From Norma M. Williams (class of '47) Farmville, Virginia, USA

Recently I found the website of Camberwell High School and immediately read the 1947 Prospice. I attended CHS in the first days when Melbourne Boys High moved back to their school. It was the era of Dr. James and Miss Egan with new faculty, new motto, new uniforms, new house names (student suggestions-staff decision), poor landscaping and no matric-an exciting time. In 1946 I was Roosevelt House Captain (Form IV) and in 1947, Head Prefect. Our 1946-1947 class was a very special and happy group in a unique time.

After receiving my Bachelor of Music Education and Master of Music in the USA, I moved to Europe (mainly Germany) and sang lyric soprano roles for thirty years. Back in the USA, I continued in music: teaching voice, opera and choral direction. Two years ago, I retired.

Would there be a possibility that you could enquire if any of our classmates are still living? I trust this is not an inconvenience as I would be interested in renewing old friendships. Not too much time as I will be ninety in May.

Vale Barry Teesdale: Class of '58


Barry's early years gave no indication of the passion for the environment that was to consume his later life. He completed Form 6 in 1958 and was awarded a Secondary Teachers College Studentship. His career as a Primary school teacher was a perfect fit for his caring and mentoring nature. After teaching in Melbourne, he taught in isolated one-teacher bush schools in Gippsland including Yalungah, Korrine, Bruthen, Bairnsdale and finally, Nowa Nowa. The experience cemented his love of the bush, and after he retired Barry wrote lovingly about the one-teacher schools in a series of amusing short stories published by the ABC. The schools were modest places where a dozen students aged four to fourteen learnt their '3 R's' from a young teacher in a suit and tie. The mix of ages in the one room, he said, helped children see that "the little'uns need guidance and the biggies have responsibilities".

Barry's passion for the bush and his great concern for the environment led to him taking over the Melaleuca Nursery just outside Inverloch in 1984. A movement had begun in Gippsland in the '70s to revegetate the degraded waterways and eroded pastureland with plants and trees indigenous to the region, but not enough was known about the native species and how to propagate them. By experimentation and trial and error, Barry grew the tube stock to supply the widespread revegetation programs that took off under Landcare in the 1990s.

In 1997 over 1200 scouts planted almost 90,000 seedlings supplied by Melaleuca Nursery. It was the biggest ever two-day planting effort in South Gippsland. Supported by local volunteers, the eager scouts covered the eroding hillsides of the Candowie Reservoir and the banks of the Bass River. They used tube stock Barry had grown using a new technique specially designed to train the roots and strengthen the growth of the seedlings. By 2008 the nursery was producing a quarter of a million seedlings a year for Landcare and local revegetation efforts. By the time he retired in 2011, Barry had supplied well over a million and a half seedlings, all carefully selected, and custom grown, to suit a wide variety of landscapes. Barry loved helping nursery customers select the right native plant for their garden, but he had no time for people who stubbornly opted for pretty flowers. When asked, "where should I plant my Geraldton Wax?", his grumpy reply was, "in Geraldton!"

A cancer diagnosis forced him to leave his beloved nursery in 2011, but in retirement he was able to indulge other passions: red wine, Citroens, politics, writing those amusing, perceptive short stories, and enjoying the company of his wife Loretta. Barry died in February 2020. The legacy of "the man who made Gippsland greener" lives on.



In Short


Vale Don Walker (Class of 1941)

Don was one of the first pupils at Camberwell High when it opened for two terms in 1941 and a few weeks in 1942. When the new building was required for Melbourne High, Don was transferred to Box Hill High and later Melbourne High to complete his secondary education. After graduation he and his wife Fay sailed to Europe where they taught at schools in Scheveningen, Holland, Islay in Scotland and India before returning to Australia where they settled in Castlemaine to raise a family. Don remained a dedicated Secondary School teacher at the High School until his retirement. Don was also an enthusiastic member of CHESS and travelled from Castlemaine to attend events. He was 90.
