Principal's report 2009

This year again I have the privilege and challenge of summing up a year in the life of Camberwell High School in relatively few words, and it is never easy, particularly as this is my last Principal's Report. The school has this year undergone, as part of DEECD policy, an intensive and extensive self-evaluation and external review against the school's goals. The final report was extremely positive overall but we know we have some aspects to address. What is not at dispute is that Camberwell High School has a very good reputation, students achieve academic success, our enrolments remain high, the quality and work ethic of the staff is exceptional, and we are blessed with considerate and creative students and supportive parents, in a well-maintained and attractive learning environment. Best of all, our students are happy and feel safe here (at unprecedented levels when compared with state benchmarks), there is an academic focus with many highachievers, balanced by a lively culture enriched by music, sport, House activities, camps, tours, school productions, student initiatives, multi-cultural backgrounds and a delightful mix of traditional and contemporary events.

So, what were the highlights of 2009? School camps and overnight excursions were again a feature. Our Year 7s enjoyed their camp at Portsea, and many Year 8 students were part of the remote rugged and unforgettable Wollangarra Camps. The first Year 11 Camp in memory, held in Gippsland, was a great success, as was the traditional Year 9 Camp at Phillip Island. There were several music camps including to Merricks and to Ballarat (instead of Tasmania -the Swine flu shut them out) and to Mt Gambier. French students enjoyed their trip to New Caledonia in April. Year 10 Phys Ed students skied at Mt Buller in excellent snow, and Geography students camped in various rugged locales including Barmah Forest, Walhalla and Mt Stirling, Students involved in the next World Challenge



expeditions to Nepal and South Africa in 2010 are already fundraising and training.

House activities involved virtually every student and congratulations go to Churchill for winning the 2009 House Cup for overall excellence. The Swimming Sports were held in good summer weather unlike the House Athletics Carnival in April which was washed out in a spectacular manner, and finalised over the year! The Inter-House Performing Arts Festival (also known as the Chorals) in May gave the huge audience enormous pleasure, and the winning House was Churchill. We were all proud of the students' achievements as each House's performances were student led and organised, and impressive in their creativity and cross-age participation. Inter-House debating was of a high standard, with the Senior House debate won in front of the Senior School by Churchill.

Special events delighted us, especially the traditional observances and celebrations. Year 8s dressed in Medieval style, learned from and enjoyed Medieval Day, and staff dressed up too. Open Day again starred the student tour guides and student and staff demonstrations of skills. Wholeschool assemblies were dignified and student-focused as usual with strong leadership exhibited by School Captains Brittany Clark and Matthew Kerr, working with Assistant Principal Maureen Salter. Our ANZAC Day "service" was moving and engaging as always. Sub-school assemblies were also celebratory and lively. The guest speaker at the Robert Manne Lecture to Senior School was the charismatic Michael Carr-Gregg who was very well received. Also featured were guests for Literacy Week, the Asian Moon Festival presenters - our own International Students and a traditional lion -and students sharing achievements of individuals and groups. The Year 12 Formal was a source of pride for us and the owners of the venue: well done to all involved.

We celebrated many student achievements together: national prize winners in the Australian Maths and Science competitions, and Premier's Awards for Excellence, SRC fundraising



including \$5,000 for bushfire relief, the VCAL students' award from a regional body for their wonderful African Dinner which raised over \$4,500 for a village school in South Africa, sporting awards for the numerous teams and individuals who achieved at the highest level (including for Australia), the success of our many music ensembles at the Melbourne Schools Bands Festival, three Year 12s starring in the Top Class concert at Hamer Hall, the student work displayed in the Arts and Design Exhibition, the Year 9 Melbourne Project and roundtables, and much more. The many enrichment activities included Maths Enrichment, guest writers, excursions to university laboratories, research projects, inter-school debating, advanced use of IT, and competitions at national level. We were and are very proud of all students who did their best and who gave their time to their school.

Music concerts and recitals were magnificent in their quality and scope and our strings have reached new heights. The Beginner Band was of record size and held their world premiere in March. Our many ensembles gave us joy, and the Senior Stage Band won thousands of new fans via the 3AW broadcast from the school in August. Sport with our impressive range including rowing and lacrosse, crosscountry and golf, was again a feature of the year, and of inter-school sport was well-organised with students achieving across the board –and being "good sports".

The school community was engaged actively together in 2009 through information evenings, consultations about the school's strategic directions, special interest nights, the PFA and Friends of Music's Trivia Night, Year 7 Parent Network and social networking, and the Cabaret Night. Year 12 students, parents and staff were part of the heart-warming Valedictory Evening, and for families, staff

and high-achieving students from Years 7 to 11, the Presentation Night on December 1st was highly significant. It was wonderful to meet so many parents and to share their pleasure. Assistant Principal Isabelle McKenzie did an excellent job, with School Council President Glenn Ryan, in leading the whole-school community consultation process as we addressed the past and present and planned for the future of Camberwell High School via the new Strategic Plan.

The Parents and Friends Association (PFA) continued to work tirelessly for the school and highlights included the sit down lunch for 300 on Valedictory Day, suppers for all key events, and the second-hand booksale. Bobby Roberts, super-efficient secretary for many years, and Joy Sharp, have given their time and effort above and beyond the call of duty and I wish them time to themselves next year as they leave the PFA. School Council, ably led by Glenn Ryan, continues to be a great asset to the school as they oversee finances, buildings and grounds, and educational policies.

The staff of Camberwell High School continued to be a committed, hardworking and competent group of teachers and support staff, and I am proud to be one of their colleagues. Staff have worked also as coaches, offered extra classes, gone on camps (even over weekends), and have been caring and encouraging to their students. The new pastoral care program will continue in 2010 and it has assisted students to feel and to be even more connected to the school.

We have farewelled Paul Cuthbert, Daniel Kneebone and Andrew Savage, and earlier said goodbye to Brendan Kevans. Each of these staff has been an excellent teacher and leader, and they will each be missed very much. Our best wishes go with them, and with other staff leaving

after shorter periods with the school. CHS is blessed with Maxine Schmidt, an amazingly skilled Business Manager, and Assistant Principals Isabelle McKenzie and Maureen Salter who continue to display exemplary leadership skills and enormous commitment to the school and community. I thank all staff on your behalf, and mine, and in particular I thank the Leading Teachers and Isabelle and Maureen for their leadership, work, support, and for allowing me to gain undeserved credit for their innovative and enormously valuable work and ideas!

Finally, it is time for me to say goodbye and to thank all students, staff, parents and school community members who have made my fifteen and a quarter years as Principal of our school so enjoyable and memorable. It has been a privilege to lead this wonderful school, and I have not done it alone. I thank in particular former Assistant Principals Ken Tenner and Glen Linton, and Isabelle McKenzie and Maureen Salter for all they have given to me, shared with me, and for their loyalty and unique natures: I thank Glenice Porter and Louise Spencer for their invaluable assistance as my PAs, and Patricia Noseda and Maxine Schmidt for allowing me to sleep at night knowing the finances were in order! To all my friends at Camberwell High School - patient and kind students, understanding and generous staff, and encouraging and warm parents - I offer you my sincere thanks for your part in my life and career.

Camberwell High School remains in very fine hands and will go on to greater achievements...of this I am certain.

Unfortunately the untimely outbreak of the swine flu forced a last minute change of plans, and the tour was redirected to rural Victoria tour including Ballarat and Bendigo. The students were fantastic at taking this disappointment in their stride and made the best of the alternative plans.

Our Senior Stage Band headed to Mount Gambier for the annual Generations In Jazz festival in May. Our students were blown away by the amazing music they heard for the whole weekend, with the great James Morrison leading an exceptional group of educators and performers. The



band members are still talking about the experience and how much they enjoyed the weekend. One of the many highlights of the weekend was the selection of Zac Corrie in the Superband, a group made up of the 20 best players in our division.

Our music camps were held on the Mornington Peninsula this year. Never before have we experienced such a welcoming environment at a camp and the food was amazing. So much was achieved in a very short time and the students got a chance to see our great music staff in a more relaxed environment. Who could forget the Chicken Ripple Ice Cream? 
The Concert Band, Junior Stage Band and Intermediate Stage Band have all had a very successful year. The Intermediate

Now we are getting serious. Heads down.



Then there were the elections for leadership roles in 2010. Candidates for school captains, house, sports and arts captains and SRC plastered posters over the whole school and lobbied long and


hard. School captain nominees gave policy speeches to the Year 11 student body and finally we got to vote. We can't wait for the results to be announced at Valedictory Evening later this term.





We are ready and willing to tackle some more of High School!



Term 3, and the final results saw Churchill succeed.







Science Report

During 2009 the students at Camberwell High School were given the opportunity to participate in an exciting program of experiments and activities to increase their scientific knowledge including various excursions.

Year 12 students attended the Gene Technology Access Centre (GTAC) to perform experiments in hormones and chemical signalling, and Year 10 students to extract DNA from plant samples.

Unit 2 Biology students had an excursion to Toolangi State Forest to compare rainforest and eucalypt forest ecosystems and the impact of fires on such areas.

Year 12 Physics students attended Luna Park Physics Day in March. This project involved schools from all over Victoria giving physics students the opportunity to analyse motion by experiencing forces and accelerations from amusement park rides and then compare their calculations with the real-world values. Also students performing a unit on Sound went to the Alfred Brash Soundhouse interactive workshop to analyse sound from speech

(V.S.S.E.C) and performed the 'Mission to Mars' program. This included walking on the Martian surface, collecting samples for testing and running the control room for each mission. Also, Six students from year 10 science participated in an all day excursion to Gene Technology Access Centre (GTAC), where they completed a practical workshop on extracting DNA from plants, and attended seminars discussing insights into medical research. One speech was delivered by Honours student Sarah Best, a former student at Camberwell High School.

Year 9 students learned about water sustainability and the ecological footprint of Melbournians during the city project while exciting experiments such as 'Eat Ya Brain' were regularly performed.

In Year 7, the hands on experience of the Wild Action program took place in November. This involved the handling of native Australian fauna from the Melbourne Zoo and Year 8 students collaborated in teams in order to build fully functioning trebuchets during their medieval studies and tested them accordingly with great success.





Performing Art — Drama



















Creative Writing

Annie would not look at Luke. She swallowed a few times and minutes passed as neither of them spoke.


"Annie?"



Wollangarra






