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

PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Welcome to 2004 at Camberwell High School, and to a school year hopefully of promise and of great opportunity for us all. We have begun the year smoothly, with just over 1200 studnets (all year levels full except for five spaces only in Year 12), three new staff and five returning, gleaming new classrooms on the third level of our second main building and fewer portables, an upgraded, attractive and accessible courtyard, and a cleared building site being prepared for our next exciting project!

Year 12 students attended their study camp at Monash University in February, staying overnight in the Halls of Residence where they gained some appreciation of university life. Head of Senior School, Maureen Slater, and Pastoral Team Leader, Steve Beck, the organisers and all staff who attended and/or stayed overnight were impressed with the behaviour, courtesy and excellent attitude of the students. (I received a phone call from the University's swimming pool manager saying 'he'd never met a better group of young people'.)

The results of last year's Year 12 students were most pleasing. Ben Dyer, our Dux (ENTER of 99.90 and featured by ABC-TV, Channel 10 and the Herald Sun) has won a prestigious Deans' Scholarship to Monash University; Khoa Pham (ENTER of 99.30) and winner of a highly-coveted scholarship to the University of Melbourne, and 35 students who gained ENTER scores above 90.00. Two students gained perfect study scores, in English and Information Technology: Systems, while seven Media students, five Information Tech Systems, eight Maths Methods students and multiple numbers in many subjects, gained study scores in the top 8% in Victoria. A strong indication of the level of success of the Class of 2003 is that over 84% of our Year 12s gained a first-round offer from tertiary bodies, including 31 offers from Monash University and 29 from the University of Melbourne. We hope that all our graduates find the courses and careers that give them the greatest sense of purpose in their lives. I congratulate and thank their committed and hard-working teachers for all the time, care and effort they gave to their students, and remind all families that Camberwell High School is proud of its policy of non-selective entry to VCE.

We recently held our 2004 Inter-House Swimming Sports at the Northern Pool in Balwyn. The last event decided the overall outcome, with Macarthur winning narrowly (Editor – hooray!) over Churchill, followed by Roosevelt and Montgomery.

Congratulations went to Year 9 students and Ms Ronchi for raising funds, via the cooking and sale of pancakes recently: this money went towards assisting homeless young people in our area. We also saw 18 Year 9 students begin training as Peer Resource Leaders; they are learning skills to help and support other students their own age — and they will learn to direct them to appropriate resources within the school and community. This has flowed on from research showing that secondary students are more likely to seek help for problems from their peers, than through adults.

An recent inclusion in our Camberwell High School newsletter from Brent Thiele, our Assistant Sports Director, highlighted our participation in sporting programs such as the Surf League, rowing, cross country and lacrosse. We had a successful campaign in 2003 that saw Camberwell students compete in local, regional, state and even National finals... and we believe that 2004 will be even bigger and better.







Life in one of the world's great cities has been a dream for me, as working and travelling certainly has its advantages in a big city like London. I worked for Virgin Mobile in 2000 as a business analyst, which was quite dynamic, especially as the firm was only 8 months old and striving to sign up new customers and compete against the other big mobile operators.

Next stop was Worldcom for two years, which was became a bit of a joke with our friends since my wife was working for Arthur Andersen, which specialised in shredding paper and I worked for a firm that just simply cooked its books! Needless to say my wife won the "competition" to see who could lose their job AND their company first. I'm now at British Telecom and this is my final job in the UK before returning home. We've had a great time here and I must say that places like Russia, Vienna, Paris and numerous ski resorts hold a special place in my heart. Living overseas for an extended period of time gives you a broader outlook on life and I truly believe that for distant countries like Australia where taking a train to Paris is definitely not an option, working overseas widens your view on life.

Finally, CHS seems a long time ago but certainly not forgotten. I've heard that parents are striving to enrol their children as pressure to obtain a good education mounts in this competitive society we live and to that I must say I consider myself lucky to have attended CHS.
