions, skied at Mt.Buller, toured the state as music ensembles, gone on camps as whole year levels to the Monash Halls of Residence (Year 12), Portsea (Year 7), and Phillip Island (Year 9), and been involved in our high quality and huge sports and music programs. Some of you have been successful again in the inter-school debating competition and many of you have gained plaudits for individual honours in national events, representing the state in sport, gaining outstanding results in national and inter-national English, Maths, and Science competitions, achieving very high levels in AMEB exams, singing in the national choirs, and more.

Our school did extremely well in inter-school sport (please read the report inside) and I commend all students involved, and Brent Thiele and Kim Bate and their sports staff/coaches for this great outcome. Our girls rowing Fours made the semi-finals of the State Schoolgirls' regatta, and our cross-country runners

formed a successful team at State level. The two Boys' Lacrosse teams and Senior Boys' Netball team became State champions, and the Inter Boys' Football team were runners-up at the highest level. Helen McRae and Darby Kitchin are State Champions in their 1500m events! Thanks go to the students, and to the staff who worked so well with all students and teams.



Our eleven music ensembles provided their members with much satisfaction in 2007 and they all performed well in the Melbourne Bands Festival. Their two concerts at school were wonderful and enjoyed by all, and the James Morrison Master Class Concert in September in front of a packed house at the Hawthorn Town Hall in September made all of us very proud to be involved with the musicians, led by Kathryn Cooper and her staff.

This year saw the introduction, under the inspired leadership of School Welfare Coordinator Amada Stone, of the Restorative Justice approach to student and staff relationships and the resolution of issues between them, to eliminate grudges, anger and resentment over outcomes of poor behaviour, and to set positive practices in place to rebuild relationships where necessary. We are excited by the progress of changed practice in this area and believe it has been successful already in many cases. I want our students to be happy and content, to feel valued and encouraged, and to treat others, and be treated, with consideration and empathy. The Student Attitudes to School survey (DEECD's) shows that CHS has very high levels of student connectedness to the school, and equally high levels of safety: we will do all in our power to see this maintained and raised.

What have been the highlights of 2007? All of us can name many, but mine include the exciting crosssubjects research work done by our Year 8 and 9 students, with the Melbourne Project's Roundtable presentations admired by all. Medieval Day (Year 8), Reach, Be Real and Melbourne Project (Year 9), SRC Talent Quest and Battle of the Bands, the Formals run by Year 11 and 12, music concerts, the House Arts Festival, inter-House sports, world premiere of the World's Biggest Beginner Band(!), Anzac Day and Valedictory Assemblies, the Moon Festival, Senior and Junior School Presentation Nights, Valedictory Luncheon and Arts/Design Exhibition, Valedictory Evening, both music concerts, students raising funds for those in need, our dynamic and communityinvolving Open Night, creation of a true Music Centre, working bees with the generous faithful, Trivia/Silent Auction Night (340 attended) and the Red Carpet Ball,

Again I thank all staff but in particular our Business Manager Maxine Schmidt, Heads of Junior and Senior School, Elizabeth Foulds and Daryl Bennett. our leaders in Curriculum and Staff Professional Learning Andrew Batrouney and Melinda Sparkes (a huge responsibility this year in particular to lead us into new directions for DEECD and ourselves), Amanda Stone (School Welfare), Brian Snashall-Woodhams (School Organisation), all PTLs and Learning Area Heads, Kim Bate (Sport), Kathryn Cooper (Music), Carol Thomson (Library), Angela Koehler (Careers) Paula Stocker (International Students), Sofia Constandelos and Sue Tavrou for this wonderful magazine, and all our support staff including the hardworking Office staff (with a particular thank you to my PA Glenice Porter). I have left two vital and excellent staff until last: thank you Isabelle McKenzie and Maureen Salter for all you have given and all you have done for the good of Camberwell High School in 2007, and for your support of my work. We are blessed to have two such dedicated and competent Assistant Principals.

Finally, we farewelled some staff this year including "long timers" Gail Martin, Matt Davis, Andrew Barrett, Janine Wood, Barbara Gronn and others, all of whom I thank sincerely, and we said our farewells to our Year 12s and now celebrate their VCE successes including three perfect scores and our Dux James McMahon (99.30). Now we look forward to next year and the path this school will take to improve all we do, to make our communication with you even better, and to provide the challenges and opportunities students need in curricula and extra-curricula activities. We vow to do our best to prepare our students for a rapidly-changing and uncertain world by providing them with the vital life skills of being able to think for themselves, to make wise decisions, to work with and treat others well, to gain the necessary and transferable skills, and to be good citizens. I value the support of our whole school community in this mission!

This has been a year of significant change in the way we have gone about achieving our aim of educating young people.

The introduction of the Restorative Justice approach has significantly improved conflict resolution. Teachers, parents and students have been educated in Restorative Practices, which focus on taking responsibility for behaviour and restoring relationships.

This year also saw the widespread introduction of the new curriculum based on the Victorian Essential Learning Standards for Years 7-10. This curriculum outlines student learning, providing standards in the traditional subject areas as well as the range of generic skills needed for effective learning. Teachers have been revising and developing courses to ensure this school provides educational programs that comprehensively deliver the curriculum standards.

A new state—wide reporting model was introduced this year to incorporate the VELS standards. The components of the semester reports have changed substantially and members of the school community are gradually becoming familiar with interpreting the new-look reports.

Our current curriculum has been reviewed this year. Staff have been involved in examining current research, visiting a number of schools and developing a future direction for the school. This process will continue into next year.

Change on this scale is always challenging. I would like to thank the staff for the professional way in which they have faced these challenges. Their commitment ensures that this school will continue to provide a rich, diverse and stimulating education for all our students.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS' PROGRAM 2007 — "THE YEAR OF THE PIG"

- Our Class of 2006 once again achieved success, with all Year 12 international students being given a tertiary offer in Australia, 21% gained an ENTER score over 90 and 58% scored over 80 a fantastic achievement after only two years in this country.
- Nineteen new students joined the Program during 2007, replacing the exiting Year 12s.
 Once again the students have represented a wide range of countries: China, Hong Kong, Taiwan, Thailand, Vietnam, Indonesia, Japan, Malaysia, Korea and Germany.
- Asian New Year, which fell on 18th February
 this year, is as important a time for Asian
 families as Christmas is in Australia. Our
 students find it hard to be away from families at
 this time and it is important to recognize the
 Festival and celebrate in style. A dumpling
 lunch was provided at school and a dinner for
 more than 40 students, staff, home-stay parents
 and friends was held at a Chinese restaurant in
 Box Hill.
- Mrs McKenzie and Mrs Stocker again visited Beijing and Shanghai in April, conducting extensive interviews with parents, discussing students' reports and general progress, and explaining the complexities of our education system! Several parents flew in from other regions to meet us and we were very aware of the concern from these parents about their

- student's welfare and safety, just as much as their academic progress. Fortunately on this year's visit Mrs Stocker managed to stay upright and there were no mishaps or broken bones!
- On the last day of Term 3 we travelled to Sovereign Hill in Ballarat, and students had plenty of chances to pan for gold, visit a gold mine and watch the pouring of an \$80,000 gold ingot. No nuggets for us, unfortunately!
- The September Moon Festival Assembly emphasised the cultural diversity of our school and showcased the talents of both Asian and local students in singing, music and drama, The added attraction was the amazing display of sleight-of- hand from a professional Chinese magician. He involved students in some of his tricks, and even at close hand it was impossible to see how the showers of rice suddenly materialised from a blanket!
- The 2007 International Student Award was won by Christian Chang, for academic excellence and participation in the life of the school. Worthy runners-up, with 'Honourable Mention' awards, were Danny Nguyen and Caballe Chau

 all these students have made a significant contribution to the life of Camberwell High School during their brief time here and we congratulate them and all our students for their achievements this year.

PEER SUPPORT PROGRAM

The Peer Support Program helps improve the sense of community within the school, fostering a friendly and supportive school environment.

In November, 78 Year 9 students were trained to act as Peer Support Leaders for 2008. Their role will be to assist Year 7 students to develop positive friendships and to integrate comfortably into high school. The Peer Support Program also helps all students involved develop life skills. It gives senior students opportunities for leadership and empowers them to be active participants while developing communication skills.

Next year there will be approximately 205 Year 7 students; they will be divided into groups of 8 or 9, each led by 3 Peer Support Leaders. The groups have already met, as they were involved in Peer Support activities on. Orientation Day. They were taken on a tour of the school by their Leaders, and participated in "getting to know you" activities. The Peer Support groups will meet regularly during 2008, and will participate in a range of activities that link to issues such as friendships, bullying, peer group pressure and so forth.

All these teachers undertook an intensive two-day training program themselves, prior to training the new Peer Support Leaders.




















YEAR 11 REPORT






Year 10 in 2007 was a watershed: we were nearing VCE and had the homework to prove it!





MELBOURNE PROJECT

Over a six week period in mid Term 4, all Year 9 students took part in the Melbourne Project, investigating the question: What Makes Melbourne Melbourne?. The project culminated in a spectacular exhibition and presentation of learning at Roundtable Day, involving parents, teachers and community representatives.

Over a three week period all classes had a 'Melbourne focus'. For example, in Science, students learnt about Melbourne CBD as a habitat for a variety of Australian wildlife; in Geography students learnt about the topography of Melbourne CBD and studied urban planning; in LOTE students researched Melbourne as a tourist destination; and, in English students learnt about features of

Australian English and Melbournian slang. Over the six week period, students also developed an Essential Question in an area of interest to them.

Students also took part in a fantastic three-day program in the city. They attended a variety of excursions, such as tours of the State Library, MCG and Victorian Arts Centre, a bike ride to the Docklands and a river cruise. While in the city, students also investigated their Essential Questions, working in groups. Some Essential Questions students investigated included: How has the land use of the Yarra banks changed?; What strategies are in place to support drug addicts and the homeless in Melbourne?; What makes Melbourne the Sporting Capital of Australia? In investigating their questions, students conducted surveys and interviews with the public and with experts in the areas being investigated, found primary and

secondary resources at the State Library and consulted their teachers and the school librarians.

At Roundtable Day students were given the opportunity to discuss their work and celebrate their achievements. At each 'roundtable', students presented their work to a family member, two other students and those students' family members, a teacher and a community representative. Community representatives included members of the Camberwell Rotary Club, program co-ordinators from other schools, Camberwell High School Council members and graduate teachers from Melbourne University. The school received very positive feedback from all those involved. The standard of work presented by our students was extremely high — Year 9 students should feel very proud of their achievements!

Camberwell High School has given all Year 7s a super-duper, wicked, cool, awesome, and fantastic start to secondary school.







































SPORT REPORT




ROOSEVELT **HOUSE REPORT**

The line flashes by, only one lap to go. Crowds to my right; dimly heard cheering, chanting, calling my name. Such sounds disappear as I power past, and are gradually replaced; throbbing traffic from that busy road, other runners puffing and grunting, noisy birds singing tunelessly in the trees. But these are not the sounds I listen to. No, I'm hearing the run. Every outside noise fades to mute as I listen to the simplistic song of my own creation.

My feet, pounding on the track like a strong back beat. My breath, it's timed; it rises and falls, like tiny crescendos, playing a tune for this running song. The sound of my clothes rubbing against flesh; soft, subtle, like a whispered lyric. Gradually my other senses add input, deepening the song. I smell the sweat: the rich, red earth of the running track as it bursts up into faint clouds that hang in the air for a transitory moment before my legs break through and onwards. I feel drained from love, looking at your silhouette, I have no ability to block you out.





GEOGRAPHY FIELDWORK



ACTIVE LEARNING IN THE REAL WORLD



Getting out into the wider community, through activity based learning in the field, is a central focus of Geography at years 9-12. Students in years 7-8 were introduced to a range of fieldwork skills, data gathering and analysis, within the school environment and their studies. The year 9, 10, 11 and 12 students took the skills they had learnt in earlier years, added and extended on these in increasingly more complex and larger scale exercises.

Year 9 - Cape Schanck & Organ Pipes

Fieldwork at year 9 expanded this year enabling students to experience two one-day fieldwork exercises in their semester course. The Cape Schanck fieldwork is based around the students' class work study of 'Coasts', and the Organ Pipes

fieldwork is based around the students' research on 'Volcanoes'. Both days introduced students to more active based fieldwork involving data collection and observation in the 'field'.

Year 10 - Walhalla

Walhalla provided a new location for the year 10 two day/night intensive Field Study camp, based on an investigation of the sustainable development of resources. The heritage classified ex-gold mining town provided many opportunities to investigate the tourism resources of the town, and evaluate their sustainability. All the town's resources are readily accessible by foot, enabling the students to spend a large part of the time working independently in small groups around the town.



VCE Geography - Mt Stirling

March this year saw the VCE Geography students [Unit I & 3] undertake their annual 4-day pilgrimage to Mt Stirling (where the `Man from Snowy River' was filmed] establish a base camp at 1330m amongst the Mountain Ash and over subsequent days carry out their respective fieldwork objectives. Unit I students spent two days venturing out to investigate and collect data on the `natural environment' of the mountain, noting changes brought about through natural processes and human activities. Unit 3 students collected data related to the sustainable development of the mountain and a future management policy for the

mountain. Other highlights included washing in the creek or, for some, the 'shower', learning how to use tea-towels, cooking, card games, discussions around the campfire and mountain evenings.

Year 11 - Hanging Rock

Second semester saw year 11 students venturing out to Woodend to investigate a rural community. Students divided into groups to carry out a survey of different 'zones' of the township. Lunch was a 'Picnic at Hanging Rock', after which the rock climb provided the opportunity to observe and record the rural environment between Woodend and the Rock.


Year 12 - Goulburn/Murray

CAREERS & PATHWAYS

REPORT 2007

Increased opportunities and resources in 2007 have again seen the Careers and Pathways programs at Camberwell High School improve to provide continued support and guidance for students in personal learning and career pathways, planning and education.

As in previous years, all Year 10 and some students from other levels were involved in MIPs (Managed Individual Program), which included an individual meeting with a pathways counsellor and preparation of a Pathways Plan. Year 10 students also attended an industry week, including visits to tertiary institutes and various industry locations, a range of guest speakers exploring pathways to further study and work. Other activities included exploration of careers software and internet sites, completion of OH&S certificate. A number of Year 10 students also chose to undertake Work Experience during this time and found the experience extremely rewarding.

Both Year 9 and 10 students attended the "Career Your Lifestyle" Expo presented by the Inner Melbourne Vet Cluster. Students traveled free of charge to the venue in South Melbourne and were given the opportunity to research and explore post-secondary careers and tertiary options. A huge range of employer and industry organizations, institutions and independent representatives were present, providing practical workshops, demonstrations and forums. The expo was most beneficial in helping students to begin planning for subject selection and pathways planning.

During the formal and individual course counselling for Year 9&10 students, both students and parents discussed with selected teacher counselors, subject options with a strong focus on post-secondary options and prerequisites required. It was very pleasing to see an increase in parents taking up the offer to accompany their children on counselling day.

The Senior School Information Evening not only provided important information for parents and students in Year 9, 10&11 about transition into the senior school but also gave them the opportunity to discuss careers and study options in relation to subject choices with industry representatives from Camberwell Rotary and representatives from tertiary institutions.

Now a yearly event, Year 11 students attended the National Careers and Employment Expo, collecting resources and exploring vocational options from a huge variety of industries, continuing to assist them in their pathways exploration and planning.

An extensive pathways program was organized during homegroup sessions for Year 11 & 12 students. This included a Careers Focus Seminar where students selected one of 14 invited

speakers. Discussion about previous planning and investigation into careers websites and software also provided the students with opportunities to develop a clear understanding of their aptitude and interests as well as setting goals to assist them in making decisions for the following year. They attended a wide range of events including tertiary open days and Careers Expos. Past students also assisted in provided them with an insight into the process of applying for courses.

Congratulations to all 2007 Year 12 students on taking the first step to further education, employment and/or training. Many students have planned well for their future and gained success. As well as 93% of all Year 12 students receiving offers from tertiary institutions some students are now in full time employment, apprenticeships and pre-apprenticeships.
