VALE - BRUCE ANDERSON

The passing of a dear friend and work colleague of thirty years has made for a very sobering year.

Bruce and Camberwell High School have been synonymous over the 33 years that he taught here as a PE teacher. Why did he stay for so long? The answer would be that he loved CHS – the parent community, his colleagues, but especially the students.

Bruce commenced teaching in 1961 and after three years at the PE branch and seven years at Glen Waverley HS, he arrived at Camberwell HS, where the school population was around seven hundred students. It certainly wasn't the size school he had come from, but for a flamboyant young man, who felt he was invincible, he had plans! He was an "ideas man" and used his considerable magnetic charm and personality to get his way!

Bruce had a genuine commitment to make CHS a school that offered great opportunities for students, and to fulfill this vision, he enlisted the help of the PFA body to fundraise. In those days, Camberwell High School had a gym the size of a shelter shed, so he set about raising funds through school fairs, where he initiated the AFL longest kick competition and floated the idea of a co-op. to help source this money. The sports hall we have today is testament to his efforts.

Bruce introduced the annual Robert Manne lecture in conjunction with the PFA, whereby a speaker is invited to lecture on an issue of relevance. He was co-ordinator of the school magazine, curriculum co-ordinator, and was Director of Sport at CHS for many years, and held the roles of Secretary, Vice-President and President of the Victorian Eastern Zone School Sports Association. He organized fundraising events for Challenge – a support group for kids with cancer, dressing as Leuc the duck, and was an active supporter of the library in their efforts to increase reading for Year 7's through the RATS (read a terrific story) program. He did this by dressing as an enormous rat; all of which he enjoyed immensely.

As a PE/Sport teacher he was dynamic and innovative. He created sport as a separate subject to PE, believing that the health, and social benefits of exercise were paramount to a child's development and created a life- long passion for exercise for many students. As such, the Education Authority from Canberra visited CHS in 1998 to see and model its innovative sports program. Camberwell High school subsequently won the inaugural Eastern Metropolitan Sports award for "Best School in Sport and PE".

"Ando" firmly believed that teaching should be fun. He was creative, loud, unorthodox and passionate; stood up for what he believed in, and was generous in praise and nature. He loved to mentor students and young teachers, inspiring them to be their best. This was evident by the wide range of current and ex-students who attended his funeral – many who wore their school shirt, emblem emblazoned over their heart, under their suit, as a sign of respect.

As a student said to me wistfully just after his passing, "Mr. Anderson and Ms. Warne were Mr. and Mrs. Camberwell. They always stopped and spoke to me and made me feel special. They were like parents to me." What better praise than that! He would have felt extremely proud and humbled.

We always remember the teacher who has had an influence over our lives. Bruce will live on in the memory of others for a very long time.

Principal's REPORTS

In preparing to write my report for Prospice, I looked back over the Newsletters produced for 2016. In lots of ways this made the task even more daunting. How do you summarise a year in the life of this school? The answer is that you really can't do it all justice in a few words. The quantity and diversity of learning experiences available to our students is extraordinary. So perhaps a better approach is to consider each term and some highlights.

Our year of course begins in Term 1 when students and staff return rejuvenated and ready for a new year. Headstart has hopefully put to rest any

anxieties about new subjects and we are ready to get started. Our new recruits in Year 7 had a Learning to Learn program and then set off for camp at Portsea. Our Year 12 students had Boot Camp at Melbourne University. Both camps are designed to establish foundations for a successful year.

Sadly in Term 1 the courtyard was fenced off and major work required which continued into Term 2 to restore our water services. This meant we needed to continue with our skills at adaptation and finding ways to navigate around the school without our courtyard.

In Term 1 we enjoyed a sunny House Swimming Carnival on 3rd March which was a wonderful whole school event enabling students to compete for their House. It was a fun filled day and was featured in the first edition of the CHS Project, a program produced by our students and published in each edition of the Newsletter.

Our new student leaders developed an action plan for the year and began implementing it. One of the outstanding ways in which student leadership was evident this year was through student leaders' work to build a respectful school culture. In Term 1 for International Women's day the students researched and selected a Ted Talk entitled Everyday Sexism for us to share in Learning Mentor sessions and organised a special Morning Tea for girls to celebrate International Women's Day.

The first visit to our new sister school in Normandy, France with 14 Year 9 and 10 students took place in the final week of term. Since this visit we have received four students from Lycee Thomas Corneille for a 6 week visit to CHS, who enjoyed homestay with our students and their families and 3 of our students are set to depart for France for a 6 week immersion experience in December and January. We also welcomed Principal Liu and 5

teachers from Suzhou No 10 High School in China for a visit.

In Term 2 Camberwell High School's 75th anniversary celebrations took place. We opened the school up for a twilight celebration on 6th May and welcomed back many ex-students for a special visit. The students participated in a fun run as part of the celebrations and to raise funds for the oval. Our Ex Students Laughlin Society President Yvonne Giltinan visited assemblies and we held a debate on the topic that 'Education was better in 1941 than it is today' and the affirmative team won. 75th celebrations concluded on 11th November with a gala dinner for Ex Students

at Wattle Park Chalet.

We were delighted to be able to open the Courtyard with its new additions of seating, synthetic grass and a built in BBQ. Work on restoring the rear wall of the Hall commenced and we were thrilled to receive a budget allocation of \$3.5 million to spend on improving the quality of the learning spaces in the school. A design and development team made up of 22 staff and students has been hard at work this year, visiting other schools and considering ideas to improve C and D Buildings.

One of the most exciting events of Term 2 was our musical; Aida. Once again our dedicated team of directors put together an outstanding show which enabled students to shine. It was a wonderful way for our school community to come together. We saw all of the dispositions for learning including collaboration, resourcefulness and persistence on show and we were entertained at the same time.

In Term 3, Years 9, 10, 11 and 12 students were busy considering their future pathways. The tertiary

expo and Information evening was an outstanding event which enabled students, parents and educators to engage in important dialogue about subject and careers choices.

We were delighted to work in collaboration with PFA to host an evening for our parents with presenter Maree Crabbe. This very well attended event sponsored by the PFA enabled parents to hear from an expert in the field on an issue of significance to them. PFA continue to work as outstanding supporters of the school in many and varied ways.

Cabaret Night at the Spotted Mallard in September was another example of collaboration between parents and the school which enable extraordinary opportunities for students. Friends of Music enabled our instrumental ensembles to provide an evening of wonderful music in a professional setting. It was a sell out and a wonderful showcase of our music program which has featured many times this year including our mid-year and end of year concerts. Our students are fortunate to have such a high quality program and dedicated teachers.

Term 4 commenced in a flurry of activity farewelling our Year 12 students and fortunately reuniting us with a full sized Hall with a repaired rear wall. Our Year 12 students were able to complete their exams, followed by Years 10 and 11 students. We finished the year welcoming our 2017, Year 7 students and families and providing a head start to students by moving everyone up to the next year level.

Despite my best efforts, I don't think I have done justice to the year in this report. It has been a great year and we have so much to be grateful for at CHS.

Assitant Principals' REPORT

This year Camberwell High School celebrated its 75th Anniversary. Our Ex-students Society (CHESS) held a celebration early in Term 2 and a dinner in Term 4. This has sparked many reflections from our current and past students about aspects of school life that have endured and the many differences.

Aspects of school life that have endured are the values and the school motto "Disco Consulere Aliis", learning to be considerate of others. Both continue to underpin the ethos of the school. Our values of Respect, Responsibility, Creativity and Achievement were as important when the school opened as they are today. Throughout this year there have been many assemblies and curriculum programs that have reinforced both our motto and values. Another aspect of school life that has endured is the development of leaders amongst our students. This year students have had the opportunity to travel to France, China and Vietnam, and we have hosted visitors from China and France. The Year 8 Sustainability Camp was introduced this year and enabled students to live on a working farm and develop their understanding of environmental issues first hand. The diversity of the curriculum and the choice provided to students was also the envy of our past students.

This school acknowledges its past, celebrates its present and seeks to prepare students for their future. Today as in the past all that happens is a school year is because of the passion and commitment of the staff and the willingness of its students to embrace the opportunities provided.

Term 3 saw students reflect on the changing workplace and their own interests and future goals. They used this information to influence their subject selection and presented this to their parents in a course counselling interview.



"A Letter from the Gold Fields in Ballarat" by Christine Chen, CHS Language School 2016.

The life here is a bit hard for me. I can only sleep in the tent at night. Sometimes it can be extremely cold. I usually have bread for meals. Gradually, some butchers have opened, so I have meat for meals from time to time. But I really miss the meals you cooked for me before. Also, I've made some new friends. Some of them are from America, some of them are from France, the others. are from Italy. And most of them are Chinese. They are all friendly to me. During the day, I get a lot of work to do. All of us wake up before the sun rises. Then we start our work. I use the tools to dig holes. If you are lucky, you'll find gold. Then, you need to wash them and dry them up. But sometimes you may find nothing even if you spend the whole day digging. You can put your gold into the bank which is next to our living places. The bank will save the gold for you. In case we miss any gold, we need to pick out gold from the dirty mixture which is picked up from the lakes. I have a good command of picking out gold, so people may ask me for help when they can't find gold from the mixture. I'm glad to help them. What surprises me is that some people dig in the mine which is 80 metres under the surface of the ground. It's dark inside and there's a lack of oxygen in the mine. It can be really dangerous.




Year 12 Art and Design Exhibition










































Humanities & English

As we move towards implementation of the Victorian Curriculum in 2017, teachers in the Languages and Humanities Teaching and Learning Team have worked extensively in collaborative teams, focusing on the design and development of curriculum that emphasises ongoing skill development and making explicit the connections between year levels and subjects over time.

This important work has led to the development of many new Learning Sequences across Years 7-12 and the use of extensive moderation processes to evaluate existing Learning Sequences. Moderation has enabled teachers to be able to continuously reflect and focus on making future improvements to activities and approaches employed in teaching and learning.

All of this has led to a variety of exciting opportunities for students to explore the worlds of Languages and Humanities.

Students in English subjects have used a variety of provocations to explore and discuss important global themes including power, racism and acceptance to name a few. Students have engaged with a wide range of texts, including short stories, persuasive texts, memoirs, poetry, books, films and plays. They have also had the opportunity to engage

with texts on a deeper level by hearing academics and even the authors themselves speak about the texts and key messages contained within. This includes excursions to ACMI for the Year 12 students studying A Separation and a visit from Michael Gerard Bauer, author of The Running Man for Year 8 students. Students in the senior school studying the elective Storytellers' Workshop also engaged with members of the local senior citizen community to create some thoroughly touching digital memoirs as part of our Living History Project.


In our Languages subjects of Chinese (Mandarin) and French, students have explored the rich worlds of language and culture through a variety of topics, including family, shopping, sports and tourism. Students investigate the specific language related to each topic, but also the cultural differences and anomalies that exist between Australia and countries where the languages are spoken. Many of our languages students were lucky enough to put their language skills to the test, with students from Years 9 to 11 travelling to both of our sister schools (one in Normandy, France and one in Suzhou, China) as part of our exchange program and China Challenge. In addition, students were provided further opportunities to understand and

connect with other languages and cultures when Camberwell High School hosted students from both of these schools in Melbourne over the course of the year.

In Humanities, students have spent their year investigating the world of the past, present and future using inquiry learning methods such as asking questions and using research to discover a range of possible answers. Students have investigated a wide range of history topics ranging from Ancient China to popular culture post-1945, geographic issues such as water use, urbanisation and food security and explored how individual citizens, businesses and governments are all connected as players in the game of economics and are all responsible for creating cohesive societies. Many of the topics used real-world experiences to further engage students, including exploring the past through the ever-popular Ancient Civilisations Day for Year 7 students and Medieval Day for Year 8 students. Furthermore, students in Year 10 Business Management found news ways to develop their entrepreneurial skills through the running of their own social enterprises whilst a smaller group of keen Humanities students worked in collaboration with schools from all around Melbourne to generate a global solution to the refugee crisis as members of the Model United Nations Conference.

Thankyou to all the staff in the Languages and Humanities team in 2016 for their hard work and dedication, ensuring that students are provided with many different opportunities both in and out of the classroom to engage them further with the exciting world of Languages and Humanities.



At the state finals, Angus Streat finished 7th in the 16 Boys 50m Breaststroke. Griffin Bohn came 4th in both the 200m and 50m Freestyle events and 3rd in the 100m Freestyle and our 13 Boys 4 x 50m Freestyle Relay team consisting of Will Drew, Oscar Dutton, Hamish Langford and Petro Pirozek claimed the bronze medal.

Term 2 saw the various levels of cross country competition which concluded with the State Finals at Bundoora Park in which Dior Dimitrievski, Lachlan Senior, Maxim Bishev, Luca Di Donato, Liam Carter and Tom Hart all represented Camberwell. Dior finished 19th in the 15 Girls 3km run, Lachlan placed 18th in the 15 Boys competition with the 15 Boys

team of five runners placing 7th overall in the teams event.

The Camberwell High School Athletics Carnival at Doncaster Athletics Track was our second major inter-house sports carnival for the year. After a day of remarkable runs, throws and jumps, the results came down to the wire with Macarthur just trumping Montgomery for the win. Three of our top athletes progressed through to the State Track and Field Championships at Albert Park in which Tom Graham finished 5th in the 16 Boys High Jump, Axel Woods won a bronze medal in the 13 Boys 100m sprint and Hugo Lane finished 5th in the 13 Boys shot put as well as winning a silver medal in Discus.

2016 was another successful year for a range of sporting teams with our Intermediate Boys Hockey team, Senior Boys Baseball team, Intermediate Boys Baseball team and the Senior Boys Netball team all representing Camberwell at the State Finals after winning Divisional and Regional events. A special mention also to the Year 8 Boys Netball team who represented Camberwell at the State Finals in the All-Schools competition.

The two most amazing team performances of the year were from the Year 8 Boys Hockey team and the Intermediate Boys Netball team, both becoming Victorian State Champions. In the State Finals, the Year 8 Boys Hockey team had comprehensive wins and

defeated Wodonga 4-0 in the Grand Final. The Intermediate Boys Netball team defeated Wonthaggi 18-14 in a tight contest in the Grand Final. The calibre of teams at State level is exceptional so to defeat the best teams from all over Victoria is a phenomenal achievement.

I would also like to acknowledge the contribution of many Year 12 students who have excelled in various sports throughout their time at Camberwell High School. Furthermore, student success would not be possible without the support of the fantastic team of teachers here at Camberwell High School who willingly give up their lunch times to train sporting teams. I would like to thank Fiona Howson, Drew Smith, Justin Sharp, Melissa Worth, Jessica Rankine, Meg Harper, Emily Saynor, Nic Troitzky-Pelletier, Melissa Whitaker, Brenton Murphy, Brendan Carrick and Andrew Phelps for all of their hard work and support throughout the year. Finally, I would like to acknowledge the dedication of the Camberwell High School students. Their enthusiasm and genuine love of sport is what makes our school's sporting program so successful. We are all looking forward to continued success in 2017.

















2016 has been the year of students demonstrating excellent perseverance and consolidation of knowledge and skills both within the HPE classrooms and the sporting arena. This has led to significant growth and achievement levels in the classroom and representing Camberwell High School as individuals and part of teams in Interschool Sport. The outstanding success at Division, Region and State levels are a testament to the dedication and passion of our sport staff and the commitment and talent of our students.

The junior PE classes started the year making strong links between their own fitness levels, physical activity levels and the importance of physical health in their daily lives. They have continued to develop their skills in various ball sports, invasion games and striking sports. These skills and knowledge were developed further in their sport classes, combined with a strong emphasis on collaboration, sportsmanship and the tactical/strategic aspects of the sports.

All Year 10 students completed units on First aid, the body systems and developing and implementing a training program in PE classes. These units not only assisted in building the foundation for future VCE PE students, but also provided students with valuable life skills. Students that completed Year 10 elective classes developed their coaching skills, analysed sports performance and participated in excursions outside the school, which related their theory work to various community recreation activities such as surfing, rock-climbing, trampolining, bubble soccer and wheelchair

basketball. VCE PE students completed rigorous study design courses including looking at the body systems and the various adaptations of the body, physical activity levels of individuals and the wider community, biomechanical principles and a big part of the year 12 PE program was designing, implementing and developing a training program, which saw some excellent results.

The foundation of the health curriculum is built on the three health dimensions; social, physical and mental. Students have developed their understanding of the interrelationship between these dimensions in various engaging topics and activities across Year 7, 8 and 9 such as Healthy Lifestyles, Nutrition and Personal Identity, Safety, Puberty, Community Health, Sexuality and Reproduction, Mental Health and Risk Taking and Harm Minimisation. An important theme throughout all our learning sequences and incorporated in to every lesson is Respectful Relationships and educating our students on these core values.

In senior Health classes, students were fortunate to be involved in many valuable experiences such as; the DAX excursion which focused on developing empathy via an advocate to raise awareness of mental health; Salvation Army homelessness schools program; The Mercy Hospital for developing a deeper understanding of the prenatal developmental phases; and an incursion which involved a speaker from the Step Back Think Foundation to raise awareness of alcohol related violence in youth. In Term 3 the resilience of the Year 11 Health and Human Development



students was tested as they accepted the parenting responsibility of looking after and attending to the needs of a virtual baby for 24 hours. A challenging, yet highly rewarding experience for them all I'm sure.

It has been a busy year with numerous developments across the curriculum and one with many successes. In conjunction with the 75th Anniversary celebrations, the HPE team organised the inaugural 'Run for the Oval' event that students across the school participated in. It is very exciting to know that the development of our new oval facilities will be starting late in 2016 and ready to use in early 2017!

Maths & SCIENCE

This year in Mathematics and Science our students have launched rockets, examined snowflakes, dissected hearts, determined heights of trees, grown bacteria, investigated curves, built Rube Goldberg machines, created images using equations, played games, and performed countless experiments and investigations to explore the magic of the world through the eyes of a mathematician and scientist.

This exploration has been supported with many opportunities for students to consolidate and share their knowledge and experiences and develop their learning dispositions.

Some of the highlights for 2016 include:

- Year 11 Psychology students exploring the ethics of animal experimentation and collecting qualitative and quantitative data on the behaviour of monkeys during a visit to the Melbourne Zoo.
- The introduction of the new Year
 10 Patterns, Proofs and Geometry elective where students investigate mathematical problems through experimentation and validate their findings through a peer review process.
- The Year 12 Biology students attending BioSciences at University of Melbourne to work in small groups, with a research scientist, to investigate recombinant DNA technology and separate fragments of DNA using gel electrophoresis.

- Frank Zhe (Year 8) and Jason Li (Year 10) both receiving prizes for the annual Australian Mathematics Competition, which places them in the top 1% of the state. Well done boys!
- Year 9 science students taking on the role of teachers to create presentations for Year 5 students from Canterbury Primary, focusing on tectonic plates and how they affect and control the structure of the Earth, from Deep Sea Trenches and Volcanoes to Tsunamis and The Pacific Ring of Fire.
- The Year 7 students visiting Melbourne Zoo to investigate habitats, ecosystems and adaptations.
- Year 12 Chemistry students undertaking analytical experiments at University of Melbourne using either HPLC, Gas Chromatography, UV/ vis Spectrophotometry and Atomic Absorption Spectroscopy.
- Jeff Wang of Year 8 achieving a perfect score on the Australian Mathematics Challenge for Young Australians.

As well as organising these wonderful learning experiences, the talented and hardworking Maths and Science team has been very busy developing creative and challenging CATs and SACs, exploring innovative ways of teaching and assessing, and unpacking and implementing new study designs for VCE Mathematics and




























This year has been a busy year for the Arts & Technology students. They have had opportunities to exhibit their work, participate in competitions and show their showmanship in the musical.
