It has been beautifully restored, the acoustics are clean and crisp, it accommodates large groups of students and at the end of June, a booked out Mid-Year Concert for parents and families of Camberwell High School was held there.

This place brings back lovely memories for me. We had our choral festivals here and according to Robert Ewins book, A Jubilee Retrospective, from 1955 onwards the whole school went there by train! All our speech nights were held at the Hawthorn Town Hall and it was a very proud moment to walk on to the stage to receive an award. As school pianist, I enjoyed playing the school song which was sung with gusto at the end of memorable events. As the MC at the Boroondara Eisteddfod, I now watch young musicians performing on the same stage.

passionate about the history of Canterbury and, as many of you would remember, our school also had a long association with Maling Road and its environs. The old theatre was the setting for many of the early school celebrations. During the 1950s the school gathered at the theatre for the installation of the Prefects and House Captains, the Coronation Service and entertainment.

James' tour also stopped to admire the recently renovated Emulation Hall in Rochester Road. Graham Scott (class of '52) fondly recalls the school socials there. "I remember the place itself, and the way we lined up gender wise along our respective walls. God, that Pride of Erin still stirs my blood! And the setting up and cleaning up after!"

As we finished our tour, we needed to move out of the way of numerous cyclists riding through the Canterbury gardens, taking a well-worn path home, as hundreds of other Camberwell High students have no doubt done along these paths. Elijah Moshinsky (Class of 1964)



I owe all my interest and development to the wonderful teachers at Camberwell High. In those days, 1957 to 1964, it felt like an English Grammar School. I had wonderful teachers who opened up the world of culture and history to me. Bob Ewins was a wonderful educator. Not only did he make me love poetry, but Mozart. Miss Pettit, who taught French, opened up Europe. And a string of History teachers, I think Mr. Hobbs was one, made me want to learn about the past. I was a refugee child from a Jewish background and the school embraced many post-war refugees. I used to wag school to go and see the films of Ingmar Bergman and also Billy Wilder. Uniform was important. Caps had to be worn and I remember spending a lot of time swimming. There was discipline and order. Sporty, but cultured. They were happy days for me, and I am a lucky person to have had this great experience.

The celebrated Australian opera and theatre director, Elijah Moshinsky, has been awarded the Opera Australia Trophy, the company's highest honour. The Trophy acknowledges Moshinsky's long service to the company and his pre-eminent contribution to the country's operatic landscape. "When I left Australia to continue my studies at Oxford, I was already theatre and opera mad. I had always wanted to return and reform performance in Australia. My artistic aim was to keep loyal to Australia and my devotion and commitment to that aim has lasted from 1976 until today. I am deeply touched and honoured by the Award more than I can express. I live in England, where my children are, but my heart is in Australia. I still import Cherry Ripe's!"

Moshinsky has had an esteemed international career for over three decades and enjoys a longstanding and acclaimed association with Opera Australia. He has directed more than 15 original productions for the company, including his regularly revived La Traviata and Rigoletto. His Australian premiere production of Wozzeck for the Adelaide Festival in 1976, is considered one of the great achievements of his career and was his first production for the company. Opera Australia's Artistic Director Lyndon Terracini said: "Elijah Moshinsky is one of opera's great directors and it has been a privilege for Opera Australia to collaborate with him on so many productions over the years. He has a rare talent for creating timeless productions that resonate with audiences and it is a joy to witness his work."

Moshinsky has also received the Laurence Olivier Award for Best Opera three times for his productions of Lohengrin, Stiffelio and The Rake's Progress for the Royal Opera.



Tributes

It is with sadness that we advise of the passing away of these ex-students and a former teacher.

Jim Lewis

Jim Lewis was a Chemistry, Physics and Maths teacher during the 1960s.

Bill Brown (class of '77)

Bill started a career as a Laboratory Technician at VicRoads for 16 years and then a Quality Manager at Chadwick Geotechnical Group for 10 years. After semi-retiring he completed a certificate in Genealogical Research. Not only did Bill research the Brown family tree, he helped a number of families with research into their family history.

Frances Monsbrough nee Watt (class of '61)

Frances was a keen musician while at school. In 1960 she won a prize as school pianist and in 1961 she arranged Schubert's *To Music* to be sung by the Montgomery choir. She also sang in the Madrigal group. Frances continued her love of music throughout her career, both as a performer, conductor and church musician and was also an enthusiastic Latin teacher.

Keith Richardson (class of '54)

Keith Richardson was living in retirement in Castlemaine until he passed away in June. This is the piece he wrote for *Chess Moves* in 2006 which gives a potted history of his working life.

"Left CHS at the end of '54 and joined a small company that owned gasworks in the three eastern states. Starting as a sales clerk, I quickly progressed and was appointed Advertising Manager by the time I was twenty. Being young and ambitious I joined an advertising agency, where I worked until I took off for the UK in search of the great adventure. After hitchhiking through Europe and the Middle East, and meeting the love of my life, I returned to Australia a different man, got married, and spent the next 25 years in marketing and advertising. Got dissatisfied. Started my own business. Lost money. Went back into advertising. Retrenched. Started another period of self-employment. Went broke. Worked as a tram driver. Was made an offer I couldn't refuse. Back into marketing. Hated it. Back on the trams. Into head office. Worked on computers for the next 13 years. Got 'Jeff'd'. Migrated to Chewton just before the turn of the century. Should have done it 20 years ago!"


Bruce Hayman (class of '54)

Bruce attended several schools for varying periods including Gardiner Central School, Trinity Grammar, and Camberwell and Melbourne High Schools. Bruce had great delight in recalling that Marie Collier, the future opera singer, sang the National Anthem at Camberwell High School where they were contemporaries. He would not have described himself as an educated person. The Depression and World War II had an adverse effect on his education. After leaving school Bruce entered work in the insurance

field, eventually running a successful business as an Insurance Agent.

He finally retired and moved from his South Yarra home of 50 years to The Heights in Donvale. Bruce loved being a member of groups and organisations: The RACV Club, Kooyong Tennis Club, the MCC, The English Speaking Union, The Athenaeum Library for 77 years, Friends of Anglican Music, The Prayer Book Society and CHESS. He was on the committee for a number of years and had some excellent ideas about increasing our membership which were adopted. He hosted the Ex-Students Society at a memorable Christmas Dinner at Kooyong Tennis Club in 2012.

The trustees of the Bruce Hayman Charitable Trust have advised us the CHESS will receive a portion of the charitable trust funds every year, in perpetuity. We are honoured that Bruce has included us in his will, and as a committee we will seek to be good stewards of his gift.
