In 1991, under the leadership of Principal Ann Rusden, the school community celebrated its Jubilee. Eighteen ex-students who have made notable achievements were chosen for the Hall of Fame. These leaders of science, literature, sports, music, academia and various other fields have left their mark not only on Camberwell High School, but on

# **Principal's Report**

We have commenced the 2018 school year with a busy schedule of activities. On Wednesday January 31, we welcomed all of our students back to school. The first week of Year 7 focused on the Learning to Learn program, followed by the orientation camp at Portsea. It was a pleasure to visit the Year 7 students at Portsea and observe a delightful, courteous group of students. Their willingness to try new and challenging activities was also evident throughout the camp.

We started the event at Camberwell High with photos and a tour of the school led by Yvonne Giltinan. # Alumni@Work

# Caitlin Wood (Class of 2008)

Caitlin was invited to present The Speaker's Award at the 2017 Arts, Technology and Design Exhibition. This is part of the speech she gave to the Year 12 students.

I would like to start today by acknowledging that this exhibition is being held on the traditional lands of the Wurundjeri people and I wish to acknowledge them as Traditional Owners. Australian Indigenous art is the oldest unbroken tradition of art in the world. The work that you have on show today tells stories and shows a journey of your own over the year, just like Indigenous art has for thousands

of years. And like most artists and designers there was a journey for me to get to where I am today.

Nine years ago, I was standing where you are today and I honestly didn't know what I wanted to do except that it was something creative. On my preference I just put down anything that I thought sounded good, and that lead to 12 or 14 interviews. Even after I was offered positions at several universities and institutions, I still wasn't convinced they were right for me. I then found the Brighton Bay Art Design and Photography program. It was a one year course that had nine creative subjects that started to shape my ideas and gave me the time to work out that I liked working with my hands, pulling things apart and dealing with 3D objects and models. After I discovered that, Industrial Design was the stand out course for me. I was accepted into Industrial Design at Monash University, deferred and took some time off to travel and work. Travelling opened my eyes to history and art that I had only ever read about. Being able to stand in front of iconic pieces of work like Mona Lisa, David, the Sistine Chapel and The Last Supper and visiting modern day influences like Bauhaus and the Guggenheim Museum confirmed that the creative field was for me.

When I first started my Industrial Design course I imagined being a

furniture designer, but by 3rd year we were working to briefs that had been given to us by REAL companies. My project gave me the opportunity to design for the Medical industry. For my Honours year, my project was to increase the retention of blood donors in Australia by making the process more appealing and less time consuming. Nine years ago I didn't know there were designers in the medical field. This year I'm working on a \$15 million problem to combat the 50% of Intravenous Lines that are put into patients, but are unused or cause infections.

You may have a clear path in your mind about what you want to do, or you may still be unsure, but either way, as you learn and develop through tertiary education or the school of life, those ideas will grow and mature as you do. You should all be very proud of yourself and what you have achieved this year.

## Vale Don Gibb: A Teacher Devoted to History

I first met Don about 6 years ago when I presented a talk to the Canterbury History Group.

I found out Don had been a teacher at my old school, Camberwell High, from 1960-1966.

Don was also one of the founding members of the Canterbury History Group, and had been the editor of the Newsletter, amongst other roles, for many years.

Don, a rower in his youth, had introduced rowing to Camberwell High in the 1960s, and under his coaching the school won its one and only Rowing title. I got to know Don fairly well over the years, as I attended the History group's meetings regularly, and was in awe of Don's knowledge of the history of Canterbury and beyond. As someone who spent most of his life there, he could reel off facts, and names in extraordinary detail. I can't begin to tell you how much knowledge has been lost with his passing. He WAS the Canterbury History Group.

Don's book, Visions of a Village, on the Maling and Canterbury Road shops, and their history, is a masterpiece and I have often referred to it. He was also a co-author of the recent publication, Remembering Melbourne. Again, a work of excellent quality.

Don, or should I say Mr. Gibb, I am really humbled to have known you. I learnt so much from you and will miss



# **Tributes**

#### Mary Hill (Class of '60)

Mary was a primary school teacher for 50 years. She spent 36 years at Park Hill Primary and had the joy and privilege of teaching 3 generations. She also taught music, choir, art, sport and dramatic arts. Her extracurricular activities included a love of theatre and motor sport. She was an enthusiastic member of the Victorian Mini Club for over 40 years and is remembered as a competitor, committee member, official and friend. Mary was a keen member of the Camberwell High School Ex-Students and served as a committee member and Vice President for over 10 years.



### Ron Huttner (Class of '61)

Ron attended Camberwell High School while his mother, Dr. Gisela Huttner was a teacher there. He studied Law at Melbourne University and spent his entire working life in the field of Law, starting with a position in the Crown Solicitor's Office where he became one of the State's leading practitioners in the field of Administrative Law. He was fascinated with technology and set up a mega internet site for lawyers



that was used by professionals around the world. Ron's other great interest was music, both playing and listening. He entertained African plutocrats in Accra, Ghana, after finding a grand piano which the resident pianist gave up for him when it was apparent Ron's piano skills were more advanced than his!

### Don Kerr (Class of '55)

For many years Don worked for Bob Jane, then became a Director of the outdoor advertising company Civic Guides until he retired. He was a member of the Rotary Club of Balwyn for 38 years. He joined in 1976, the



same year that the Balwyn Rotary Club established the Camberwell Sunday Market to fund a wide range of charitable causes.

Don loved cars and Rotary members were never sure if he would be at the wheel of his Merc 300E, Porsche, BMW coupe or precious Jaguar at 5am when they arrived to set up the market. He was a keen member of the Ex-Students Society, attending many of our functions including last year's end of year dinner.

#### David Wilson (Class of '56)



David became hooked on gliding when a workplace scholarship took him to the United Kingdom. He was studying welding technology when he joined a gliding club. He flew solo there and is one of few Australians to hold a British Bronze C. David became an experienced glider pilot, flying for 50 years, and regularly took part in regional and national gliding competitions in Australia. He was a former instructor and coach. His plane crashed in mountains in Otago, New Zealand. His death is a big loss to the gliding community.
