# PRINCIPAL REPORT

As we do each year, at the start of 2017 our Year 12 students attended Boot Camp and our Year 7 students travelled to Portsea. Both camps focused on building strong foundations for a successful year, giving priority to wellbeing to support effective and productive learning. It was a pleasure to attend both camps and to see the impact of these experiences for our students at significant times in their secondary education. Our high achieving Year 12 students from 2016 returned for our first assembly for the year at which we celebrated their achievements and recognised our student leaders for 2017.

There are opportunities to learn, achieve and have success in many ways in this school. Leadership is one of them. We have been privileged to have Aaron and Grace as School Captains and Rory and Mia as SRC Presidents. It continues to be a highlight of my week to meet with our School Captains and SRC Presidents and as in past years a key part of our work together was planning running and evaluating student forums each term.

During one of my weekly meetings with leaders this year, the suggestion was made that an award should be given by student leaders to a student recognising their contribution to the school in ways that might not be big and bold but nonetheless have an impact on the life of students. The Disco Consulere Allis award was created to recognise students who are making a positive difference to the lives of their fellow students. Imogen Harper and Summer Metcalf were the inaugural recipients of this award.

It has been a great pleasure to see the growth of student leadership in so many ways including through the SRC focus on building a respectful, inclusive community. Additionally the multimedia crew, tech crew, sustainability collective, A-Z community and respectful culture group have continued to contribute positively to the school. A Design and Development Team with 22 staff and student members worked with the architects to develop the brief and the plans for the

redevelopment of C and D buildings. We will see these plans come to life as demolition is followed by construction.

A highlight of the year was the official opening of the school's FIFA standard soccer field on May 12th. Our guest of honour was ex-student Tilly Lucas Rodd, AFL women's league mid fielder. We allowed students to access the oval the minute (literally) that the landscapers finished their work and the enthusiasm with which they took to the field was overwhelming. It was a long awaited and much appreciated facilities improvement.

We have enjoyed many sporting accomplishments over the year including our Swimming and Athletics Carnival days. Our student leaders encouraged and supported their Houses with loyalty and enthusiasm creating a healthy competitive atmosphere. Points for all House events including Sports carnivals, debates and the chorales have been included in the total with the House Cup awarded to Macarthur at the final assembly to farewell Year 12 students.

The Interschool Sports program saw teams achieve wonderful success, but most importantly building the skills of students particularly as team members. Many times this year students have proudly returned with valuable learning for life and sometimes pennants from Zone, Regional and State competitions as well.

Our parents have once again played an active role in the school community. Our PFA partnered with the school to host 3 workshops for parents in Term 2. The first of these was presented by Susan Maclean on the challenges for our students and their parents of growing up online. I am proud that our school community works collaboratively for the benefit of our students. Our PFA and Friends of Music supported the school in so many other ways at key events throughout the year, always focused on building community.

We have many other ways in which our parents, students and staff have collaborated to ensure excellent learning pathways are supported. These

include the Student led conferences which are in place for years 7-10 and will be extended to years 11 and 12 in 2018. Events such as the tertiary expo which our careers team organised to provide resources and information and stimulate rich discussion about future pathways in Term 3. This year we have completed a self-evaluation of our previous Strategic Plan and developed a new one for the next four years. The collaborative efforts of staff, students and parents has been a real strength of this work.

As well as camps at Years 7, 8, 9 and 12, students have once again travelled overseas. Year 11 students are currently on World Challenge in Vietnam and Cambodia. This year we have hosted teachers from our sister schools in Suzhou and Normandy and received students from our sister school in Normandy for an extended visit, enjoying homestay and attending school at Camberwell High.

These are important ways that intercultural understanding can be developed which will support our students to be active global participants.

Music has continued to play an important part in our school calendar. Students had the opportunity to perform in some great venues in competitions and festivals and of course in our beloved Hall. These were all wonderful evenings of entertainment and all those involved, performers, tech crew and our marvellous Instrumental teaching staff are to be congratulated for the quality of the performances. The involvement and support of our Friends of Music is a crucial part of the success of our program.

In 1948, the principal in his first year at CHS, Mr Andrews wrote on the headmaster's page in Prospect:

*School life is thus a continuous process of growth, the extent and vitality of which are determined each year not only by the industry and activities of that particular year but also by its former state of health and vigor.*

Another year of industry and activity has ensured the ongoing health and vigor of our school community.

When we first moved to have Parent Student Teacher Conferences from lunchtime to early evening, it was thought parents would not attend during the afternoon, now, however, it is the busiest time for the conferencing and this model has been expanded to include the Round Tables and all other conferences.

In my role this year I have been fortunate to see all of the above groups working together to make Camberwell what it is, a vibrant, happy, ever developing community where it is not just about self but about what is best for the school in the short and the longer term. Next year will again present some physical challenges as we all work around the next phase of our building and



redevelopment of school facilities. It has been wonderful to have the superb high quality soccer pitch completed this year and to see it being so fully utilized both during the day and by our hirers after hours. 


This year Arts & Technology students have had opportunities to exhibit their work, participate in competitions and further their interests in the various areas.




The furious, hateful scream echoed through the chambers of the Hourglass, making it rattle slightly on its mantelpiece before it stilled and continued its tinkling vigil.





# MATHS AND SCIENCE REPORT

Which has more vitamin C – fresh or bottled pineapple juice?

What effect does light intensity have on the rate of photosynthesis in pak choy?

Does the colour of a liquid influence the perception of flavour?

How does mass effect friction on an inclined plane?

How strong is a strand of hair?

These are some examples of the wonderful investigations conducted by our VCE Science students this year. As part of the new Science VCE study designs students were set the challenge of taking on the role of a research scientist to design and conduct their own experiment, based on work completed in class. Students had to draw on all of the learning dispositions to be successful, as they were required to lead the investigation, trouble shoot problems and communicate findings.

Not to be left out, our Year 7 students learnt about air resistance and the design process by attempting to make parachutes from plastic bags. While at Year 8, students explored simple machines and forces by creating their very own Rube Goldberg machines. In Year 9, students applied their knowledge of science in their Connection's Mythbusters project. While at Year 10, the Mind and Body students conducted an empirical research activity on the pursuit of happiness.


The fun did not stop there.

In Mathematics the focus was on art and problem solving! Our Year 9 students explored the principles of geometry by creating tessellations using the dynamic software program, GeoGebra.

At Year 11, the Mathematical Methods students employed functions and graphs to create pictures using the online graphing program Desmos. In Patterns, Proofs and Geometry students investigated fractals and infinite number patterns. Meanwhile, in Further Mathematics, students applied their knowledge of networks and algorithms to model and solve problems involving travel, connection, flow and scheduling.

All of this learning was supplemented by an extensive program of excursions and activities.







#### Some of these included:

As well as organising these wonderful learning experiences, the talented and hardworking Maths and Science team has been very busy implementing new courses based on the Victorian Curriculum and have continued to work tirelessly together to develop innovative ways to engage students and scaffold learning. It has been a very busy year filled with wonder, magic and many successes. I would like to thank the CHS Maths and Science team for their dedication, enthusiasm and commitment. Finally, we bid a fond farewell to three long standing members of the team – Rachel Robertson, Trish Vu and Tom Whiting and wish them all the very best in their future endeavours.



# SPORT AND PE REPORT

2017 has been the year of students demonstrating improved collaboration and application to developing knowledge and skills both within the HPE classrooms and the sporting arena. This has led to significant growth and achievement levels in the classroom as well as when representing Camberwell High School as individuals and part of teams in Interschool Sport and Carnivals. The outstanding success at Division, Region and State levels are a testament to the dedication and passion of our sport staff and the enthusiasm and talent of our students.

The junior PE classes started the year making strong links between their own fitness levels, physical activity levels and the importance of physical health in their daily lives and analysing the lifestyle choices they make. They have continued to develop their skills in various ball sports, invasion games and striking sports. These skills and knowledge were developed further in their sport classes, combined with a strong emphasis on collaboration, sportsmanship and the tactical/strategic aspects of the sports.

All Year 10 students completed units on First aid, the body systems as well as following the process of designing a training program in PE classes. These units not only assisted in building the foundation for future VCE PE students, but also provided students with valuable life skills. Students that completed Year 10 elective classes developed their coaching skills, analysed sports performance and participated in excursions outside the school, which related their theory work to various community recreation activities such as surfing, rock-climbing, trampolining, bubble soccer and wheelchair basketball. Year 11 PE students completed the new Units 1 & 2 study design including looking at the body systems and the various adaptations of the body, physical activity levels of individuals and the wider community as well as preparing an oral presentation on contemporary issues of participating in physical activity. The biggest eye opener for them was looking at their own lifestyles and seeing how active they are, but also how much sedentary behaviour had crept in to their everyday life. Year 12 PE students completed the last year of the study design and it involved them designing, implementing and developing a training program, as well as looking at energy systems and fatigue mechanisms and the different responses of the body to training and physical activity.

The foundation of the health curriculum is built on the three health dimensions; social, physical and mental (with emotional and spiritual being included in 2018). Students have developed their understanding of the interrelationship between these dimensions in various engaging topics and activities across Year 7, 8 and 9 such as Healthy Lifestyles, Nutrition and Personal Identity, Safety, Puberty, Community Health, Sexuality and Reproduction, Mental Health and Risk Taking and Harm Minimisation. An important theme throughout all our learning sequences and incorporated in to every lesson is Respectful Relationships and educating our students on these core values.

In senior Health classes, students were fortunate to be involved in many valuable experiences such as; the Salvation Army homelessness schools program; The Mercy Hospital for developing a deeper understanding of the prenatal developmental phases; and an incursion which involved a speaker from the Step Back Think Foundation to raise awareness of alcohol related violence in youth. In Term 3 the resilience of the Year 11 Health and Human Development students was tested as they accepted the parenting responsibility of looking after and attending to the needs of a virtual baby for 24 hours. A challenging, yet highly rewarding experience for them all I'm sure.

It has been a busy year with numerous developments across the curriculum and one with many successes. The Health and PE team have completed the Literacy for Learning program with all other staff members and have been trialling literacy strategies in the classroom as well as enhancing learning sequences accordingly. ## LEARNING DISPOSITIONS

For the Year 7s, high school began with Orientation day last year; a day where a group of wild, soon to be year sevens shuffled anxiously through the gates of the school to meet their peers and teachers and get a feel for what the next 6 years of their schooling would be like.

Since then, the year sevens have slotted neatly into place within the school community through sport, music, art or other extra-curricular activities, the first of which, was the Portsea camp. During this camp, as well as doing all the classic camp activities, giant swing, flying fox, kayaking etcetera it was also the foundation for many of the friendship groups that have carried on throughout the year.

Next up was the Year 7 Learning to learn program, where the Year 7s found out more about how they learn, and different strategies to use to help support their educational journey at Camberwell High School. It was here that the Year 7s were introduced to the Learning Dispositions, and skills such as teamwork, and leadership that have become invaluable tools for many of us here.

From Portsea Camp, Learning to Learn, the Zoo Excursion, IMAX, and everything in between, the Year 7s have forged themselves a spot in the Camberwell High School Community. They have strengthened friendships, new and old, and approached their schooling with enthusiasm. Congratulations to all the Year 7s, your first year of High School is nearly over, and while there are many challenges ahead of you, the lessons you learn, and experiences you have will carry you through the rest of your life.

Year 8 – “High School: Part 2”. Similarly, to the Year 7s, the Year 8s began the year with camp, heading to Narnbool for the sustainability retreat where they learnt about sustainability projects, ecological systems, and strengthened their understanding of the Camberwell High School Learning Dispositions.

Upon returning to school, the Year 8s discovered that this would be a very different year, as they began a range of new arts and technology electives including food tech, design tech, and drama. With new classes, also came new peers and new friendship groups which the Year 8s took in their stride.

Throughout the year the Year 8s participated in a number of activities, including an investigation into the rock formations by Riversdale train line for science, the Docklands excursion to study urbanisation, and an excursion to IMAX to see a short movie about the Amazon rainforest.

At the beginning of this term the Year 8s also completed an orienteering day at Cadrinia Reservoir Park, where they competed in a massive scavenger hunt in groups of 3 and 4.

This was also the second year of the Year 8s investigation into their Unanswerable Questions. The Year 8s spent the year researching and collating information in preparation for their upcoming round tables tomorrow where they will present a documentary or graphic novel to their parents and peers.



Next year the Year 8s will be moving into the E-Centre. It will be a big transition for all of you as you change from the traditional classroom setting of the D and C buildings, and into the open learning environment. With this comes unique challenges, but more importantly opportunities for those who take advantage of them. I know we have taken great pride in our learning space this year, and enjoyed finding out more about ourselves as learners, as well as the more flexible spaces. We wish you all the best with this transition over the next two weeks of headstart.

Year 9 - The beginning of this year held a big change and challenge for us; moving into the E-centre. The E-centre was very different as for the previous two years we had had all of our classes around the school and our lockers scattered across C-Block. The E-centre was truly the opposite of that with everything localised into one building and one place. Having the E-centre meant we had more ownership over our learning, and how we wanted it to look, so that everyone got the most out of Year 9. At the beginning of the year we all spoke about what we believed good behaviour was and how this should look in our Learning Mentor classes, these lists were compiled and put onto A3 poster that you can see plastered around many of the E-Centre Classrooms. The E-Centre is an open space that is very communal. It is our year 9 hub, our headquarters.

Year 9 was the start of a new subject: Connections. In Connections we used skills that helped support our work in other classes, as well as working with

people outside of our normal classes. This year we have worked both individually and in groups to help put in place our Learning Dispositions, all of which have helped us successfully negotiate the E-Centre.

In term 3 we had the privilege of going to the Kinglake Wilderness Camp where we were broken up into three streams – Community, Challenge, and hiking. Each of these streams had a different experience ranging from work around the community that had been affected by the Black Saturday bushfires in 2009, an overnight hike and camp, and rope challenge and teamwork building exercises.

One of the most exciting things we got to participate in was the Melbourne Project this term in Connections. This consisted of 3 days excursions into the city where we investigated how Melbourne caters for a variety of its citizens. During these excursions we went on a number of tours of places like the MCG, Urban Seed, and the Big Issue, while also having to organise time on our own to conduct research in small groups. It was an amazing opportunity to experience the city we live in in a whole new light, as well as see a side of it that people often don't get to experience.

The whole of Year 9 has been an amazing experience that we have taken so much from. On Wednesday we will begin our first Senior School classes, and for many of us, our first VCE subjects. It is an exciting time, and one that we are prepared for thanks to the skills we have developed over the past three years.
