



PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Welcome to 2006 at Camberwell High School! We are delighted to have welcomed 205 Year 7s and we now have an enrolment of around 1210 in total. Demand for places has been extremely high again this year and we have had to turn away many families from outside our neighbourhood. Class sizes remain at a maximum of 26, with many VCE classes significantly smaller.

Our Year 12s from 2005 have done extremely well in terms of university offers: 30 received offers to high-ENTER courses at the University of Melbourne, and 30 to Monash, to mention only two destinations. Students from CHS have been offered entry to Dental Science, Medical Science, Surgery, Biomedical Science, Engineering, Arts, Mechatronics Engineering, Media, Music, Computer Science, Commerce and Law, to name some courses, at Melbourne and Monash. We wish all our graduates success in their chosen paths.

Already, our current Year 12s, and most of their teachers, have finished their two day Study Camp at the Monash Halls of Residence. The activities were chosen to enhance students' skills of collaboration and effective study, to introduce English texts and life

in a tertiary institution, and to improve their academic outcomes. Thank you Peter Frost and staff, and our Year 12s, for this valuable and positive experience.

A highlight of this short term was the Year 7 Orientation Camp, held over three days at Portsea in the historic Lord Somers Camp site with its stunning views over the Bay and the Heads. While the 204 students, 12 staff and three parents experienced extremes of weather and



some diminution in sleep, they had a happy, safe and 'bonding' time together. Our students' behaviour drew praise from the organisers of the camp, and that feedback is something we value greatly. Well done!

I want to pay tribute to four members of staff, one of whom is leaving, for their excellent work for this school. Patricia Noseda completed 16 years as the CHS bursar recently, and she has overseen enormous change in that time - our school's spectacular growth since 1995, DET's changed financial practices and devolution of financial management to schools, a total revolution in hardware and software handled by bursars, changes in legislation and in funding, and extra responsibilities handled by 'base schools' such as us, on behalf of clusters of schools. Patricia handled an annual cash turnover of over two million dollars and she was involved fully in overseeing funding for all our major building projects, investments, collection of funds and daily expenditure. Every year the DET auditors praised Patricia for her honesty and competence. We can add to that her huge workload which she will not miss in retirement. Well done and thank you Patricia! The other staff are Terry Ymer, who has stepped down from the Leading Teacher position of School Organiser/Timetabler after 16 years, Peter Frost who was our Careers Advisor for 11 years and Stephen Cranby who was a Leading Teacher in charge of Curriculum for 9 years. Each is still with us and each has moved voluntarily from their leadership position but I want to thank them for the valuable and valued work they have done to ensure that our school has had an effective and dynamic curriculum, effectively implemented via the timetable, staff placed to maximum benifit of our students and the students gaining the necessary careers counselling to assist them in their decision-making. Thank you Terry, Peter and Stephen for the professional and competent way in which each of you has seved Camberwell High School so well and for so long.

Well, who could forget the fun loving, sun loving, Maxwell Charles Fraser (CHS 1961 to 1966)?

Never one to sit still, he enjoyed life to the full. He loved a good party (he loved Rock n' Roll) and who could forget his annual pilgrimage to the Sunshine Coast? He always left 'lily white', but returned like a Polynesian (it was the days before Slip Slop Slap).

Max was active in many school activities. He played trumpet in the school band and was a member of the school football and cricket teams. In quieter moments, he enjoyed the competition as a member of the school chess club. He was elected Prefect in Year 12 (1966).

Max had a very distinguished career in the aviation industry. After completing Year 12 at CHS, he pursued his passion for flying and enrolled in NASA (National Aviation Space Academy) and successfully graduated several years later.

His first commercial flight was with FIJI Air — island hopping in single engine planes. He then joined Ansett and rose to the rank of Captain and later to Senior Flight Instructor. In 1990 he joined Cathay Pacific and moved to Hong Kong. He obtained his Captaincy with Cathay in 1998 and in 2004, he moved to Dubai as a Captain with United Arab Emirates.

Throughout his tenure overseas, Max kept a residence in his beloved Sunshine State and whenever flight schedules brought him to Melbourne, he would catch up with his old Camberwell High School mates. He loved his time at CHS and he reminisced many a time over a port (or two).

Sadly, Max had to retire from Emirates in September due to illness. He passed away peacefully in late December 2005. He was a devoted husband and father.


Judith Louise McConchie (CHS 19 52- 1953)

"The art community of Canberra has lost one of its greats with the passing of Judith Louise McConchie, 67, on September 16. Family and friends held a service to pay tribute to a vibrant and generous personality who contributed more than 30 years of her life to the Arts. Judith studied art and photography at the Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology and in 1975, she became director of Hesley Gallery, at the Canberra Theatre Centre. Judith was inspired during a National Gallery of Australia tour of Impressionist sites in France, and subsequent tours to Italy and Greece, to begin working exclusively with pastels to better capture the effect of light and colour. She was a guest artist in The Canberra Times Outdoor Art Show each year from 1991 to 1996 and exhibited widely in solo and group exhibitions until her last exhibition at the Woodworks Gallery, Bungendore, in 2003."

moved down to Eden on the Far South Coast of NSW a few years ago to work their Pambula Lake oyster lease full time.

Consequently we hadn't seen Chris & Ray for quite a while, so we thought that we would go down there for a weekend trip (sort of the mountain going to Mahomet), and visit them at their new home at Nethercote, a locality about 10 kms inland from Eden. We could also then take in the sights of the area, including one which is most popular from mid September to end of November whalewatching.

Well, to coin a phrase, we had a whale of a time. We all arrived on the Saturday afternoon and checked into our respective motels. After settling in some walked around various parts of Eden during the afternoon. Then we all gathered at a very pleasant restaurant at another motel for dinner. On Sunday, we were all up very early (some much earlier than others according to breakfast arrangements) and drove to the wharf to go whalewatching on the catamaran "Cat Balou".

The sea was quite calm with just a gentle swell. As we left Twofold Bay we passed a very large oil rig from the Bass Strait oil fields which was undergoing some maintenance after dragging its anchor and losing the chain. We then sailed north, only about 1km from shore, passing a number of seals on the surface and some pods of dolphins which swam alongside the boat and rode the bow wave. We also saw quite a few flying fish as we went up the coast. Somewhere between Pambula River and Merimbula, we came upon a mother Humpback Whale and her calf. They were rather late migrating to the Antarctic for the summer feeding. The mother did not do a great deal, mainly rolling over on the surface and one or two small breaches. However the calf put on a full repertoire of breaches, fin slaps, surface rolls, etc for quite a long time. The pair moved very slowly southwards while the calf performed for us. Eventually the mother decided it was time to move on and our whale watching session finished.

We then returned to the wharf at about 1200 (with no seasickness), and had very pretty drive through the hills to Chris & Rays' property at Nethercote. We had a very relaxing lunch there catered for by Chris, plus a tour of their 5 acre property. Some of us then returned to Canberra, while others stayed another night and made our way home on Monday after visiting friends, or shopping, or taking a long way home.





Which teacher inspired you at CHS?

Has to be Mr Trevare. Some loved him. Some didn't. Though he was very inspirational and loved what he was teaching. In fact, he was responsible for me joining in many of the school choirs. Without him being able to give me lifts to rehearsals for the Moomba 1970 festival - I would never have appeared in the operetta at the Sidney Myer Music Bowl - that summer. Camberwell High joined in the participation with many other schools in the area - including many girls' schools. Perhaps that is why I joined in?

Your funniest school memory?

1972 Choral Festival. The Churchill choir sang "Fool On the Hill" (of Beatles, Sergio Mendes and Brazil 66 fame). Half way through the song, our gimmick was that the choir split in half and there was me in the middle playing the recorder solo. What the audience didn't see was - there was Fiona Reed playing the solo on the flute. Well I thought it was funny.

What subject did you hate and why?

History. I don't think anyone liked history. Though in later life I started to gain a passion for history through "The History Channel". I must be getting old.

What school house were you in?

Churchill. And I loved participating. High school taught me that if you participate, you get chances to do things in life that others miss out on. And I was wasn't going to miss out on anything! I was in the Athletic Sports, the "Special Choirs" during the choral festivals, everything except swimming.

Can you hit the high note at the end of the school song?
You bet. Though I no longer sing it in the shower. Although during the odd road trip..... I have been known.....

Your favourite sport or, conversely, what sport did you try to get out of?

10 pin bowling and football were great. How I hated when told that I couldn't go bowling at the Golden Bowl (remember the Golden Bowl) because there wasn't enough to play cricket. I never enjoyed cricket. I always seemed to find the patches in the ground that the dogs found first. May-be that is why I don't like dogs either?

What did you do on the last day of school? (we won't tell the police)

Well there is a wonderful photo of me during the last day on the CHESS web site. Perhaps you can add it in here. I love that photo. (Ed. - here it is!) We didn't drink too much that morning at 6am. In fact, I never drank that much ever again. While at the end of that the last day of school. I remember walking home with Fiona Reed and when passing her place on the way home, I thought, "I probably won't ever see her again"... And that went for so many people I had known throughout high school. That was a sad moment. I wonder how many of us wish we had kept in touch with so many people - but life has not given us enough opportunity or time....

Who was your best friend at school?

I had several best friends. Wayne Foster-Johnson and I were close throughout high school. I was very lucky to have so many trips with his family to Warrnambool each summer. 
