Jubilee Hall of Fame 1991

In 1991, under the leadership of Principal Ann Rusden, the school celebrated its' Jubilee. Eighteen ex-students who have made notable achievements were chosen for the Hall of Fame. These leaders of science, literature, sports, music, academia and various other fields have left their mark not only on Camberwell High School, but on modern Australia and the world. In 2018, Principal Jill Laughlin invited the committee of the Ex-Students Society to update the Hall of Fame so that it will continue to inspire current and future students.

Jubilee Hall of Fame

1943~1952

Marie Collier
Opera Singer
CHS 1941-1943

1943 First solo performance, playing Kate in Mont Albert Choral Society's production of Gilbert and Sullivan's *The Pirates of Penzance*.

1951 Trained at the Opera School of the National Theatre.

1954 After a number of lauded performances in Australia and further touring in Milan, Marie makes her international debut at Covent Garden, London.

From her international debut in 1954, Marie's career as a soprano saw her enchant audiences around the world, with noted Australian opera critic John Carpenter describing her as the most flawless singer to come out of Australia. Her greatest strength was her versatility, even in the range of productions she featured in during her time as the Principal Soprano at the Royal Opera House, London, from 1954 until her untimely death in 1971.

Jeffrey Dunstan
Educator and Educational Administrator
CHS 1948-1950

1948-50 Arrives from Mont Albert Central School and becomes heavily involved in cricket and his house choir at Camberwell High School.

1951 On recommendation from CHS Headmaster Roy Andrews, becomes student teacher at Canterbury State School.

1953 Top male student at Ballarat Teacher's College.

Once described as "vigorous and erudite" in a suit, Jeffrey examined a vital leadership role in Victorian education over 40 years of change, faithfully serving 13 Ministers of Education. He held a variety of positions across the state.

In this time, authored two important books on educational administration, received a PhD from the University of Wisconsin - Madison, and was the recipient of numerous awards before retiring.

Neville Duff
Architect
CHS 1948-1952

1951 House Captain of Maclester.

1951-52 Member of both the 1st XVIII Football and 1st XI Cricket teams, becoming Vice Captain of the cricket team in his senior year.

1952 Becomes Prefect. Runs the MGA in the inter-house sports and breaks the record.

1964 Completes Diploma of Architecture at RMIT.

Distinguished and determined in his time at Camberwell High, it is little wonder Neville achieved his scholarly ambition of becoming an architect. His designs have shaped spaces around Australia and the world, with many tertiary institutions, commercial enterprises, healthcare providers and recreational facilities bearing the products of his expertise. After many years working at prestigious firms he became a sole practitioner.

1954~1957

Kwong Lee Dow AO AM
Academic and Emeritus Professor
CHS 1950-1954

1946 After a short career as a high school science teacher and university chemistry lecturer, Kwong joins The University of Melbourne.

1978-88 Dean of Faculty of Education.

1998-03 Deputy Vice-Chancellor at the University of Melbourne.

2003-04 Vice-Chancellor at The University of Melbourne.

Professor Kwong Lee Dow's long career in academia saw him rise over 40 years from a secondary school science teacher to Vice-Chancellor at the prestigious University of Melbourne. Throughout that time he has also been a consultant for governments both here in Australia and overseas. His dedicated work in the field of education saw him appointed Member of the Order of Australia in 1984, and an Officer of the Order in 2012.

Lyn Casey (Dudley)
Prominent Classical Singer and Educator
CHS 1952-1955

1955 Awarded scholarship to Melbourne University Conservatorium.

1957-58 Dux in her second and third years of study.

1961 Graduates with Bachelor of Music (Honours).

1963 Starts teaching secondary and tertiary level singing.

1967-98 Becomes Director/Professor of the Melbourne Conservatorium.

With a passion for music driving her, Lyn had a distinguished career as a musician, teacher and administrator. For many years her singing voice could be heard across ABC radio, in many film and advertising spots, and often in the finals of important competitions. She taught throughout her career as a singer and continued after, becoming Director of the Melbourne Conservatorium in 1987 until her retirement in 1998.

Alan Schwab
VFL and AFL Commissioner
CHS 1955-1957

1955 Captain of Form 3D in his first year.

1956 Joins 1st XI Cricket team as a 16 year old, and in 1957 in the team's first season.

1956 Joins 1st XVIII Football team, where he plays for the remainder of his schooling.

1958 Becomes junior clerk at the Victorian Football League.

After high school Alan left the forty field to focus on the game's administration, where his great energy helped reshape the sport for the modern era. Beginning his career at the VFL, he moved up the ranks to St Kilda and Richmond.

In the 1960s and 70s before returning to the league as a senior administrator. He later became the Executive Commissioner of the new national league, the AFL, before passing away suddenly in 1993.

1957~1959

Barbara van Ernst (Cooke) AM
Music Educator and Mayor
CHS 1953-1957

1958-59 Completes Trained Primary Teacher Certificate at Burwood Teacher's College.

1960-72 Primary and secondary teacher, simultaneously completing a Bachelor of Arts where she won top music student prize in first year, and a Bachelor of Education at Monash University.

1992 Completes a PhD at La Trobe University.

Barbara has promoted music education in Victoria through teaching, adjudicating, and her involvement in several important advisory committees on the arts. She was also Mayor of Hawthorn Council from 1988-89, and again in 1991-92. She has since returned to academia, becoming Deputy Vice-Chancellor of Swinburne University, Lilydale, in 1997 and Professor Emerita in 2008. She became a Member of the Order of Australia in 1994.

Graeme Cox
Molecular Biologist
CHS 1952-1957

1954-57 Member of 1st XVIII Football team. Vice Captain in 1954, Captain in 1957.

1955 Member of 1st XI Cricket team. Becomes Prefect.

1956-57 Oryx Age Athletics Champion.

1961 Completes a Bachelor of Science at The University of Melbourne.

Degree an apparent athletic streak, Graeme would go on to complete a PhD in Biochemistry in 1967. In the same year he was appointed a Research Fellow at the Australian National University, eventually becoming Professor in 1991. His research interests focused on the molecular biology of membrane proteins involved in ion channels, and in energy production. He was elected a Fellow of the Australian Academy of Science in 1990.

Graham Morris
Public Sector Manager
CHS 1956-1959

1958 Form captain, captain in winning 1st VIII crew at Head of the River Regatta.

1959 Prefect and Progress committee member, captain in winning 2nd VIII crew at Head of the River Regatta.

1961 Trains at Burwood Teacher's College.

1965-72 Completes a Bachelor of Science, followed by a Bachelor of Education at The University of Melbourne.

What Graham described as "a love affair with moon and mountains" began in 1970, when the Department of Education asked him to begin an education service for schools at Melbourne Zoological Gardens. The innovative program was a world leader, and Graham's career continued on this trajectory, managing, among others, the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park and Hadwells Sanctuary, before becoming Director of the Museum of Victoria in 1995.

Academic and Computer Scientist
CHS 1957-1960

1959 Oarsman in the 3rd VIII rowing squad
1960 Oarsman in the 2nd VIII rowing squad
1964 Graduate Bachelor of Science at the University of Melbourne with First Class Honours in Physics, going on to complete a Master of Science in 1966
1970 Complete his Ph.D. in Theoretical Physics at The University of Melbourne



Ray's work has varied significantly over his long career but he is best known for his pioneering work on computer programs capable of modelling complex biological and medical systems. In 1991 Ray became a professor of

Applied Biomathematics at the University of Queensland. He now holds the position of Emeritus Professor. He has published over 400 articles in Biomedical, Agricultural, and Methodological areas of Scientific Research.

Barbara Evans (Fletcher)

Gymnast and Biologist
CHS 1957-1960

1959-60 While still a student, becomes Australian Women's Gymnastic Champion
1960 Member of Senior Choir Madrigal Choir and Sports Captain
1964 Represents Australia in gymnastics at the Olympic Games in Tokyo
1966 Competes at World Gymnastic Championships



After an acclaimed career as a gymnast, Barbara was 'drawn to the mysteries of biology' going on to complete a Ph.D. in Zoology at The University of Melbourne in 1976. She joined the academic staff, rising in the process to teach

and co-mentor three prize-winning Biology teachers. Between 1997-2007 she was Dean of Graduate Studies and Pre-Vice-Chancellor, and in 2011 was named one of the top 50 current and emerging female leaders in Australia.

Robert Burton

Surgeon and Professor of Medicine
CHS 1955-1960

1960 Wins Camberwell High Chemistry Prize
1960 Wins Victorian First Class Honours in Chemistry, Second Class in Physics, receives Commonwealth Scholarship
1970s Graduate B.Sc. (1970), Ph.D. in Medical Biology (1977) and M.D. in Surgery (1978) at The University of Melbourne



Robert has had a long and distinguished career in medicine both in Australia and abroad. He was a physician and surgeon for 25 years, the recipient of numerous distinguished honours and research grants, and is the author of over

200 scientific papers. From 1995-2002 he was Director of the Cancer Council of Victoria, and has consulted on cancer control in over 20 developing nations since then. He has been a professor at Monash University since 2006.

Glenys Nall (Beasley)

Athlete and Teacher
CHS 1958-1961

1958 Record-breaking times in the U15 75 and 100 yard races at the Metropolitan High Schools' Sports Association Carnival
1959 All High Schools champion in 75 and 100 yard runs, Victorian schoolgirls U16 100 yard champion
1960 Wins a League Award for best news documentary for his Four Corners report on the Oak Coal Company
1961 Wins a Commonwealth World Sports plaque



Discovered by the early 1960s press as 'our best racing prospect since Betty Cuthbert', Glenys left her track on Camberwell High through her incredible displays of athleticism in individual and relay sprints. Only a year after completing

Year 12 she represented Australia at the 1962 Commonwealth Games in Perth, where she won gold as part of the women's 400 yards relay team. She later became a Senior English teacher at Kingswood College, and a small business owner.

Paul Lyneham

Television Journalist
CHS 1957-1961

1963 Editor of the Australian National University student newspaper, *Womani*
1969 After completing two cadetships, Paul joins the ABC radio but soon moves to television news
1970 Wins a Logie Award for best news documentary for his Four Corners report on the Oak Coal Company in Queensland



One of Australia's best known political reporters of the television age, Paul lived to see he had an "addiction" to journalism. He cut his teeth on student papers in high school and university, and then with cadetships at *The Australian* and

Cadence Times. In the 1970s he worked with the Seven Network and later rejoined the ABC, where he found national recognition as *The 7.30 Report's* federal political correspondent. He passed away in 2000.

Journalist
CHS 1958-1961

1959-61 Member of the Prefect committee, becoming co-editor in 1961
1961 Becomes Prefect and Dux in Humanities, receiving First Class Honours in English Literature, British History and Modern History
1965 Receiving Bachelor of Arts (Honours) from The University of Melbourne



Sally spent about 20 years as a journalist, 16 of those at *The Age*. In that time she held a variety of reporter and editorial roles, and was a federal vice-president of the union, the Australian Journalists Association. Throughout

her career she was committed to bettering journalism in both Australia and the developing world. In 1987 she became a lecturer at Deakin University, then at RMIT. She has written three books and co-authored a fourth.

1958-63 Wins a number of awards, exhibitions and scholarships, and becomes a Prefect
1963 Earns distinction in final year as Dux of Humanities and co-editor of *People*
1967-70 Secondary school teacher across Victoria
1975-79 Complete Ph.D. thesis on post-war Australian fiction at The University of Melbourne



Literary critic and editor, Helen was a passionate champion of Australian literature throughout her career. She was a regular book reviewer for *The Age* for many years, a

hand booker, and author of three books of criticism and hundreds of articles. In 1984 she entered the public eye as editor of the *Australian Book Review*, a post she held until her sudden death in 2000.

Robert Manne

Public Intellectual
CHS 1960-1965

1964-65 Campaigns for extension of extra-curricular activities beyond sport and music, particularly the establishment of a Students Representative Council
1965 Co-editor of *People*
1965 'Top Humanities student, with Exhibitions (first place in Victorian British History and European History
1969 Wins Shell Scholarship to study at Oxford University



Although never 'entirely comfortable' with the term, Robert is considered one of Australia's most notable public intellectuals. He has written or edited some 20 books, was editor of *Quadrant* from 1989 until 1997, was a professor

at La Trobe University for nearly 60 years, and has been a regular contributor to the ABC. The *Mosley* and numerous other publications. In 2012 he retired from professorship to become Vice-Chancellor's Fellow at La Trobe.

Miriana (Jackie) Fristacky

Lawyer and Civic Representative
CHS 1965-1966

1965-66 Represents Camberwell High School in football and athletics
1966 Vice Captain of MacArthur House and Prefect
1979-84 Complete Bachelor of Arts (1971), Bachelor of Laws (1973), Master of Laws (1976), Master of Public Policy (1994) The University of Melbourne



Jackie was inaugural President of the Aristedis Clerks (Young Lawyers) Association Victoria, taught law at La Trobe University, then practised as an industrial advocate. She became President of the Industrial Relations Society

Victoria, and an honorary life member. She has worked in Commonwealth and State senior executive and tribunal roles. Since 2001, Jackie has served the City of Boro as an independent Councillor (5 terms) and Mayor (3 terms).

Lawrence Hodgson (Class of '45)



Lawrie was a genuine Camberwell local. He lived with his parents at 3 Doonkuna Avenue all his life. He worked as an accountant and was outstanding with bookwork and figures. He was known to enjoy lunch and a convivial ale at both Young and Jacksons, Melbourne and the Palace Hotel, Camberwell. He was a faithful parishioner at St. Dunstan's Anglican Church and St Paul's Cathedral. For 50 years Lawrie was a member of Rostrum Club 13 Camberwell and was honoured with Life Membership. Lawrie attended Camberwell High School from 1941 to 1945. He joined the CHESS committee in 1999 and attended many of the ex-students events.

Lawrie passed away in August 2018 at the age of 90.

The City of Ballarat paid tribute to Bruce Clark after he passed away in August 2018: 'Bruce's contributions to the Ballarat community helped shape the city as we know it today.' He was Assistant Commissioner for the City of Ballarat between 1994 and 1996, chairman of the Ballarat Economic Development Board, life governor of Ballarat Health Services, board member of the Sovereign Hill Museums Association, chairman of the Mining Committee, board member of Ballarat Lifeline and YMCA, a Ballarat Historical Park Association life member, and co-founder of the Ballarat Tourism Board.

In 2014, Bruce was honoured for his service to the Ballarat community with the Order of Australia Medal.
