



PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Camberwell High has conducted many successful camps this year for students - Year 8 stayed at Wollangarra, all of Year 9 stayed at Phillip Island for three action-packed days, the Year 10 Geography camp/field trip was at Anglesea and our Senior Stage Band has just returned from a Music Tour to Mount Gambier. For the first time in many years, I visited the Year 9 camp on Day 2 without my colleague Glen Linto who is not very well at the moment, but despite that, I joined in activities and was impressed by the willingness of our students to participate fully in the camp's formal and informal activity sessions.

Taryn Anderson came 3rd in a Rotary public speaking competition. Congratulations also go to Caleb Berry who has just been chosen to be a member of the Under 18 Victorian Basketball team! Twenty-five of our French students recently visited Noumea and were able to practise their French language skills to good effect in this part of New Caledonia. Well done, students and your caring and competent teachers for reflecting well on yourselves and the school. And also another Well Done for all who participated in our whole-school event, the House Athletics Sports, held on the last day of Term 1 and won by Roosevelt.

Congratulations go to Campbell Wiggins of 7A for his selection into a national baseball team which played teams from Japan in March, and also to classmates, James Smith and Kento Hagino, who are members of the prestigious Australian Boys' Choir, selected to sing in Japan.

During the last days of Term 1, Glen Linton represented CHS (and Victorian education) in China and Hong Kong, visiting other important agencies, and meeting families



and prospective students. School Council also endorsed a "flying" visit to Vietnam in the first week of the holidays by Isabelle McKenzie and me, in which we met agents, Australian Consulate staff, and the parents of our seven VCE students from Vietnam, to whom we gave Interim Reports and verbal updates. Isabelle and I benefited from Camberwell HS's excellent reputation in Vietnam, built up by Glen Linton's work and by the high quality teaching our Overseas Students (and all students) receive. The UK, USA, Singapore, Canada and Australia are all competing for the top Vietnamese and Chinese students, so our trips to Asia are invaluable.

On ANZAC Day a marching band comprising experienced musicians from CHS and Camberwell Girls GS participated in the official ANZAC Day parade to the Shrine. Trained by Kathryn Cooper, the band acquitted themselves well and the students found the spirit of the day to be a wonderful and real force. Congratulations! The whole school participated in the ANZAC tradition through a General Assembly organised by AP Isabelle McKenzie and involving student leaders in a dignified presentation about the national day that was well received by the large audience.



CHESS FINANCIAL STATEMENTS – 12 MONTH PERIOD ENDED 11 APRIL 2005

To try and give the impression of a greater than normal attendance, this year's AGM was held at a pub. The background atmosphere of pokies, counter meals being announced over the loud speaker and drunks being thrown out was somewhat contrary to the normal AGM ambience of a phone box. Despite all these distractions the AGM proceeded with the highlights being the Treasurer's Report (as per below) and as they say on Survivor all committee positions were back up for grabs. Unfortunately I forgot to hand back my Immunity and so at Tribal Council I was not voted out. After 12 years of "winning" reward Challenges of doing Treasurer reports and I being the sole Survivor in this riveting gut-wrenching job, I'm happy to hand in my torch. Unfortunately the \$1 million offered by the President has not materialised. To be fair the President, Bernard, and the Secretary, Pat, were also not voted out after even longer tenures so this whole saga is getting more like castaways on Gilligan's Island rather than Survivor (where the people actually get off the island). Total costs were made up of Printing \$631, Postage \$512, Bank Charges \$292, Catering/Meetings \$382, Webpage and Newsletter Updates & Hosting \$1,044, Computer Monitor \$150, School Gardens \$500, Reunion Expenses \$3,491 and Sundry Items of \$146.

CHESS REUNION FOR ALL PAST STUDENTS AT THE KELVIN CLUB HELD ON 8 OCTOBER 2004

Following last year's proposed Black Tie Dinner Dance at Leonda generating the same amount of interest as the CHESS Treasurer's position, the Committee decided to hold a Dinner night at the Kelvin Club on Friday 8 October 2004. It was advertised in public notices, CHESS newsletters, on CHESS website, on an advertising board placed on the front of the school in Prospect Hill Road and Crimestoppers. The charge for all exstudents was at the very reasonable price of \$69 a head and in the end it was attended by 50 people. The revenue raised on the night was \$3,174 and expenses came to \$3,491 so a loss of \$317 was recorded. We did enjoy a stirring rendition of the school song and it's currently being reworked so as to be sung by the Committee on Australian Idol.

Behind the song

My copy of "School of our Youth" has a story. Miss Cameron remembers very clearly organising the printing of copies so that every student in the school could have a copy. She told me that they made every effort to find Egan and Hallett to acknowledge their part as the composers.

In Robert Ewins book, "A Jubilee Perspective," we learn a little more of the story. "The foundation Senior Mistress, Miss Brigid ("Dolly") Egan, retired in 1950 and was warmly farewelled at the Speech Night when the School Song which she had written was sung for the first time." Mr Hallett is also mentioned in the book. "The school orchestra was first formed in 1950 as the result of "the combination of Miss Walkers' enthusiasm, Mr Andrews' benevolent interest and Mr Hallett's experience." Mr Hallett was also the accompanist for the orchestra in 1951 and the orchestra performed at numerous functions throughout that year. Miss Cameron was the music teacher from 1959 to 1964. I followed in her footsteps and became a Director of Music in schools as a result of what she did for me at Camberwell High School. Last year I found her.

She is living in Balwyn Manor and at 95 years of age is the Honorary Administrator of the Chamber Strings of Melbourne, an elite student orchestra she began 25 years ago. In January, she took the Orchestra to Russia and Europe for a three-week performing tour.

I was really delighted when I found that she was still alive. I visited her with a letter I had written, telling her about the impact she had had on my life. I told her how my former headmaster believed that I would never matriculate. My parents, Aubrey and Joan McLaren, made a brave decision and decided to take me away from Strathcona and send me to Camberwell High School. I had to go back into Year 9 for two terms to catch up on French and Maths. Somehow Miss Cameron found me. In Year 10 I became the Junior School Pianist and then in Year 11 she invited me to conduct my whole house, Montgomery, at the Choral Festival. In year 12, I continued leading the school as School Pianist and conducted the House choir. We won with 73 out of 80 for 'Carry me back to Green Pastures.' I went on to study music at the University of Melbourne and Miss Cameron gave me my first posting at Box Hill High School. She thought it would be good for those young men to have a young woman around! I have continued to conduct choirs throughout my career and still love it.

Miss Cameron had a profound impact on my life. She enabled me to share my gifts and skills in the school community and I felt valued and affirmed. Throughout my professional career as an educator, I have continued to use that model as an example and sort to encourage student leaders to contribute to the life of the school. I still have wonderful memories of those Choral festivals in the Hawthorn Town Hall and treasure the music books personally inscribed with Miss Cameron's tidy writing. Each week when I go and sit at her table and assist her with the Chamber Strings, she thanks me for coming and I thank her for the privilege of working with her again. I know there are others who benefited from her encouragement and chose music teaching as a career-Frances Monsborough (Watt) and Margaret Spong

(Firth). Margaret and I were school pianists together. We both graduated from the Conservatorium and then taught at Box Hill High School. She was my bridesmaid.

Occasionally, Phil and I still sing the school song. We started going out in years 10 and 11 in the days when you didn't talk to each other in the yard. There was that imaginary line down the quadrangle. We first talked at Speech Night at Hawthorn Town Hall in 1964. After 40 years we can still sing:

Dear Mrs Johnson

Firstly may I congratulate you on 'Chess Moves'. I have been out of Victoria for many years and consequently have lost touch with my old school friends.

Secondly, I would, with some trepidation, comment on Barry Garnham's 'Reflections of our Founder' (March 2002)

There was a previous CHS ex-Students' Association formed about 1950. Certainly it only lasted a few years, but it was long enough to have a lapel badge made. For interest I enclose a photocopy of it. Meetings were held in the High Schools Club, which was in Flinders Street, near the old Port Jackson Hotel.

A further point I would make is to fully support the comments made by Barry, relating to school traditions. I well remember Mr. Dave Satchell talking to my year (in 1947? 1948?) on traditions and the need for them at CHS. His main thrust was that, as the school was in its formative years, it was up to us, the present students to start the traditions which, if nurtured would be accepted and give us strength and guidance to future years of students.

How well we succeeded (or failed) to form traditions can only be judged by the present and future students ie. 50-plus years on.

Three years on from when Barry wrote his article, I can only say that his words and sentiments are as true today and will remain so.





News from the Canberra Chapter

The Canberra Chapter has had a number of functions since I took over from Fred Roberts in 2004. These include a barbecue in May at the home of Thelma & Bob Bell, and in August a lunch at Lamberts Winery at Wamboin. "Where?" did I hear you say? Wamboin is a settlement or community tucked away a few kilometres from Queanbeyan and about 20 km from Canberra. It is a semi-rural area with most houses on 5 to 10 acre blocks on rolling hills (why are hills always rolling?)

Some may think May is very late for an outside barbecue in Canberra, and yes, the weather was cool. However we had a sunny day and sat outside, out of any

wind, under Thelma & Bob's wisteria-covered pergola and enjoyed the filtered sunshine. When it got cool we went inside and admired Bob's hand-made Rocking Horse. Bob is a very handy handyman and makes rocking horses from time to time. We learnt quite a bit about the secrets of their manufacture.

Lamberts is a new winery which opened to the public only in January. It is very modern and is set on the side of a hill from where you can look over their vineyards and parts of Wamboin. The restaurant serves very good meals and wine tastings can be done on the spot in the same building. We enjoyed a very pleasant and relaxing lunch with some very enjoyable wines. (Our next get-together will be at Lambert's on July 10th.)

We also had barbecues at my home in Melba in November and another in March at Lyn & Eric Turner's home in Hackett, where we enjoyed sitting in the shade of their large shady trees, perfect for the warm autumn days.

There are about 30 ex-CHS students that we know of living in Canberra and surrounding parts of NSW. However not all wish to take part in our functions, and others find it difficult to come to Canberra to join us. Many people may be wondering how and why we Canberra members have moved here. Most of us are, or were, Commonwealth public servants or members of the Defence Forces and were moved or posted here as part of the job. Some of us, such as myself, came here in the late 1950s or early 1960s as part of the large-scale transfers of the Commonwealth Public Service to Canberra at that time under the Menzies governments. Others took up university appointments, generally at the Australian National University, as Canberra is a well-educated community with an extremely broad range of educational skills and interests. Yet others came later for various reasons, including ADF or Foreign Affairs postings. We are a pretty diverse lot in experiences, occupations and interests. So we have established families and put down roots here and have now become "part of the furniture".

Most of us enjoy living here because it is a good place to bring up kids, the climate is invigorating (bracing in winter), there is no smog, road traffic is light except for brief peak periods, and nothing like Melbourne, Sydney, etc traffic. Despite the 2003 bushfire disaster and the current drought, living conditions are healthy and pleasant. Also, most of us still have family in Melbourne and enjoy travelling there a few times a year when we can cope with the traffic in small bursts. Yes we do miss our families in Melbourne (and elsewhere) and not being able to see them more often but, of course, absence makes the heart grow fonder.
