1945 must have been an exciting year for our school. Despite the turmoil of the war and temporary re-location to other schools, students from 1945 onwards experienced the “real beginning of the school” (Dr. James, Speech Night 1945). Prefects, school houses, green uniforms, *Prospice*, a choral festival, sports carnivals and the new school motto, *Disco Consulere Aliis*, all helped to create “an excellent school tone.” (Roy Andrews, 1948)

In the 1946 *Prospice*, Principal Dr. A.V.G James wrote: “The selection of a badge and motto for the school was not the least important part of the foundation. *Disco Consulere Aliis* - *I am learning to be thoughtful of others* - is the guiding principle of the school, and I feel that if a pupil leaves with that thought ingrained in the heart, the school has done its work well. The motto is engraven in the stonework of the building: let it be built into the character of its pupils.”

I’ve been thinking about our school motto lately. Steve Cain, the CEO of

Coles, sent me an email and asked me to be thoughtful towards the elderly and people at highest risk so they can access the everyday products they need. He also asked me to show understanding and patience towards his team members who are doing their best to ensure they are helping all customers. Similarly, Brad Banducci, the CEO of the Woolworths Group, has written and asked me to support the team members and demonstrate patience and understanding.

I think about our school motto when I drive around the leafy streets of Kew and those noisy leaf blowers inconsiderately blow leaves onto the road. I wonder who will pick up the rubbish that those machines and their operators leave behind!

And of course, I’m also being encouraged to be thoughtful towards others and self-isolate if I’m feeling sick and at risk of infecting others.

Student Awards and Donations from the Ex-Students Society

At the end of each year, the committee ensures that your membership fees and donations go towards our school. In 2019, we gave a total of \$4,000: \$3,300 went towards the Well-Being Fund which is administrated by the Principal for students needing assistance with their education, and four scholarships were awarded to two Year 12 and two Year 11 students chosen by staff for their citizenship and contribution to the school.


In addition, \$1500 from the Robert Ewins Memorial Fund was distributed. The Library received \$750 (plus \$500 from CHESS funds) and 2 students in Years 10 and 11 received literature awards, named in honour of Robert Ewins.

Lyn Gilbert AO (nee Murray) Class of '59

Writing this short self-portrait was surprisingly challenging, but reminded me how much I really enjoyed high school. When I was in Grade 6, I decided I wanted to go to Camberwell High School, rather than PLC (which my parents offered, although they could ill-afford it).

I'm not sure why - perhaps I was snobbish enough to be proud to be eligible to go to the famous (and semi-selective) Camberwell High School. Of course, it was the right decision.

Early on, I realised I wouldn't excel at sport, so I concentrated on being a swot. Years later I realised that any success wasn't because I was as clever as I thought I was, but because I had imbibed a Presbyterian work ethic and an embarrassing need to 'come top'. I had a few extracurricular interests though, including, being leader of the madrigal group and house pianist. Looking back, both surprise me - I had limited musical talent and not much formal teaching - but I guess I worked at it.

After the major hurdle of the Matric exams, I had to decide what to do next. According to my "Prefect Personalities" entry, in the 1959 *Prospice*, my secret ambition was 'to be a farmer's wife and raise chickens'. Good grief! Although it was the 1950s, I can't believe I said that, even then. Really, I wanted to be a doctor, but I was nearly diverted by a



chance conversation with my former French teacher, who advised me to become a nurse instead, because that way I would find a better husband. Whether because of his advice or the daunting prospect of six year's study, I applied to do nursing at the Alfred Hospital, but they knocked me back. So I accepted an alternative offer from the Melbourne University Medical School and had the satisfaction of declining the Alfred's belated offer of a place six months later. The apparently interminable six years' as an undergraduate, extended to many more of postgraduate study.

I started training in infectious disease, at Fairfield Hospital, in 1967, and later in clinical microbiology, which was more family friendly, while my three children were little. I didn't know, at the time, but the '60s was a time when many clever people thought infectious diseases were more or less finished, because of vaccines

and antibiotics, and the future of medicine was elsewhere. But soon, the 1968 'flu pandemic began a series of emerging and re-emerging infectious diseases, of which a small selection are: Ebola, 1970s; AIDS, 1980s; drug-resistant TB, malaria and 'golden staph', 1980-90s; and, in last 20 years, SARS (2003), MERS (2012), another flu pandemic (2009), Zika in Brazil (2015), Ebola in West Africa (2015) and, now, COVID-19. And, throughout this time, the insidious global plague of antimicrobial resistance has been unrelenting and - not unlike climate change - there is too little professional and political will and too much vested interest to reverse it.

It's been an interesting time and, for me, it's not over yet, despite an attempt to retire in 2016. Now that I am not actually employed I can, theoretically, do what I want. For the past four years that has been research into the politics and ethics of infectious diseases - until, of course, I was drawn into the thick of Australia's COVID-19 response, which has a way to go yet.

1971 A Potted History

From: *A Jubilee Retrospective* by Robert Ewins

- Enrolments continued to climb to 956 students: 556 boys and 400 girls.
- Despite having no curtains or lights, the school hall was used for the first time for 7 drama productions.
- Lack of specialised staff, overcrowding, and poor quality of incompetent teachers in the junior school were challenges addressed by Principal Joan Essex.

It is with sadness that we advise of the passing away of an ex-student from the late 50s.

Michael Cheshire (class of '59)



After 20 years of community service to the Hepburn Shire, Michael Cheshire is being remembered as a generous, community minded leader.

Michael attended Camberwell High School from 1957-1959 and maintained his interest by being a financial member of the Ex-Students Society.

He thrived at school before enrolling in one of the world's first formal tertiary qualifications for photography at RMIT.

A cadetship with The Age led to a senior role as a photographer with the Ministry of Tourism.

After working in a number of roles across the next 30 years, including becoming a Justice of the Peace, Bail Justice and President of the Australasian Council of Justices' Associations, Michael and his wife moved to the Hepburn Shire, where he served as both a councillor and mayor of the Hepburn Shire Council in the early 2000s. His significant contribution to the Clunes community led to his "Citizen of the Year" award on Australia Day 2016.
