After last year's pioneering work, the first full-scale CHESS breakfast for VCE students was held in the school hall on Wed. July 29. Some fifty CHESS members and 75 students shared orange juice, cereal, toast and coffee while the ex-students shared their work experiences with the present ones, passed on some tips about how to fight their way into the outside world, and offered continuing advice over the difficult months ahead. The comments afterwards were positive, Principal Ann Rusden and careers advisor Sean Hill were warm in their praise, and the St. John's Children's Homes at Canterbury benefitted by the donation of the unused supplies of breakfast goodies.

Music: After a most successful joint concert with Canterbury Girls' Secondary College (Mangarra Road) in the Great Hall of the National Gallery on June 29th, preparation is now well advanced for two other notable events:

Participation in the South Street Competitions at Ballarat over the weekend starting Friday Aug. 21,

in which the Stage Band, Concert Band, String Orchestra and Concert Orchestra will all take part, and the now-annual trip to Sydney by the Choir to sing at the oldest Church in Australia, the Garrison Church at the Rocks, at the Battle of Britain Commemoration Service.

A.V.G. James Lecture; In the tradition set by speakers like Senator John Button, Justice Michael Kirby, Dame Leonie Kramer, Professor Kwong Lee Dow and the schools own historian Robert Ewins, this year's lecture will be delivered by Professor Barry McGaw, Director of the Australian Council for Educational Research. His very timely topic will be "Pathways to Tertiary Education". The lecture evening is held at the School, at 8p.m. on Tuesday Aug. 18. Questions will follow, and so will supper. Ex-students are very welcome to attend.

Science; 136 Students from CHS were entered in this year's Australian Schools Science Competition, with no less than 52 of them being awarded certificates, which included 28 Distinctions, 23 Credits and 1 Certificate of Achievement. The Distinction level ranks its winners among the top 10% of science students in the state.
