
be a commitment of time and money for CHESS. Barry Garnham a student of 1949 has pledged \$2000 to the project.

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

Jennifer Barnett (née Forse) (CHS 1962 - 1965) passed away in the Black Saturday bushfire at Steels Creek.


> Elaine Margaret Hatfield (née French) (CHS 1950 - 1954) passed away 27/2/2009




Which teacher inspired you at CHS?




