PRESIDENT'S REPORT

CHESS PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS TO YEAR 12 FAREWELL LUNCHEON ON 12TH OCTOBER 2001

As students and ex-students we all own this school. But what will you want from your old school? This is not a question to answer today.

Your current committee of eleven members are students from the classes of 1941 to 1971. At our recent CHESS meeting, I asked the committee what message they wished to relay to you as departing students.

The responses ranged thus:

Some CHESS members spoke of our efforts to preserve in archives your student records so that you may contact the school in the future for proof of your various academic achievements. Another message was about the establishment of the Chessmoves website. This site, whilst still in its infancy, allows us providing information on the school and the ex-student organisation. Our newsletters, photographs and e-mail are just some of our choices to include as part of the Internet connection. The strong message was 'please stay in touch', keep the school informed of your address and contact points. Statistically, we know that, during the first 20 years after your departure from school, Camberwell High will not be high on your social agenda. But later on, you will reflect and maybe want to be part of, or organise, a reunion or social event at the school.

Searching for ex-students always presents us with a challenge. Obviously, people move house, move interstate or live overseas. Name

changes are a problem. Girls, don't get married or, if you do, don't change your name! Many ex-students have looked at our guest lists for events and not recognised the names of girls of their year, until given their maiden name.

C.H.E.S.S. Treasurer's Report

NAB TERM DEPOSIT

In October it was decided to partially redeem \$2000 out of the \$5000 held on 12 months term deposit with the NAB. The yearly interest rate has dropped from 5.25% to only 1.00% with the \$3000 maturing on 16 November 2002. The extra funds were transferred to the cheque account to meet the costs of the forthcoming mail-out and postage costs. Apart from the \$3000 there is a balance of \$3428 currently in the cheque account.

CHESS FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - 10 MONTH PERIOD ENDED 11 FEBRUARY 2002

The AGM will be held on 15 April 2002 where the whole year will be reported. However, as this is the full mail-out to all ex-students, I will be discussing the results of the last 10 months. The payments don't show yet the postage & printing of the 4000 ex-students mail out being conducted this month for the March 2002 ChessMoves. The March subscription mail-out has been brought forward from June for membership renewals to line up with the start of the calendar year. Correspondingly, there is no revenue yet for 2002 year subscriptions.

There is a net deficit of \$1267 so far over the year as our payments of \$5047 exceeded total receipts of \$3780. The main revenue items included in the \$3780 were subscriptions of \$2840, donations \$677 and Term Deposit Interest \$263 with, unfortunately, no webpage advertising income (please feel free to contribute !!)

The big ticket items were reimbursing the school for the planting of the Silver Birch Trees (together with a plaque) for \$1200, signwriting of \$500 for the front gate, purchasing and updating of old CHS student records in archiving/filing cabinets of \$870 and advertising in the 2001 Prospice magazine of \$750. We have switched webpage providers and had a major overhaul of the website - and the costs of maintaining it and publishing ChessMoves amounted to \$555. Other cost items were catering, bank charges, printing and postage totalling \$1172 so together with the school reimbursements of \$3005, plus webpage of \$555; all costs came to \$5047. Remember, there was no CHESS re-union held for the last two years, except for the CHS 60th birthday celebrations in late March 2001.

MERCHANT BANK

CHESS has an ABN 54 448 712 733 principally to conduct business as a Bank Merchant so as to accept credit card payments. Of the total \$3517 subscriptions and donations received so far, \$1845 or 52% has come from credit cards' banking. Since 1 May 2001 AGM bank charges have cost \$162 made up of ongoing imprinter fees of \$2.20 pm and floating fees of \$139.91 based on @7.65% on the value of deposits.

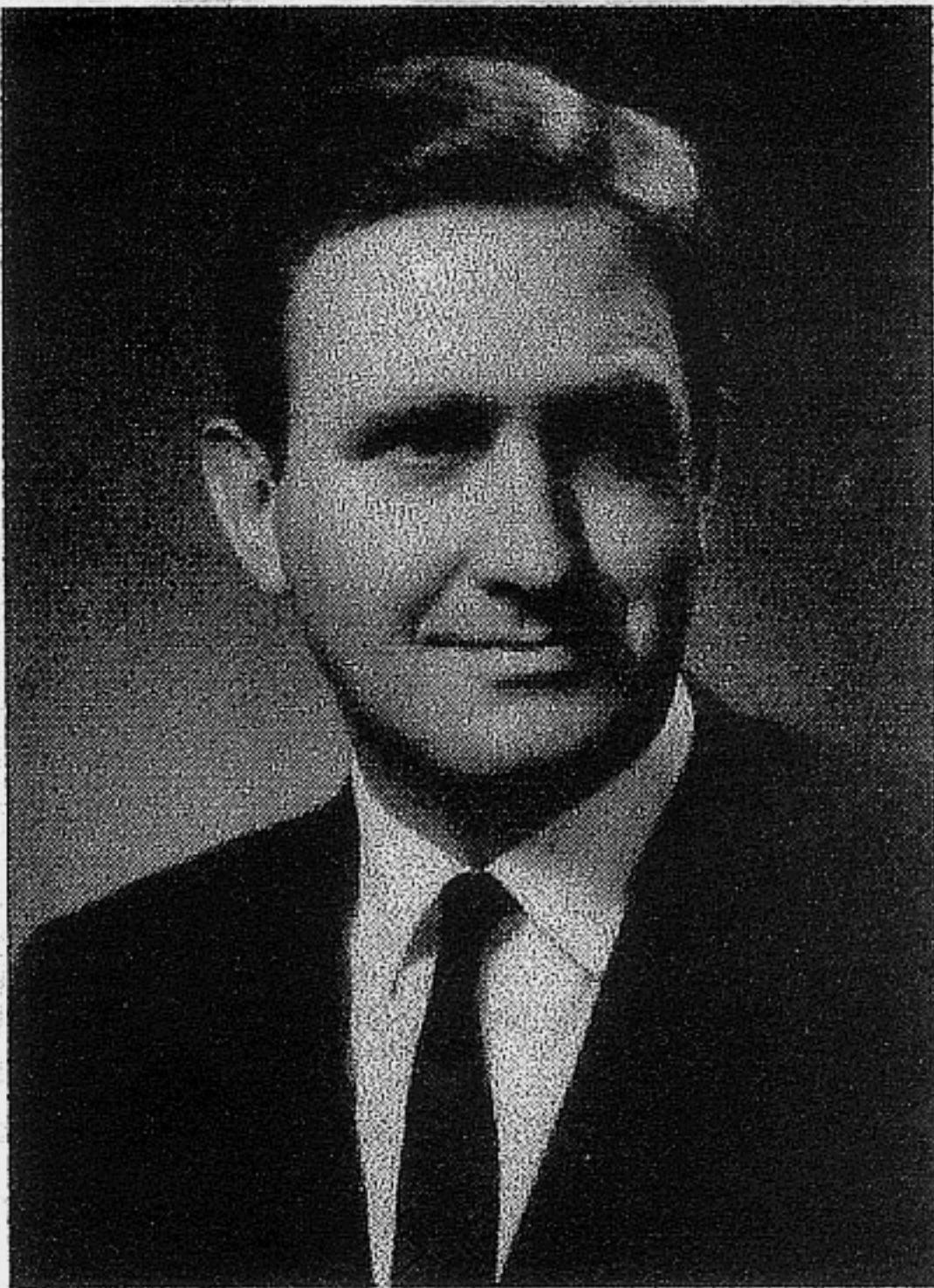

Reflections of our founder.....

I have always been both very proud and thankful for my happy schooldays at Camberwell High School and grabbed the opportunity of forming C.H.E.S.S. over ten years ago, when a lot of hard work (good fun too) was done in 1991, contacting past students for the "fifty years" celebrations. We capitalised on the lists of names, formed the ex-students' society and an enthusiastic band of stalwarts have guided C.H.E.S.S. since, providing a most valuable link between ex-students and the school. Pity such an organisation was not both commenced and survived much earlier, because friends made at school, have a certain significance as we all understand, trust and appreciate each other in a special way, having all had a common experience and a similar background.

Four years after the school opened in 1941, I was in the first group to go right through the school, obtaining my Leaving Certificate in 1949. Our school motto "Disco Consulere Aliis" was then translated (undoubtedly by Latin teacher, Miss Dooley) as "I am learning to help others" and this creed was drummed into us and I am sure it has had a profound influence on the balanced life I have tried to lead, embracing family, business, sporting, community and social involvements.

We made up for the lack in those days of having any school traditions and also physical resources, such as libraries, assembly hall, gymnasium, meeting rooms, etc., with many enhancing factors such as great support and encouragement from the teaching staff and by us having a strong school ethic, spirit, loyalty, enthusiasm and a determination to succeed in whatever paths lay before us.

The Australian public school system, that should be resourced and staffed to the very highest of standards, generally seems to be under constant attack nowadays from many quarters, with governments Australia-wide gaining political advantage by pandering to religious groups and the 'aspirational voters', who perhaps are blinded by delusions of status, rather than the merits of moral courage, compassion, enthusiasm, determination, hard work and service to others, which will produce good citizens and a fair and fulfilling society for all Australians.

I trust that Camberwell High School will continue to deliver these latter merits into the future and that C.H.E.S.S. will continue to support it and also thrive.

Principal's Message

Greetings to all members of CHESS from the CHS school community of 2002! This year sees the school's enrolment at 1200 students, the highest ever, including our biggest intake of girls, forty International Students, and 105 staff. We are turning away about 60 students each year and hope to cap our total enrolment at 1250. Students come to CHS from over 50 feeder schools (at Year 7), and we now have nine (9) Year 7 classes.

Stage 2 of our Masterplan -- for our new library, Home Economics, I.T. and Admin areas -- is expected to be funded this year. The new VCE Centre (opened last year) is an excellent resource, as is the Arts/Technology Complex, and our landscaped grounds and CHESS treed pathway enhance the school.

Our Year 12s of 2001 did well, with 90% of them going on to major universities (76%) and TAFE, (14%). CHS was the third top school in Victoria in Information Technology Systems, and our Dux gained an ENTER score (tertiary entrance %) of 99.80.

Please visit the school if you can: we enjoy meeting former students.

Q: Could the teachers be included in the reunions?

A: The records that were kept of the teachers are not complete. In some cases, only the initials were recorded. This makes it very hard to trace people.

Did CHS have a lasting influence on your life?

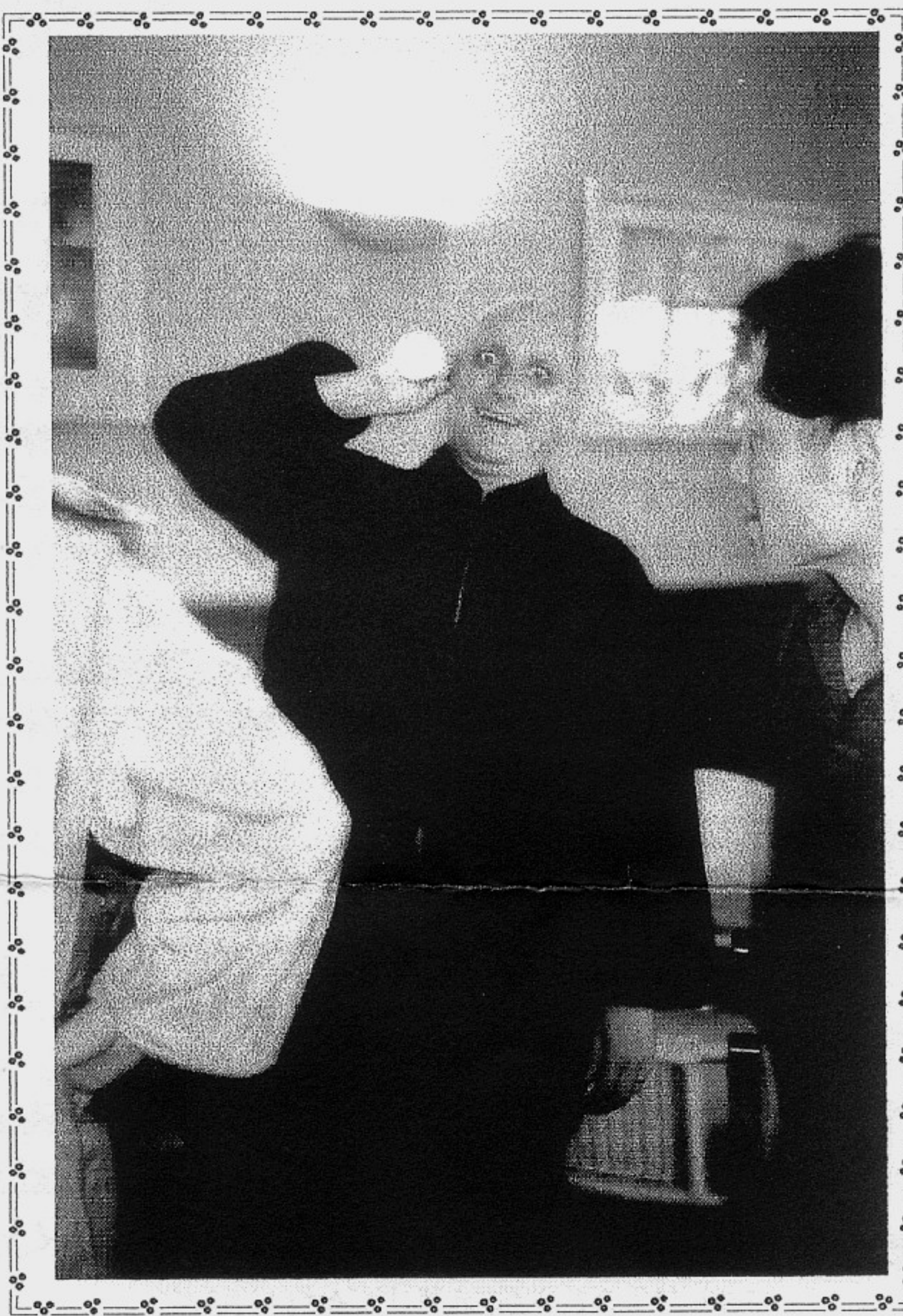
Camberwell High taught me that going to school can be fun. I was only there for 2 years, but I had an absolute ball and actually learned something.

After leaving CHS I started a locksmithing apprenticeship with Handy Hans Locksmiths in Camberwell. I was there for around 2 years and then finished my apprenticeship in Heidelberg at Northern Locksmiths. After this I moved to northern Tasmania in 1980, where I stayed for 8 years. 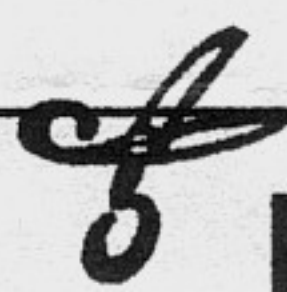
