

Memories – Frances Monsborough (née Watt) CHS 1958 – 1961 (Montgomery House)

I'm still tripping over Latin at every turn. Are you? Of course you are, didn't you know?

Everything from a fax to an ultimatum, whether you drive a Magna or a Maxima. Whether you are into Optima or something else, you hardly set foot outside without colliding with some more Latin.

The acacia longifolia is coming into bloom, the prunus is doing its thing and the hibiscus has a special surprise in store.

Time to get some fire into the ignition – "Brrrrmm".

Quick decision: to negotiate the junction or go via that freeway. (Never on a Saturday, especially if it's Hawthorn v. Melbourne.) Traffic ad nauseum and the clock is ticking over! Tempus fugit! Always did, always will, I suppose.

Latin has been a passion of mine since Dr. Ballus at Mont Albert Central School in 1956, when he settled in Melbourne following the Hungarian Revolution, and introduced young Aussies to the intricacies of Latin. At Camberwell High School Year 9 it was Miss Dooley, the headmistress, who carried the flag as we ploughed through "Latin For Today".

I was dragooned into French in Year 9 and carried both languages through to Year 12. Unfortunately, simultaneous timetabling prevented me continuing with French at Year 12 beyond about Term 1, when the Headmistress, Miss Mac, discovered my occasional presence in the back row and decreed that it could not continue. I hope the school has a more enlightened approach for language enthusiasts these days!

My choice of music for tertiary studies put Latin on the back shelf till Dip. Ed., when the Music graduates had to find an extra subject to satisfy Dip. Ed. Requirements. So Latin came to the fore and I enjoyed teaching practice rounds at University High School, St. Catherine's and MacRobertson Girls' High School, where both Music and Latin were taught to Year 12. What a privilege.

Appointments as a secondary school music teacher followed under the vision of Miss Cameron for a state whose high schools were fully staffed by qualified music teachers. Her several years as Music teacher at Camberwell High School were inspirational for four students that I know of, including myself. Who could forget Handel's "Hallelujah Chorus" for Speech Night 1961 in the Hawthorn Town Hall with a choir so invigorated by the rows of senior secondary boys that Handel must have done a wriggle in his grave in far-off Germany? "Song of Shadows" by Armstrong Gibbs and "O Bome Jesu" (in Latin!) from the Renaissance, were other features of the repertoire. My privilege was to be the school pianist that year. I remember that my piano teacher, Max Olding, now of Queensland, did a double-take when I took the copy of "Hallelujah Chorus" to my piano lesson for a bit of help with the handfuls of notes in the piano part. But, graciously, he gave me the assistance I needed and encouragement to "lay into" the loud sections.

Miss Cameron went on to be Lecturer in Music at the Secondary Teachers' College and spent many years preparing the next generation of school-music teachers for their demanding role in Victorian secondary schools. Her infectious enthusiasm was needed. The transition in emphasis from choral to instrumental experience for students in state secondary schools was happening rapidly and Camberwell High was one of many schools that took up the new musical emphasis with the exciting results that are still seen today.

The joy of teaching Latin in secondary schools recommenced in 1987 when we moved with our four children from northern Victoria to Kyneton, and were associated with Braemar College for 14 years as a staff member and as a parent – a school in a unique mountain environment where 'snow on the lower ranges' in the early-morning weather forecast means the school buses can't get up the road from Woodend and school is cancelled for the day.

My teaching load was 50% Latin to Year 12 and 50% Music for many years, and now having returned to Kerang district in northern Victoria, I have the options of private piano students and correspondence Latin students, plenty of each. Theological studies many years ago gave me a solid dose of Greek (60 AD to 110 AD) as used for the New Testament documents, and I'm hoping to find a few students for this fascinating study also. The mechanics of the languages are so similar that it is not difficult to move from one to the other (similarly, Hebrew and Arabic).

So the solid grounding received at CHS in the 1950s has certainly lasted through to a new century and a new millennium. (Latin for 1000 years)




