Hello Fellow CHESS members,







CHESS Treasurer's Report (an annual satirical piece by Neil Bouvier) CHESS FINANCIAL STATEMENTS – 12 MONTH PERIOD ENDED 31 DEC 2006



In one of the most talked about subjects doing all the rounds of the financial markets the incorporation of CHESS went through last year. The CHESS incorporation was clearly one of the pivotal events in Australian corporate highflying history rivalling the demise of Ansett Airlines (I remember the ex-student who was MD). Following the incorporation, the books have to be cooked for a calendar year,

ending with an AGM still within the normal April time frame. So I now have to report on activities, or more accurately non-activities, from 1 January to 31 December each year commencing with 2006.

Before I go through the transactions, I'll just go on the yearly spiel that at an AGM there are committee positions available and it's not a statutory requirement that the average CHESS committee age is 73. So if you are keen and went to CHS within the past three decades and come from an accounting, school bursar or tuck-shop, embezzling, whitecollar crime background I'd be happy to relinquish my role as Treasurer. There are some lerks, despite the honorary role, like having pizzas with the occasional salmonella sauce and getting to sign cheques for the president with no back-up or explanation and get a

"Sign this blank cheque, will you?". No I shouldn't alarm you all the outgoings are accounted for and we let him chair the meetings with his parole officer present.

There was a loss of \$2,512 for the 2006 year with total receipts of \$9,270 exceeded by payments of \$11,782 leaving a balance in the bank a/c of \$3,395 at year-end with Subs for 2007 of over \$2,000 come in since. The main Revenue items were Subscriptions of \$4,140; Donations \$1,795; School Song Proceeds \$0; Badge Sales of \$125 and Reunion Income of \$3,210. Total Costs were made up of Printing \$1,247; Postage \$1,406; Bank Charges \$261; School Council \$600; Webpage and Newsletter Updates & Hosting \$900; Membership Administration \$600; School Song Recording Costs \$2,661; Re-Union Expenses \$ 2,839; Badge Costs \$915; Incorporation \$53 and Sundry Items of \$300. You will note that we have made a lot of up-front payments for badges and school song CDs and hopefully we will start to raise revenue on the sale of these items subject to the president's over-zealous benefactor deals.

Which teacher inspired you at CHS? Mr Jack Foster.


Your funniest school memory?

Playing In Form 5C, 1957, "D.P." was the classroom clown. He was also an energetic schemer, who went way too far on one occasion towards the end of year. I can only assume that he had a day off early in the week in order to telephone businesses from home.

Next day, Form 5C was in the first floor schoolroom slightly above and left of the main school entrance. Around 11am, "D.P." (who has a window seat, starts getting excited when a concrete mixer pulls up at the entrance, followed soon after by a milk delivery, a florist and a nappy wash van!! I'm sure there were other trucks, etc, as well, but the memory fades.

Needless to say, the form teacher would have twigged somewhat that "D.P." was the ringleader, having caused not only the mirth in the classroom but chaos in the school driveway.

As I recall, "D.P." escaped expulsion but was told not to re-enrol for 1958!

What school house were you in?

Macarthur.

Your favourite sport or, conversely, what sport did you try to get out of?

I really enjoyed school sport, especially football and cricket. Later in life, I joined two other CHS graduates (Colin McKenzie and Bill Goodenough) as Life Members of the Camberwell Magpies Cricket Club.

But my favourite memory was representing the school at Olympic Park in the 1958 100 yards hurdles; it was the first year that the school had contested hurdling and as the good athletes were not interested, I learned and trained hard to get into the event.

What did you do on the last day of school? (we won't tell the police)

Along with Don Collie, Peter Gallus and Bob Morrow, my last day (in 1958) occurred four days ahead of schedule! With HSC exams well finished, our last week was shaping as a non-event. On the Monday, the four of us took half a dozen bottles of non-alcoholic "Burnley Ale" to school and were consuming them with our lunch when we were rudely interrupted by the Vice Principal, "Tich Tynan"; we must have been dobbed in by the young tackers!







"Tich" was a short, dumpy man about 50yo, with hair well-groomed by "Brylcreem".

Sadly, he did not believe the "Burnley Ale" labels and we were found guilty of misconduct and requested to clear our lockers and not return.

Who was your best friend at school?

Don Collie, with whom I continued our friendship until his untimely death at age 27. My second son, Trevor Donald, was christened in memory of my good pal.

Did you have a crush on a classmate?

In year order: Sandra Hodge, Janice Bond, Verna Hills, Hilary Savige, Julie Key. I don't think that any would be embarrassed!

What classroom prank can you recall? (we know nothing)

Yes, without question. It gave me the opportunity to acquire leadership skills with a degree of confidence at such an age.

I've had interesting correspondence with James McGregor (CHS 1976 – 1979) and, with his permission, I have printed his letters to me in this Chessmoves.

Well, what can I say about my time at CHS! I was in a very clicky group of guys (Greame Law, Tim Kortschak, Adrian Caulkett) and we were quite nerdy although I was always in trouble for fighting with guys like Robert Gagliardi and Dean Lakatos! We were practical jokers and used to set up practical jokes all over the school although the science room was the favourite place to set traps up!

Lunchtimes were spent playing volleyball or smoking down the back of the oval! My maths teacher was Miss Bluett who I now believe is involved in the VTU in some capacity. The only form teacher's name I remember is Mr Demunk.

I left at the end of year 10 due to a broken leg (from playing aussie rules) and held temporary work at Box Hill Butchers before joining the Australian Regular Army in 1981. I have served as a full time member since this time and have achieved the rank of Warrant Officer Class One, which is the highest rank obtainable for enlisted soldiers.

I have seen operational action in East Timor in 1999/2000 and Iraq in 2003/2004. Due to security implications I am unable to state further employment details over email.

As for the photos, the Army one is a few years ago and was taken at 7 BDE HQ in Brisbane (I was only a Warrant Officer Class Two in that pic), the school photo well, what can I say, I believe I was being punished (hence me having to sit near the teacher!).

I am returning to Melbourne in a few months on posting to Point Cook and I look forward to visiting CHS.

As for my friends (and enemies) I have never been able to meet up with any of them since leaving school, maybe a reunion of some kind should be in order (30 years).

As for the practical jokes, the best one I remember was heating up 10c pieces on the bunson burners just before the end of science class and then when the bell went, tossing it out in the hallway for some poor unsuspecting student to pick up, and then drop very very quickly! A bit mean in hindsight but very very amusing at the time!

Another favourite was to get the pods from some local plant at the time, its name escapes me now. However, the pod had a very pungent sulphur smell when water was added. These were used in a myriad of places from teachers' desk draws, students blazer pockets, schoolbags etc etc.

As for army life, it is a lifestyle in itself. My early years were spent playing with plastic soldiers and tanks. And playing army with my friends, setting ambushes on each other etc. I guess I was always destined to join! I do love the mateship and the teamwork aspect of the profession and of course the job security. The mandatory retirement age is 55 however, I have already served enough time to obtain a full pension so I guess I must love it to be remaining in.

My career pathway has mainly been logistic management however on operations I was required to be involved in numerous Close Personal Protection (CPP) tasks or bodyguard tasks in other words. The principals I looked after

included the then Chief of the Defence Force General Cosgrove. Places visited during these tasks included Kurdistan (which is a separate state within Iraq). That's about all I can really say about that for security reasons!


Just a question, how do you manage to contact all the ex students when you are arranging a reunion? Must be a big job as I have not been able to make contact with any of my ex class mates!

What happens when I send in an old CHS photo?

I do look after them! Digital archiving of the CHS photo (and news cuttings) collection involves high resolution scanning (300 dpi) into .tiff files, which are then kept as detailed copies of the original photos. These photos are then cropped and reduced, saved in .jpeg format, which is optimal for web viewing (as photos are quickly displayed with reduced KBs). So there are two copies of each photo - one a large detailed copy and the other a reduced size version for the website. Each photo is easily identified with the year and an abbreviated detail on the subject....such as the photo below ofr Form 1A in 1945. It became 1a1945. The football team on page 6 is 57 foot. All photos are in year folders.

And how does that photo get on the website? These jpeg photos go onto their individual web pages, all with our distinctive green background and often

These jpeg photos go onto their individual web pages, all with our distinctive green background and often writing underneath with identifying names or captions. (The issue of privacy has reared its head here so class photos from the 70s onwards have names cropped for the site)

Each photo webpage is linked to a main year webpage; the chain continues to a decade webpage...the idea being that a few clicks will get you immediately to the year and class/sport photo you need.

I bought a special transfer program (CrystalFTP) to upload the individual photos and webpages to the server, who hosts our site and fortunately, at home, we have a fast cable broadband service. When I first started it was dialup which took a long time! Plus I use an excellent HTML program to create my webpages.

What backup is there?

The original digital photos are backed up on a separate hard drive on my computer and also on a Maxtor external hard drive for preservation/safety reasons.

There are 3 CD sets of the original tiff files - one at the school. The idea being that tiffs last but jpegs have a lossy' problem and deteriorate over time, even on CD (as shown to me by a photographic expert in the Herberton Camera Museum). So, it's a good idea to keep jpeg photos on your hard drive as well!

The school CD has enabled CHS to easily access old photos and incorporate them into powerpoints and magazines without having to access the brownbuilt storage cupboards in the locked and dusty 'storage' room. The minimal handling also preserves those treasured originals in the archives.

VALE - Valentine (Val) James Pyers OAM

Val Pyers was a well-regarded English teacher at CHS in the middle to late sixties, who had a deep interest in choral music, even adjudicating our massed singing at CHS Choral Festivals. Many CHS

students, including myself, remember him with affection.

tte was an outstanding musician and a leading figure in choral music - honoured for founding the Melbourne Chorale in 1965, of which he was Musical Director till 1993. (The Melbourne Chorale is now the foremost choral organisation in Australia.) He then went on to found and conduct the Victorian Chorale. I had the fortune to see him conducting the Melbourne Chorale at the Myer Music Bowl and I'm sure that there are many other CHS students with equally fond memories.
