PLAYING POOL

The Camberwell Central Swimming Pool, situated right next to the School and scene of your youthful triumphs (including those aquatic), was closed by the municipality late last year, as an economic imperative. This came as a shock to us, so we set forth in deputation to the administrator of the City of Camberwell, Mr. Des Bethke, to plead a case for the School to be given permission to restart the furnace in the pump room so the facility would be available for our students' sporting and cavorting inclinations. Mr. Bethke was not prepared to allocate any of the ratepayers' money to the pool, but granted a licence to Camberwell High School, educators and swimming pool operatives, to operate the facility, hereinunder and without prejudice designated as "pool".

Thanks to the indomitable efforts of parents, students and staff, the pool has been operational from the beginning of the academic year. We are very pleased with the precision of the lawn mowing, the chemical balance of the water and the smooth functionalism of the change rooms and the toilet areas. We will enter into further negotiations with the municipality before the licence expires (or we do, always imminent with the additional workload demanded by the pool).
