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

Principal Report



After two years of interruptions and lockdowns, it was a joy to welcome students back to school and see them meeting up with friends, chatting and playing on the oval from the first day back.

We had lots to do to set about recovering from the impact of 2020 and 2021. Across the state we embraced two major goals in our schools regarding learning and wellbeing:

- support those who need extra support and those who have thrived to continue their learning
- support students' wellbeing and mental health, especially the vulnerable

It was important to have parents back on site too. We started with a PFA cuppa with Year 7 parents as the students departed for the Portsea camp. We held our parent information evenings on site at school welcoming families back. Staff and parents agreed that the evenings at school helped us feel that we were starting to return to normality, especially at the very well attended Years 8 and 9 evening.

It was wonderful to welcome back our 32 highest achieving Year 12 students from 2021 for our High Achiever Assembly. It was the first time we gathered together in the Assembly Hall for quite some time. We also recognized and celebrated our student leaders for 2022

Our student leaders were in force leading their Houses at the Swimming Carnival in March. Congratulations to the winning House Macarthur for the win on the day and of the 2022 House Cup.

Our Beginner Band camp and first concert took place on the 8th and 9th March. It was such a delight to be able to have our regular events again.

We celebrated Harmony Week with a focus on inclusion, and we enjoyed a range of student led activities, including great music at the start of each lunch time, special orange treats at the canteen and the sausage sizzle, free dress, and live music on Friday. Our SRC have done a wonderful job

with organizing events. I am delighted to see that our A-Z club has been re-established this year with several of our senior students taking the lead to establish a group which is focused on inclusion. The club draws upon the safe school philosophy of ensuring all students including LGBTQIA+ feel safe and included at school.

As Anzac Day was the last day of school holidays, we held our annual assembly on April 31st. Our students were so respectful and reflective as we listened to stories, music and viewed images from WW1 and WW2. It was my honour to accompany our student leaders to the cenotaph in Surrey Hills for the dawn service on Monday 25th. We laid the school wreath before departing to resume our lives, grateful for our peaceful and prosperous country.

In May we held the annual Open Night. The highlight of the evening was the large number of students in attendance to lead families on tours and share experiences of their daily lives at CHS.

It was clear that we were not through the pandemic just yet and the year continued to provide us with challenges in regard to managing illness. Student and staff absences made managing the flow of learning and assessment difficult. We were grateful to our pool of regular CRTs and to the many teachers who took extra classes and duties when needed. Our students were also understanding and helpful, including when we needed to combine classes.

The Launch program continues to meet the objectives of engaging high achieving students and expanding their learning and inspiring them as learners and future leaders. It is evident that students are taking on leadership opportunities with 7 members of 9JL having leadership roles in the school this year. The worth of the program was recognised by the Victorian education community with Launch teachers given the 2022 Victorian Excellence Award for Outstanding Provision for High Ability Students.

I was so thrilled to use the scholarship awarded to me in 2020 and during the school holidays, together with Maureen and Emmanuel we flew to the USA to investigate a STEAM based trip for students. We visited NASA Space Camp in Huntsville, Alabama, then Birmingham (home to the Civil Rights Institute) and then on to New York. We hope that the first of these student trips will take place in 2024.

Year 12 students enjoyed a variety of celebrations to conclude their year including their formal and a fun filled excursion day off site where they could truly enjoy themselves.

Our final celebrations took place on Monday 17th October, commencing with whole school assembly to farewell the Year 12 cohort, followed by a delightful lunch outside in the sunshine, provided by the PFA for all Year 12 students and all staff. At our valedictory evening for Year 12 students and families we presented prizes and awards and recognised all of our Year 12 students individually. The supper provided by the PFA rounded out a lovely day of gratitude and celebration.

Student led conferences continue to be a feature of the school year with students demonstrating understanding of their own learning growth and learning challenges. While we held conferences remotely during the year, in Term 4 we were ready to welcome families back on site for round table group presentations in Years 7, 8 and 9.

Our final Music concert for the year was held on Thursday October 20th. What a celebration! The hall was full of enthusiastic families supporting our wonderful musicians. Continuing the music program throughout 2020 and 2021 was challenging and only possible due to the support of our parents, the skill and commitment of our staff and the dedication of students.

This year we have commenced the process of recovery and I am grateful to all in our community for their support this year and during the past two years that were so challenging for us all.

Later in the week we enjoyed the final Music Concert which is always a delight to see the growth and development in our 300+ Music students as they performed so enthusiastically for us.

As I write this report we have exams concluding for our Year 12s and just about to commence for our Year 10 and 11 students. This will be followed by Presentation Evening celebrations where we recognise all high achieving students in Years 7-11 and prepare for 2023 with the announcement of our new student leadership team.

I look forward to 2023 when we will embrace the new challenge and welcome new Year 7s to start their journey with us. Teaching is a gift because each day we meet with and work with young people who offer the promise of a better future. Junior School students are emerging from difficult and demanding years and facing uncertain and unprecedented times but when reflecting on the way in which students have responded inspires us all to do the best we can to ensure they continue to grow and develop into young adults ready to make a positive contribution and achieve their best.

This year began with information assemblies and evenings for parents and carers to learn what Camberwell High School has to offer and hear about how they can be active participants in their child's learning. Within the first few days Year 7 students embraced the Portsea Camp. They took on the challenge of being away from their families and into unfamiliar surroundings which was a significant achievement considering that many had not been on a camp for a few years. And for some this was evident. But as teachers we were impressed with the capacity of this group of students to learn about and demonstrate the CHS school values of resilience and resourcefulness when managing their sense of uncertainty. Year 7 students engaged with the opportunities provided by the exciting activities and the chance to meet new students from across 40 different primary schools and in some cases form new friendships.

Some of our Year 8 students were also experiencing a camp for the first time in many years when they went on the Wollongarra camp. The teachers supervising, Angelina Stojanoska and Alex Benson returned from the trip very impressed by the way in which students enthusiastically engaged with the program.

They also commented on their respectful behaviour and positive attitude toward each other and to those organising the camp. We see camps and excursions as an important learning opportunity for students to further develop their independence and we are thankful to the parents and carers for supporting these important extra curricula activities and programs that offer enriching learning experiences for our students.

In Connections this year the Year 9 students researched a movement, person, idea or item that has made a difference to the world we live in. Students constructed models that represented their research. The question of how to represent these people, items, ideas and movements in a symbolic way through a three dimensional model provided opportunities for many fascinating conversations to take place between students and their mentor teachers. The staff and students presented their work at the Connexhibition held on Thursday March 31st and gave students the chance to transform the E-Centre into a gallery space. Students displayed the school's dispositions of critical and creative inquiry, collaboration, ethical behaviour and reflectiveness.

Reflecting on 2022 a highlight for me professionally was the opportunity to collaborate with my colleagues to develop and implement a high achievers program for aspiring students. In Term 3 a group of high ability students from Years 7 and 8 participated in a voluntary extension and enrichment program. The purpose of this program was to explore ways in which students can further their understanding of themselves as learners and build their skills to identify how they learn best. These are skills and knowledge that will provide an essential learning foundation as they continue into next year.

The International Team is delighted to report that our resilient international students have had a successful year. This is despite the on-going impact of the pandemic and not having seen their family members in their home country for more than three years. Our students have stayed healthy, studied hard and supported each other.

We were also glad that this year, ten remote learners from Vietnam and China could return to Australia and study on-site with us.

Currently we have 50 international students. These students come from China, Vietnam, Thailand, Malaysia, Cambodia, Indonesia, South Korea and Japan. Despite the language barrier, these students thrive in our school system and learn to be global citizens.

The school was fortunate to have Ms Tara Fang join us as an International Student Coordinator from the end of Term 2. Under the capable leadership of Ms Salter, the Assistant Principal, Ms Cathy Addison and Ms Tara Fang managed the program in Term 3 while Ms Phoebe Low was on long service leave. It was a very busy time as we re-started our on-site English Language School with new students from China, Vietnam and Cambodia.

We are expecting more new students next year as we have received more applications in recent weeks.

Our students continued to excel in their studies (some of them are dux of their year level/subjects) and participated in Inter-school sports competitions (and did well in table-tennis).

In June, Frank Huang received the Victorian Global Learning Awards (Year 11 Academic Excellence Commendation Award) organized by the Department of Education & Training (DET).

Frank Huang and 3 other local students also performed a string quartet (a beautiful classical piece) at the ceremony.

In July, Camberwell High School also received a Student Voice Project Certificate of Achievement presented by International Education Division of the Department of Education and Training. 



It has been an exciting and productive year for the faculty.

Teachers at all year levels have once again welcomed students into the worlds of English, Languages and Humanities. This year there has been a strong focus on empathy, with students approaching learning from a range of perspectives. From historians and judges, through to ancient philosophers and lyricists, students have had the opportunity to develop empathy and put themselves in the shoes of others.

Below are snapshots of the many activities this year that have contributed to student learning and development across the faculty.

Ancient Civilisations Day was an opportunity for Year 7 students to put themselves in the shoes of the people they had studied. It was fantastic to see students experience aspects of life in the era appropriate attire they had created.

In Year 9 Humanities, the Holocaust was introduced as a stand-alone unit in Term 3. Teachers worked closely with the Melbourne Holocaust Museum to plan the curriculum. What it means to be a good citizen, the importance of personal stories, the fragility of democracy and being an upstander rather than a bystander were key aspects of the course. Students had the opportunity to visit the newly renovated Melbourne Holocaust Museum in Elsternwick in Term 4, meeting and conversing with a survivor of the Holocaust. The work our teachers undertook in constructing the Holocaust unit was recognised by the Museum as well as the History Teachers Association of Victoria, with Tricia Radford and Lily Leman leading a seminar for other schools on how they may teach the Holocaust.

Our teaching teams this year have also been hard at work on developing learning continuums for each subject. Exploring how our students learn, the essential skills and knowledge to be covered, as well as language and learning dispositional growth have been key to this work.

It has allowed teachers to investigate new opportunities for learning and how best to prepare students for success in Years 11 and 12.

In Year 10 English, this was the first year students experienced an entire term of English Language. Our expert English Language team designed a curriculum that would prepare students for the skills and knowledge required in VCE English Language studies, as well as allowing students to make more informed course selections when choosing which English subjects to study at Years 11 and 12.

The whole staff at Camberwell High School is currently undertaking work on incorporating Indigenous perspectives in the curriculum and being allies to the First Nations communities. This has allowed us to look at the current work we do with students and how we may deepen understanding of and approach learning from Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander points of view.

This builds on the global perspectives that the Languages at Camberwell High School develop in students. The work French students do in exploring French-speaking communities gives them a richer understanding of the world. This was reflected in the way students communicated and interacted with exchange students we welcomed at the school from France this year.

After winning last year, our Senior Chinese students once again excelled at the Victorian High School Chinese Debating Championship 2022, bringing home the trophy for the second year in a row. A brilliant effort considering the tough competition from both state and independent schools.

With Year 12s finishing their secondary studies in English, Languages and Humanities, students worked hard with teachers in preparation for exams, finding the best and most effective ways to demonstrate their skills and knowledge in majority exam-based assessments. Again, empathy was key. Students were asked to show empathy for their assessors, and consider how their work may be viewed from the perspective of the person marking it.


We wish students, especially those who have demonstrated a passion for the subjects in our faculty over six years, all the best with their Year 12 results, and look forward to seeing many of them following pathways in the subjects we are all passionate about.











These are some of the diverse skills and activities our students have experienced in their Maths and Science learning this year. It has been a very busy year for both students and teachers, as we have worked together to create a learning environment filled with wonder, excitement, challenge and exploration. We have all enjoyed being back in the classroom full time after the challenges faced over the last two years.

The Year 9 Launch students showed that it was possible to be artistic in mathematics by creating amazing pictures using their knowledge of straight lines and curves. The Year 12 Chemistry classes put theory into practice when the visited Melbourne University's Analytical Instrumentation Workshop to conduct experiments using chromatography and spectroscopy. While our Year 7 science students investigated classification at the Melbourne Zoo.

Roller coaster rides were the order of business for the Year 12 Physics students investigating forces and motions at Luna Park. While VCE Psychology students where learning about the use of mnemonics to improve memory and how they could apply spaced interval learning to their advantage.

Year 8 science students were challenged to build a Rube Goldberg Machine (a machine that consists of sequence of levers, pulleys, wheels and ramps) to keep a marble in motion for as long as possible. While the Year 10 Patterns Proofs and Geometry students chose an established mathematical problem to investigate, and presented their findings in the form of highly informative and engaging posters.


Also making hay (of sorts) in the laboratory were the Year 11 Biology students, who each probed the effect that a specific environmental factor had on the germination and growth rate of radish seeds. These same students then had the opportunity to get to grips with the equipment and techniques used by field ecologists whilst exploring the rock pools of Rickett's Point Sanctuary. Meanwhile, the Year 12 Biology group got a taste of a tertiary level laboratory when they ventured to the University of Melbourne to participate in workshops that allowed them to apply their knowledge of evolution and antibiotic resistance.

As well as organising these enriching learning experiences, the dedicated and hardworking Maths and Science team has been very busy developing challenging and inventive CATs and SACs, exploring innovative strategies to scaffold student learning and providing many opportunities for students to question and explore the world through an inquiry process. It certainly has been another action packed year filled with wonder, magic and many successes. I would like to thank the CHS Maths and Science team for their dedication, enthusiasm and commitment. Finally, we bid a fond farewell to members of the team that are moving onto new adventures and wish them all the very best in their future endeavours.




Year 7 Maths Algebraic Expressions

Overall our students read 1,212 books during Term 2 from a wide variety of genres. Well done to all our Year 7 and Year 8 students.

DISPLAYS

Highlights included the "Banned" books display created by our talented Library Technician Ms Jowsey that got students talking about literature and censorship. Our Harmony Day and Multicultural Day displays were high points where students created posters and beautiful origami.

2022 also saw our library fish thriving in their new fish tank.

READING, RESEARCH AND STUDYING

Liz the Librarian has supported classes with their research topics including persuasive writing on social issues and the Year 7 digital technology research task. We are lucky at CHS to have valuable research databases as well as tailor-made Libguides created in-house by our Librarian Ms Lee to assist students with their research. Our Libguides are a useful online study tool to support students with completing assessment tasks and preparing for exams. We are lucky to currently have an extensive list of these study guides.

Exam periods have seen an influx of senior students using our study spaces including our private study discussion rooms when students need a quiet sanctuary to undertake their exam preparation.

This uncharacteristically cold and wet Springtime has meant many students sought shelter in our inviting library space to read a book from our considerable collection. Chess has been a popular game for students relaxing in the library.

LIBRARY COLLECTION

An enormous amount of work has been achieved this year by the library team in acquisitions, stocktaking, and reorganizing the books to ensure that teachers and students can find books easily at their point of need. We've added even more signage to our bookshelves to ensure students can find their favourite topics easily and quickly. This year we have further developed our collection of our high interest low literacy books and dyslexic friendly books to ensure we meet the needs of all our students.

The library has been fortunate to receive donations from the Robert Ewin Memorial and Camberwell High School Ex-Students Society (CHESS) so that we could purchase many more books that we wouldn't have otherwise been able to have. These included a class set of the latest up-to-date Atlases and English Language dictionaries which have been very useful and valuable additions.

For the first time ever our student Book club have been actively involved in book selection for the library. Each term they were given a small budget to select their preferred titles from a box provided by our suppliers. Book Clubbers made considered choices about the books they thought their peers may like to read and selected a wide range of genres. Their selections now sport a "book club recommended" sticker to promote these titles to the wider student body.

INITIATIVES FOR 2023

I'm very much looking forward to providing more opportunities for students to become involved in shaping their library service. We hope to create 'Library Leader' roles in 2023 to provide alternative and inclusive forms of student leadership opportunities.

Ancient Civilizations Day




Ancient Civilizations Day was great fun! We got to dress up as if we were from ancient civilizations.

On June 10, the Year 9 Launch class took the tram down Riversdale road to the Institute of Frontier Materials (IFM) at Deakin University. This was a specially-organised and customised workshop, just for our Launch class.

The students rotated through laboratory stations, where practicing scientists helped them to examine the ultrastructure of metals under the electron microscope, measure physical properties of element and compound samples, and compare the reactivity of pure metal elements.

It's not like the country, where getting up early is met with the enchanting warbling of the kookaburras and a warm breeze; where you can look up at a sunrise painted with beautiful colours, the likes of which I'm sure I haven't seen once in the city. There's no point getting up early here and by the aches all through me, my body knows it.

In 2017, I moved house, I changed schools and I had to meet new people. I entered the classroom with already established friendship groups and sat on the floor with the students. We had to talk about our holidays and this one boy with blonde hair and chubby cheeks spoke up. His name was Roy. "I went to the rock pools! I climbed the rocks with my sisters, but I slipped and got this big scratch." He showed his leg, it was covered in grazes and dried blood. The classroom cringed and many students rolled their eyes. They didn't care, they hated him. At the time I didn't understand why.

A few weeks later, it was recess and I was outside. Our school had the common hat rule. If you didn't have a hat, you had to stay undercover. Some boys grabbed Roy's hat and started to throw it around to one another. "No hat, no play, no fun today! No hat, no play, no fun today!" They started to chant as Roy scrambled to get his hat, frantically yelling "Give it back!" I walked over and said, "Here, give me his hat." They begrudgingly handed it to me, and I gave it back to Roy. 'What mean boys!' I thought.

A few months later my opinion of Roy changed. He wasn't a poor boy, teased by his classmates. He was "Ew, Roy! he's so annoying!" Everything he did bothered me. He copied my ideas, was loud and he couldn't help but be the quintessential teacher's pet.

A few months after that, I started to have an attitude toward him. I would yell when he looked at me and I rolled my eyes when he talked. I was becoming like all the other mean kids. Like the boys who stole his hat, the girls that laughed at him, and the students that ignored his holiday story.

One time, my classmates and I were yelling at Roy and being bullies. He ran out of the classroom sobbing. He grabbed his laptop, searched kidshelpline.com, and clicked on the "dealing with bullies" link. I still haven't forgotten this.

I would sometimes wake up in the night and cry, feeling guilty about how I treated him. Despite this, once I arrived at school and saw his face, heard his voice, and was in the same room as him, I would still be mean. I didn't know why.

In 2018, on Valentine's day, I found a note in my locker. It was a confession of love from Roy. I felt so disgusted that he thought this way and was going to tell the teacher on him. I decided against it, opting to talk to my mum before I went to tattle. I didn't even consider that he maybe didn't loathe me like I believed he would. He mustn't have thought I was a bully because why would he like me?

Years after I graduated primary school, I would still think about my hatred towards him. I planned to apologise for my actions at an upcoming movie night that he and I would both be attending (because of our younger siblings). Then, COVID happened, lockdowns ensued, and Roy was forgotten.

I don't know if I affected Roy. If his primary school years were ruined because of me. What I do know is that you should be kind to your classmates. You might regret not.

It is beyond comprehension that in the year 2022, over 200 years since colonisation, we as a nation have not sought to rectify our past mistakes and rightfully acknowledge Australia's first nations people. As a nation we are slow to rectify our mistakes. In 1967 we counted Aboriginals, in 2008 we apologised, in 2022 we seek constitutional reform to end more than two centuries of systemic racism towards Australia's first nations people.

The Uluru Statement from the heart was first proposed over five years ago under the previous Coalition government, they did nothing. The Uluru Statement proposes a First Nations voice to parliament that will help guide future decisions by the government to ensure that no one is disadvantaged, alongside this the statement also requests for meaningful truth-telling by Australia's first nations people which will lead to healing and reconciliation between first nations people and non-first nations people, this is critical for our future. There are some misguided conceptions that this statement implies that First Nations people will have accepted the loss of their sovereignty, this is not true, the Uluru statement seeks to protect them and help repair the past and rescue the future. Throughout Australia there is already widespread public support for meaningful change. It's time for our government to act on the will of the people. Under our new government, as announced by our Labour Prime Minster Anthony Albanese, we 'commit to the Uluru Statement in full'. Now is time we build a better tomorrow.

Finally, to those who believe that single-sex education is deeply important in our society, I ask you, why is it then that the modern world is moving away from it? The facts don't lie: single-sex schooling is already becoming a thing of the past. In December for SBS, Professor Mary Rasmussen cited a recent ACER study which forecasts the complete disappearance of single-sex schools in Australia by 2035. That's natural selection for you; single-sex schools serve no valuable purpose anymore, so they are becoming extinct. Now, there are always going to be people who defy this trend and argue that single-sex schooling is more effective than co-ed, but this argument does not stand up to scrutiny. As Professor Emer Smyth of the Economic and Social Research Institute in Ireland explains, there is no significant difference in the academic results of single-sex schools versus co-ed once you adjust for social class and prior ability. The benefits of switching to co-ed are not just theoretical, they have been proven. Armidale Secondary College in Sydney switched to co-ed 2016, and, according to the headmaster, "The social environment is a better one now than it was before." With this in mind, there are simply no reasons for anyone to try and stop these pedagogical dominoes from falling over, as the evolution of our society needs this to happen.

The abolition of single-sex schooling is a change that is inevitable and right. The very institution is built on sexism and archaic religious values, the dangerous effects on our children's development are clear and unacceptable, and fortunately for us, we are already moving away from it. Now, we must take the next step. Let's stand together and denounce gender segregation; denounce disrespect. Let's abolish single-sex education for our children, and our children's children.
