
CHESS is keen to be aware of the websites of other government secondary schools. If you know of an ex-students group that belongs to a state school please email us here at CHESS so that we may make contact.



Our 13 question questionnaire...... Replies from Keith Richardson (1952 - 1954)

Which teacher inspired you at CHS?

There were teachers I respected, such as 'Sniff' White and Miss Mason; teachers I liked such as Miss Yees and John Onyons; but most teachers were simply 'there' and inspiration didn't get through. That came later, and not from schoolteachers.

Your funniest school memory? Playing cricket with 'Bulldog' Muirden. The game took place during history. Certain people would take it turns to push him to the limit with questions. The more exasperated he became, the more frequently his glasses were removed. Every time it was a 'run'. When someone was sent out into the corridor it was a 'wicket'. And we all kept

score. Poor man ... he didn't deserve students like us.

... Or was it when the school siren on the roof was stuffed with a tennis ball? The end of the lunch break was signalled with an extremely muffled squawk. Memory plays tricks, and I am not sure whether I was in the group that did it, or just privy to the planning. Either way, if Stalin was the headmaster I would have joined all conspirators and be put against the wall, and shot.

What subject did you hate and why? Physics! Definitely! Should never have studied it.

What school house were you in?

Roosevelt. House activities were a lot of fun. In fact, being elected House Captain in my final year saved me from what I thought was a fate worse than death. It was the highlight of my three-year sentence at CHS. The organization of teams, administration of various sporting events, conducting the House choir were great, and the memories give me pleasure. We picked up the aggregate shield for the year. (The only sour note here was that we just got pipped in the choral competition by Kwong Lee Dow and the Macarthur boys. I think the judges were got at.)

Can you hit the high note at the end of the school song? I have to confess that I cannot remember the school song as being a part of my life at school. And when asked what the school motto was I usually replied 'Discipuli picturum spectate'. (Please don't criticize my spelling you Latin students ... that happened too often at school!)

Do you still have any school library books?

Nope! One of the things about school I loved and respected was the 'tiny' school library. "Private Study' periods were a joy when I could legally take my books into the library, and read everything except the books relating to subjects I was supposed to be knowledgeable about. I hope the library is heaps bigger than it was in 1954.

Your favourite sport or, conversely, what sport did you try to get out of?

Athletics tops the list here. Mind you I loved cricket in Year 9. Lionel Willison and I dominated the house fourths. That was pretty easy seeing all the other players were in year seven, and were easily intimidated.

What did you do on the last day of school? (we won't tell the police)

Remember the years ... it was the early fifties! The last day of school was a great anticlimax. Schoolies week hadn't been invented, and the 'hoohah' that marks the final day of HSC schoolwork these days would have given nightmares to the teachers in the fifties. If I remember correctly we got our reports, milled around the common room until we felt it was safe to go, and quietly disappeared into the real world. I left as early as I could as I had a job sorting Christmas mail at the Spencer Street GPO on the night shift, and I wanted to grab some sleep.

Who was your best friend at school?

Lots of names spring to mind, but the word 'best' cannot be used. Most shared the days at primary school (old friends are the best) and include such names as Bill Blythe, Lionel Willison, Bill Logie, Malcolm Douglas, John Giltinan, John Addie, Giles Bridson, and many many more. To paraphrase the old Bob Dylan song, 'most of them I have never seen again.' Very sad!

What book are you reading now?

In the kitchen, during morning and afternoon teas, I am reading recipe books to broaden my culinary skills. In the study I am rereading Karen Armstrong's book 'Buddha'. I had intended to reread her work on Islam but I must have sold it at the market on one of my many downsizing exercises preceding a move.

Did you have a crush on a classmate?

Yep! (Come on lady editor! Hormones were raging for all (most) adolescents during their teen years. If anyone says 'no' to this question then I would question his or her mental health.

What classroom prank can you recall? (we know nothing) See 'Funniest School Memory' on the previous page.

Did CHS have a lasting influence on your life?

Wow! Moment of truth! This is a very complex question, and one that cannot be answered simply. The time spent in CHS is just over 4% of my total life to date, so I would have to say that it was probably lasting, but not terribly important in the total scheme of things. But it is a part of my life that cannot be removed, or treated lightly. Did I enjoy it? Adolescence is a difficult time! Nuff said!

A bit about me.....






60s REUNION held @ The Kelvin Club on October 14th






JOHN WATERS (CHS 1948 - 1952)



John received a cadetship to work in the research laboratories at ICI Australia and whilst there, he developed an interest in the Patent profession. He obtained a position as a technical assistant with a Patent Attorney firm, which had a clientele of large chemical and pharmaceutical companies and John continued to study part-time until he became a registered Patent Attorney. From there he went on to be a successful senior partner for the next 40 years.

In 1960, he married Gwen Ward (CHS 1949) and they had four children. He was committed to the Uniting Church and served this ir many ways. A large number of people celebrated his life at St Michael's Church in Collins Street, Melbourne, where it was said that John was universally admired for such qualities as courtesy, modesty, integrity, loyalty, generosity and compassion.

John held many fond memories of CHS and its ethos. It was an important influence on him, along his life's journey. He never forgot "Disco Consulere Aliis".



Barry Duff's widow, Chris, would like his former classmates (who went to the recent 60s Reunion) to know that he passed away three years ago. He was a senior town planner with the Department of Sustainability and Environment for almost 30years. Barry was extremely fit and regularly ran around The Tan. He suffered symptoms of a stroke after his last run and died four days later at the Epworth Hospital.



EDUCATION FOUNDATION NEWS

I've been in contact with Kylie McGowan from the Education Foundation - and her reply below will be of interest to CHESS members:



"As part of Back to School Day 2007, we have developed an Alumni Strategy. The first stage was to develop a tool that would deepen the Back to School Day event - from a 'one-off' event, to a sustainable program. In a few weeks time, if a school registers to be a part of Back to School Day, they will receive their own login and password that will enable them to have their own former student association. As former students register their support for their former schools, the school coordinator will be able to contact them through the new system. For those schools, that already have their own Former Student Association, it will assist in reconnecting or establishing contact with former students that may have lost touch. It is designed to assist established Associations. We are currently in discussions with the President of ADAPE regarding Stage 2 of the Alumni strategy, which is to develop and implement training in the area of Former Student Associations. It would be wonderful to establish a committee of Public School Alumni groups to work together with ADAPE and Education

Foundation Australia, in developing and implementing Alumni training/seminars etc. Let me know if C.H.E.S.S would be interested in this idea."
