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

THERE ARE OPPORTUNITIES TO LEARN, ACHIEVE AND HAVE SUCCESS IN MANY WAYS IN THIS SCHOOL. LEADERSHIP IS ONE OF THEM. WE HAVE BEEN PRIVILEGED TO HAVE ANGUS STREAT AND SERENA BEDDISON AS SCHOOL CAPTAINS AND JULIA LIM AND JOHN STAMELLOS AS SRC PRESIDENTS. IT CONTINUES TO BE A HIGHLIGHT OF MY WEEK TO MEET WITH OUR SCHOOL CAPTAINS AND SRC PRESIDENTS. EACH ONE OF THEM IS A HIGH ACHIEVING AND TALENTED STUDENT ACADEMICALLY AND HAS ALSO CONTRIBUTED RICHLY TO THE LIFE OF THE SCHOOL.

During our weekly meetings with leaders this year, we have focused on the importance of continuing to build a culture of respect and specifically respectful relationships in the school. We have partnered with 6 of our local primary schools and met regularly to exchange ideas and collaborate on projects to build respectful school communities. Our parents have played an active role in in this work too. Our PFA together with the school and our partner primary schools held a workshop for parents in Term 2, presented by Professor Lea Waters from Melbourne University speaking on character strengths and the importance of recognising and developing children's signature strengths to build their resilience and capacity to thrive throughout their lives. Thank you to Chris Jung who has taken a leading role coordinating this work in the school.

The review of uniform undertaken by School Council every 3 years took place in 2018 with a working party of teachers, parents and students. We were very pleased with the outcome, especially the development of a gender neutral uniform option. The working party and school council felt that this reflected the importance of respect for the individual regardless of gender.

A Design and Development Team of 22 people with combined student and staff membership commenced in 2014 saw their work with the architects to develop the brief and the plans for the redevelopment of C and D buildings under construction. We will be using the top floor of the C building in December and D building works have commenced. During the design discussions, students made it very clear that having a home base for each year level in the school would increase the feeling of connection and belonging for students. Year 11 students will be introduced to their new home base on the top of C building at the start of 2019. Year 7 and 8 students will have their home bases in D building once redevelopment is completed in mid 2019.

We have enjoyed many sporting accomplishments over the year including our Swimming and Athletics Carnival days.

Our student leaders encouraged and supported their Houses with loyalty and enthusiasm creating a healthy competitive atmosphere. Points for all House events have been included in the total with the House Cup awarded to Macarthur at the final assembly to farewell Year 12 students.

The Interschool Sports program saw teams achieve wonderful success, but most importantly building the skills of students particularly as team members.

This year our whole school community was entertained by our talented students in the musical production of Sweeney Todd, the Demon Barber of Fleet Street. The work of our Director Helen Cull in collaboration with David Hirst and Gabi Harrison ensured the production was of the highest quality.

We have many other ways in which our parents, students and staff have collaborated to ensure excellent learning opportunities are provided. These include the student led conferences which took place for all year levels and events such as the tertiary expo which our Careers team organised to provide resources and information and encourage rich discussion about future pathways in Term 3.

As well as camps at Years 7, 8, 9 and 12, students have once again travelled overseas. Year 11 students travelled to Vietnam and Cambodia on World Challenge. We wished Courtney Rose, Martin Blake and the students well on this wonderful experience.

It was a privilege to accompany our Music students and David Hirst, Bruce Coombs, Kathryn Cooper and Olivia Smith to Japan on the tour in June and July. Of course, this was a marvellous opportunity for them to develop their skills as musicians and it was a wonderful way in which they grew as individual human beings and global citizens. Their reflections on the differences and similarities between Japan and Australia and how these differences came to be were powerful learning moments. We discussed individuality, national identity, multiculturalism amongst many other things. As we visited the Peace Park in Hiroshima there was time to considerthe

impact of war and the long lasting effects. Intercultural understanding is so important to the development of students as global citizens.

Music has continued to play an important part in our school calendar. Students had the opportunity to perform in some great venues, in competitions and festivals and of course in our beloved Hall. These were all wonderful evenings of entertainment and all those involved, performers, tech crew and our marvellous instrumental teaching staff are to be congratulated for the quality of the performances. The involvement and support of our Friends of Music is a crucial part of the success of our program.

I would like to thank the 2 other members of the Principal team at CHS. Maureen Salter and Emmanuel Skoutas. I want to thank Maureen for the work she does amongst many other things in maintaining the physical environment of the school and supporting the senior school. I thank Emmanuel for the ease with which he has stepped into the role, taking over from Isabelle Mckenzie in Term 3. Emmanuel has enthusiastically taken up leadership of learning development across the school and is supporting the Junior School. Maureen and I were sad to say farewell to our colleague Isabelle after so many years of productive work together, however, we are so pleased to have Emmanuel join us in the Principal team.

Finally my particular thanks and appreciation to the parent groups who have supported the school. School Council, led so capably by Ngaire Burn, our PFA with president Gavin Blue who has so generously shared his photographic talents with the school and Friends of Music, particularly president Jayden Battey. As we conclude 2018, I am filled with gratitude as the leader of such an exceptional school community.

ONCE AGAIN AS THE YEAR DRAWS TO A CLOSE, IT IS OPPORTUNE TO LOOK BACK AND REFLECT ON **BOTH THE CHALLENGES WE HAVE** FACED AND THE ACHIEVEMENTS WE HAVE GAINED AS A SCHOOL AS A WHOLE AND AS INDIVIDUALS.

For me one of the greatest challenges this year has probably been around the management and overseeing of the upgrades to Building C level 3 and the ongoing development to D Building levels 1 & 2, whilst also supporting the work of all students and teachers in the reduced spaces available to them around the school. We are a large community on a small footprint and I believe it is always important to keep looking at the environment around us and seeking ways to improve it. In this work I have felt greatly supported by my fellow Principal team members, Jill Laughlin, Isabelle McKenzie and more recently Emmanuel Skoutas. I have also appreciated the trust and support provided by the School Council, Design and Development Team and the Sustainability Collective, all of whom have had great supportive comments and suggestions to make to our ever changing learning landscape.

Achievements this year have been many, one that stands out for me were the different speeches that the various student representatives gave on Presentation Night and which focused on their specific year level, its growth, its exciting opportunities and the way that they had all grown as independent learners. For several years now we have talked with students, teachers and parents about what qualities and skills we want our students to take away with them from Camberwell High, I believe we are now seeing our students incorporating the learning dispositions into their regular daily learning and actions - the work of the Respectful Relationships group, the Sustainability Collective, the SRC and all of the student forums is clear evidence of this.

My association with Camberwell High goes back quite a long way, I have actually taught and worked here at two different stages of my career. On Orientation Night this year it was great to see another third generation family coming into the school. It was lovely to renew my association with a parent whom I had taught in my first time here and to listen to the reasons why this school was so important to the family.

On a broader note, this year I was privileged to take over the management of our International program, it has been wonderful to build relationships with these new families from a number of different countries and to see the trust that these parents place in Camberwell not just for their child's education but for their holistic management and wellbeing. Internationally also I was very fortunate to take a group of students to visit our French sister school in Barentin in March/April. The students were great ambassadors for Camberwell and gained greater insights into the French culture through their home stay accommodation and their time both at the Thomas Corneille School and in touring other parts of France.

A final highlight for me this year has been the time spent working with my Year 12 mentor group whom I have seen weekly from when we first came together in 2016 when they were in Year 10. It has always been enjoyable to chat to them and their parents about how they are progressing, what their challenges are and in trying to support them in achieving their goals - I wish them all well as they move forward beyond the walls of Camberwell High. I am looking forward to working with my new group of Year 10s over the next 3 years. Whilst the role of an Assistant Principal is a very busy one around the bigger whole school challenges, it is energising to have time in the classroom and build relationships with our great CHS students.














Today more than ever we need to prepare students for a diverse and complex global community of which they are a part. They are exposed to increasing amounts of information in visual and written form and the subjects they study in English, Languages and Humanities help them to understand and respond to this in an informed way.

Students from this Teaching and Learning team have participated in a wide range of activities this year including the participation of a group of Year 10 and 11 students in a model United Nations (UN) conference on the topic of Asylum Seekers and Refugees: A Global Humanitarian Crisis. This required students to collaborate and to take on the role of country ambassadors to the UNand discuss global issues on the United Nations current agenda. Students were required to follow to UN protocols and procedures followed by the General Assembly and to try to find the best possible solution for the problem at hand through dialogue, negotiation and multilateral diplomacy. The outcome was formalised in the adoption of a new UN Resolution. The students who participated found this a particularly enriching experience and welcomed the opportunity to engage in this unique experience.

As the name suggests, there are a diverse range of subjects within this teaching and learning team: English, EAL, English Language and Literature, French and Chinese and multiple Humanities subjects including History, Accounting, Economics, Legal Studies and Business Management. These subjects offer students the ability to understand the local and global world and make sense of their place within this. Students engage with current issues and work individually and collaboratively to problem solve and understand multiple perspectives. In order to prepare students for a changing workforce in the twenty-first century, the skills they need: agility, the ability to generate ideas and find creative solutions and to process information are modelled and developed across all subjects offered in this learning

area. Students studying languages have enhanced experiences as a result of relationships with our sister schools in Suzhou, China and Normandy, France as well as the opportunity to develop their oral language skills with native speakers in the form of our two language assistants who are based in our school for a year. This enriching opportunity also helps students to develop their appreciation and understanding of other cultures.

The dedicated staff involved in the English, Languages and Humanities subjects have created engaging, relevant and dynamic courses to help prepare students on their journey within and beyond school. Their commitment and enthusiasm enriches students' learning experiences and this is reflected in the positive relationships they enjoy. Thanks you to all our learning and support staff for their ongoing support.

MATHS &

SCIENCE

The teaching and learning of the fundamentals of Mathematics and Science continued apace in 2018. At the same time, the growing emphasis on problem solving and modelling in Maths, and on extended investigations in Science, nurtured other important dimensions of growth in our students. Opportunities for students to connect their theoretical understanding to open-ended inquiry tasks have never been more extensive and diverse at our school.

For example, Year 8 science students were challenged to build the best Rube Goldberg Machine - a sequence of levers, pulleys, wheels and ramps designed to keep a marble in motion for as long as possible. And Year 10 Physics/Chemistry students applied their knowledge of forces, material properties, and the relative strength of different 3-dimensional structures, to maximise the height from which a raw egg could be dropped without it breaking. While in Maths at Year 10, the Patterns Proofs and Geometry students chose an established mathematical theory, or notable mathematical problem, to investigate, and presented their findings in the form of highly informative and engaging posters.

Across the Maths and Science learning area the refinement of skills for effectively communicating inquiry work gathered momentum in 2018. Students at VCE, in particular, developed their use of posters to demonstrate their ability to design, plan and execute experiments, critique models, visually present datasets, analyse those same datasets, and evaluate the reliability of their findings. The quality of the posters created by many students was exceptional.

This year our laboratories were once again a staging point for student insights about the world around them, and the spawning ground for many a light bulb moment. Chemistry students in Year 11 undertook data-driven investigations in Spectroscopy, while their counterparts in Year 12 each crowned their 2018 achievements with the pursuit of an in-depth inquiry based on a topic they had studied more briefly earlier in the year. The investigations conducted by the Year 12 Physics students were no less rigorous, and demanding of supreme patience and effort. As Callum Dickinson reflected:

In term 3, unit 3/4 Physics students were tasked with an EPI (Extended practical investigation) to conduct an experiment that would not only display the knowledge of key concepts learnt in class but also focused on our learning dispositions. We were given projectile launchers and told to explore how changing different variables would affect the distance the launched projectile would travel. In order to design our experiments, we needed to be critical and creative in our experimental design to not only give us the results that we needed but so that it was also efficient and safe. Once we had designed our experiments, we collaborated with our peers to make further refinements. We took the best ideas from each of our team members and merged them together into a final design. We then ran our experiments. This required plenty of persistence as the experiment didn't always go as we intended, and we made constant changes until we finally got it working. Once we had our data, we reflected on the results, how they applied to the core physics concepts we had learnt, and what conclusions we could draw from them. After this we began combining everything we had learnt from our class, peers and experiment to create our posters. In order to include every detail onto the poster, we needed to be thoughtful regarding the importance of each aspect. Our completed posters included things such as an introduction

containing an explanation of the physics ideas, graphs showing our results, and a discussion exploring the trends in the data. The posters were completed over 3 quiet periods under SAC conditions and were then submitted for marking. Being able to apply our knowledge in such a unique way allowed us to build on what we had learnt and gain a much deeper understanding of the key physics ideas.

Also making hay (of sorts) in the laboratory were the Year 11 Biology students, who each probed the effect that a specific environmental factor had on the germination and growth rate of radish seeds. These same students then had the opportunity to get to grips with the equipment and techniques used by field ecologists whilst exploring the rock pools of Rickett's Point Sanctuary. Meanwhile, the Year 12 Biology group got a taste of a tertiary level laboratory when they ventured to the University of Melbourne to participate in workshops that allowed them to apply their knowledge of evolution and antibiotic resistance. They examined the effects of incorporating recombinant plasmids into bacteria, and tracked evolutionary change in Drosophila flies, although the latter did mean being confronted with the horrors of the 'fly morgue'.

In VCAL Maths this year a focus on measurement required students channel their inner IKEA designer as they drew to scale, and then built, functional flat-pack furniture. They also worked to systematically estimate the volume of paint required to paint a room, and constructed cubic metre spaces using bamboo sticks.



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

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

In 2018 the Camberwell High School (CHS) students have thrived in continuously developing their knowledge and skills both within the HPE classrooms and the sporting arena. This has led to significant student growth and achievement levels in the classroom as well as when representing CHS as individuals and part of teams in Interschool Sport and Carnivals. The outstanding success at Division, Region and State level competition is a testament to the dedication and passion of our Sport Education staff and the enthusiasm and talent of our students.

The junior PE classes started the year building on their fundamental movement skills and developing their skills in various ball sports, invasion games and striking sports. The curriculum was developed around making strong links between their own fitness levels, physical activity levels and the importance of physical health in their daily lives and analysing the lifestyle choices they make. These skills and knowledge were developed further in their sport education classes, combined with a strong emphasis on teamwork, sportsmanship and the tactical/strategic aspects of the sports.

All Year 10 students completed units on First aid, the body systems as well as following the process of designing a training program in PE classes. These units not only assisted in building the foundation for future VCE PE students, but also provided students with valuable life skills. Students that completed Year 10 elective classes developed their coaching skills, analysed sports performance and participated in excursions outside the school, which related their theory work to various community recreation activities such as surfing, rock-climbing, trampolining, bubble soccer and wheelchair basketball. Year 11 PE students completed Units 1 & 2 study design including looking at the body systems and the various adaptations of the body, physical activity levels of individuals and the wider community as well as preparing an oral presentation on contemporary issues of participating in physical activity. The challenge for these students was trying to meet the Australian Physical Activity and Sedentary Behaviour guidelines within their everyday lifestyle, especially the screen time elements! Year 12 PE students completed Units 3 & 4 of the new study design and it involved them looking at the biomechanics behind performance, the energy systems and fatigue mechanisms as well as elements of a training program and the different responses of the body to training and physical activity.

The foundation of the health curriculum is built on the five health and wellbeing dimensions; social, physical, emotional, mental and spiritual. Students have developed their understanding of the interrelationship between these dimensions in various engaging topics and activities across Year 7, 8 and 9 such as Healthy Lifestyles, Nutrition and Personal Identity, Safety, Puberty, Community Health, Sexuality and Reproduction, Mental Health and Risk Taking and Harm Minimisation. An important theme throughout all our learning sequences and incorporated in to every lesson is Respectful Relationships and educating our students on these core values. The Respectful Relationships education program has been more explicitly taught in Years 7 & 8 Health this year as well as incorporated in to the Years 7-12 Learning Mentor sessions.

In senior Health classes, students were fortunate to be involved in many valuable experiences such as; the Salvation Army homelessness schools program; The Mercy Hospital for developing a deeper understanding of the prenatal developmental phases; and an incursion which involved a speaker from the Step Back Think Foundation to raise awareness of alcohol related violence in youth. In Term 3 the resilience of the Year 11 Health and Human Development students was tested as they accepted the parenting responsibility of looking after and attending to the needs of a virtual baby for 24 hours. A challenging, yet highly rewarding experience for them all I'm sure.

It has been a busy year with numerous developments across the curriculum and one with many successes. The Health and PE team have continued to implement literacy strategies in the classroom as well as enhancing learning sequences accordingly. We look forward to developing this further as part of the whole school approach.

I would like to sincerely thank the ongoing amazing efforts, commitment and passion of the CHS HPE TLT team.






LIBRARY





Respectful Relationships

2018 has seen a huge leap towards a wholeschool and wider-community approach of promoting Respectful Relationships.

This year, Camberwell High School has taken on a Lead School role, in which we have been working alongside and supporting seven local Primary Schools in promoting a culture of Respectful Relationships within our community. The Parent Workshop in which Professor Lea Waters presented to this cluster community on the topic of embracing strengths was incredibly successful, as the auditorium in our E-Centre was filled with engrossed parents. Our school has also set up a community partnership with St Mary's Salesian Amateur Football Club whose values on gender equality are in line with those at Camberwell High School.

In the classroom, learning activities have been added to Year 7, 8 and 9 Health Education classes and additional activities have been run in Senior Mentor sessions focusing on gender equity, breaking down stereotypes, positive coping strategies, assertiveness, bystander intervention, personal identity, help-seeking and power imbalances in relationships. These activities all have the purpose of providing students with the communication skills and character strengths needed to deal with confronting situations as well as how to access support if needed.

Members of the Student Respectful Relationships Team have also attended various events throughout the year. The Boroondara White Ribbon Day Event at Hawthorn Town Hall, was an emotional, yet powerful occasion, promoting awareness of gender-based violence. Members of this team also attended a Celebration Day Event at Camberwell Grammar School in which various schools shared the work that they have been doing to promote Respectful Relationships.

Moving forward, in 2019 there will be an extra emphasis on Respectful Relationships in the Year 7 Learning to Learn and Peer Support programs as well as in VET studies. Students from our school are also looking forward to further collaborating with students from our local primary schools in order to promote respectful behaviour and make transition to high school as smooth as possible.

It has been a very busy but incredibly enjoyable year working with students, staff and the wider-school community promoting Respectful Relationships, and I am hoping that 2019 will even more rewarding.
