

PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

It gives me great pleasure to announce that Petro Georgiou, Federal Member for Kooyong, rang me last week to say that our submission for funding to upgrade our classroom music facilities had been successful and we will be receiving \$101,000 from the Federal Government for this purpose. The outcome for our classroom music students will be enhanced beyond just the improved spaces, as there are elements such as sound recording facilities also included in the plan. On your behalf, we thank the Federal Government for these funds.

You may have seen the recently published list, in the newspapers, of the destination of the Year 12s of 2005 for each school. Camberwell High School has 64% of our 2005 cohort actually enrolled at university, which is an excellent figure and places us in the very top government schools. Given our open-entry policy, our commitment to VCAL and to giving students every opportunity, no matter how they performed academically in earlier years (not the case in many schools), this outcome is even more meritorious. Again the quality of our teachers is endorsed by this outcome.

The 1956 Matriculation Class of our school held a reunion of their 50th year since leaving CHS. Organiser Tony Giblett located 52 of the 55 students from all over Australia and 45 of them came back to school. Five 1956 teachers attended also! Our School Captains and many students met them and the day was delightful. The female Head Prefect was photographed with Cara Casiano, and House Leaders with the ex-students in each House. Only the front building



was here in 1951-56 and the grounds were very different. Some 'luminaries' in the group include Brian Blythe (Spotless), John Brown (the legend of Tennis Australia), John Macarthur (Hawk's 1961 Premiership Team), Don Seedsman (Antarctic leader), Professor Graeme Cox (eminent molecular biologist and Fellow of the Academy of Science) and athletes Neil Twitt and Nicola Donkin. All visitors enjoyed their time here and loved the welcome from the present students and the appearance, facilities and successes of their/our school today. I would be thrilled if the Class of 2005 were able to return with great pride to whatever CHS is in 50 years' time - but reaching their potential as students and citizens will thrill me just as much!

Some words from our School Captains, Simon Kershaw and Cara Casiano, who spoke at the Open Evening Gathering on May 9th:

Cara: "....Whether your child wants to be a scientist, lawyer, philosopher, businessman, film maker, musician, actor or writer, Camberwell High accomodates to all. We are encouraged to think for ourselves. We are never force fed, but always helped when help is needed. This attitude of do it yourself adds to the culture of this school. The culture that gives us....a home and a very good education."

Simon: "....I think the main difference that sets apart public schools such as Camberwell High is the freedom to be an individual...even emphasis on the individual doing all they can to succeed in whichever way they wish...Camberwell High will not mould your child into a narrow standard of success. It will offer them the chance to discover what it is they wish to be in life."


CHESS Treasurer's Report (an annual satirical piece by Neil Bouvier)

CHESS FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - 12 MONTH PERIOD ENDED 10 APRIL 2006

In one of the biggest surprises in CHESS history, we had a huge turn-up at our opening meeting in February, but that up-turn took a u-turn at our AGM. Unfortunately, there was no carry over from that inaugural Incorporation meeting and so we had the normal roll-up of the usual suspects ie. just

committee members and no others. So my suggestion is that we have bi-monthly Incorporation meetings as that topic seems to attract exstudents (we had 10 extras that night) rather than trying to go a meeting to get some one to come on board (read "dobbed in") and become the next Treasurer.

I have moved interstate, worked 120kms from the CBD, lived 10 suburbs away and tabled 25 resignation letters but they (the President & the rest of the committee) have still tracked me down. I'm currently watching re-runs of the Fugitive and following Jack Bauer in "24" to get some idea of aliases and learning to become evasive and nonconformist like I was in the old days as a student at CHS. So lucky me I'm in the job for another year and I think I'll follow the President's lead by being overseas each meeting - mind you in Bernard's absence the meetings have been going like clockwork and we are down to only committee member nodding off, eh, Laurie?!!.





So with that rivetting preamble and the pulling out from the records the CHESS cheques the President didn't use to fund his overseas junkets (don't worry I've got John So and So from the Melbourne City Council looking into it), I'll now present the CHESS results.

There was a surplus of \$1,003 for the year with total receipts of \$10,634 exceeding payments of \$9,631.

The main revenue items were Subscriptions of \$6,500, Donations \$2,354, School Song Proceeds \$200 and Reunion Income of \$1,550.


Total costs were made up of Printing \$1,403, Postage \$1,204, Bank Charges \$263, Incorporation \$53, Webpage and Newsletter Updates & Hosting \$1,104, Membership Administration \$805, School Song Recording Costs \$2,515, Re-Union Expenses \$ 1,969 and Sundry Items of \$315.

One of the highlights of the past year was the recording of the School Song and we are now on target to cut a few CDs free of charge for financial members and the choir on the day. I was not able to attend that session as I'm still receiving therapy after Churchill knocked off the Macarthur Madrigals in the 1973 House Choral festival. We are now hopeful to have these CD's in this mail out as we have been diligently clearing 24/7 the backlog from the president's in-tray which at one stage rivalled the latest planned Grollo Tower in height.

It was surreal to be walking with four policemen in shorts, with security earpieces, plus the three police motorcycles in front of us – one rider hi-fiving the onlookers! Sirens, flashing lights...and a BIG (heavy) baton, lit up like a lighthouse. Tom was the lovely, young man who handed it over to me (he'd bravely supported his mother during her fight with breast cancer so there were pink balloons everywhere amongst the green gums.)

It's an interesting experience also, in terms of meeting up with the other community runners in the Waverley Women's Sports Centre just prior and learning of their contributions to society and sport. We all gave a short talk on ourselves - Nicole Richardson, the Olympic netballer and

softballer lead our party. We had other former athletes there, plus youngTom, and also runners belonging to major Sponsor companies. A big group hug, Aussie Aussie Aussie Oi! Oi! Oi!, hopping in to the van with lights going and loud Shannon Noll's LIFT blaring, then we joined the police convoy and went through a guard of honour made up of young netballers. WOW!



They dropped us off at signposted places in the road, park (for me) and the roads leading out up the hill. And we waited. My children all hugged me, though son number two looked a bit bewildered by the people and noise. Then, the motorcade came up the path....Tom and I met for a hug and photo, then I held the baton aloft (remembering to hold my thumb glove in place to trigger off the sensor within the baton) and off I went at a cracking pace. I'd ticked 5 minutes in the application form for the 500 metres so it was F-A-S-T. I was worried that I was going to drop it as my failing grip reminded me of my carpal tunnels! But I made it. Hopped into the bus behind the retrieval convoy (wondering who had used the obligatory ambulance in it) and as we were progressively picked up during 'the

mop-up', we did hi-fives out the windows! I saw mums from Lachie's kinder and Holly's primary school. My cheeks were sore from grinning. My husband gave me a lift back to the picnic area and I had a celebratory glass of plonk with my family, who really enjoyed the day. Number one son just LOVED the police sirens and lights. His autistic obsession is police and security! Perfect. Debs :-)


Your funniest school memory?


A bit about me.....






So that's my life.....if you ever want a holiday, feel the need for a hamburger or ever get sick or injured...come and see me!!!!

The Canberra chapter of Chess has had two functions so far this year. The first was a barbecue in February at the home of Gaye White (Goodson). We were fortunate to welcome Ian & Joy Woonton for the first time and hope to see more of them in the future. Ian was at CHS from 1954 to 1959. (ie a 'golden era' graduate). It was a fearfully hot day, even for a Canberra summer, but we all survived and enjoyed our usual good time.

Then on 18 June we gathered at the Australian War Memorial for a guided tour of the "War and Sport" exhibition. (which has now finished) with lunch afterwards at the 'Chill' Restaurant in the suburb of Campbell nearby. I have an acquaintance who is a trained guide at the War Memorial and arranged for him to give a us a tour which highlighted some of the more unusual aspects of the exhibition. 1956 INAUGURAL MATRICULATION CLASS (YEAR 12) REUNITES


On the 19th and 20th May, 2006, forty of the fifty-four students of the school's 1956 inaugural year 12 class, together with five of their teachers*, were reunited in what transpired to be an emotional and meaningful event. Only three of the remaining students could not be traced, six could not attend due to ill health or unchangeable prior commitments and unfortunately five had died.

The reunion was spread over two days and consisted of three phases. On Friday the 19th May participants gathered at the school and after re-introductions over morning tea, Principal Elida Brereton formally welcomed the group and gave an interesting thumbnail sketch of the evolution of the building and educative changes at the school since 1956. Bernard Corser addressed the group on aspects of the aims of C.H.E.S.S. after which Tony Giblett on behalf of the 1956 students presented the Principal with a certificate evidencing a donation to the school of \$1595 for purposes yet to be determined. There followed a 'retake' of the 1956 class photo on the front steps, then a light luncheon in the Brereton library.


